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

Chaplain Thoughts...

"You shall love the LORD, your God, with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength."

Jesus answers the scribe's question about which of Israel's 600+ religious laws was the greatest by reciting the words of Moses (Rv 7:2-4, 9-14), "Hear, O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD alone! Therefore, you shall love the LORD, your God, with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength." He then immediately adds a second low, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these." The other Israelite laws were just commentary on these Two Great Commandments of Love!

Jesus tells us that we cannot separate these two commandments of love. We cannot love God if we do not love each other, our neighbors. How can we love God, who we cannot see, if we cannot love our neighbor, who we can see? Why must we love each other? Because, we are all created in the image of God and by our baptism Jesus has restored us to the very likeness of God, we share in God's very nature. We become brothers and sisters in the Body of Christ. We must see Christ in each other. We must see God's image in each other. Remember what Jesus said, " Amen, I say to you, whateveryou did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me."

God is LOVE! Love gives itself to others and it has to be re-

r. ceived by them. God did this when He created us in His image and likeness. He proved His love for us when He sent His only Son to die for our salvation. We receive God's love and He ex-

pects us to treat each other the way He treats us, with love. Love begins at home with parents loving each other and their children. It continues with children loving their parents and their brothers and sisters. When we love those whom we live with at home, it becomes easy to love those we meet outside our homes. Master 4th Degree large population is the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) of the Department of Veterans Affairs, which operates more than 1,000 facilities throughout the United States, ranging from full-service hospitals to nursing homes and home-care programs.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS) Program is the vehicle that the Knights of Columbus uses in the Serving Those Who Served program. The Vice President for Fraternal Services has oversight of the VAVS program. The program is directed and managed by the Assistant for Military and Veterans Affairs who also serves as the National VAVS Representative to the VAVS National Advisory Committee (NAC). The K of C VAVS program is executed through the Fourth Degree chain of command through the U.S. Vice Supreme Masters and District Masters. Under the program, a Knight of Columbus is certified as a VAVS representative or deputy representatives attend hospital meetings and organize efforts for K of C volunteers..

The Knights of Columbus currently has VAVS representatives at almost every VA medical center (VAMC) and many clinics in the United States. There is one certified representative and, up to, three deputy representatives from the Knights of Columbus at these VAMCs. Representatives recruit and manage K of C VAVS volunteers in developing activities and programs that target the most essential needs of the patients.

In the United States, the VA hospitals, clinics and facilities need all types of volunteer services – from program planning to visiting veterans. Supreme Knight's Message

New Documentary on Our Lady of Guadalupe to Air on ABC This Fall by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson

A new documentary film narrated by actor Jim Caviezel offers original insights into the details, story and impact of the 16th century apparition of Our Lady of Guadalupe — one of the most recognizable religious icons in the American hemisphere.

The Knights of Columbus-produced film, *Guada-lupe: The Miracle and the Message*, paints a comprehensive and inspiring picture of the history, facts and legacy of the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Being aired as part of ABC's Visions and Values Series, the documentary will have a broadcast window from Oct. 11 to Dec. 10.

The film delves into the inexplicable existence of the image that appeared on the *tilma* (cloak) of an indigenous convert named Juan Diego, who, over the course of four days in December 1531, received a series of visions of the Virgin Mary. The indigenous people were amazed how the image revealed im-

portant elements of the Christian faith through native symbols an actual codex — that they could understand. Most experts and historians affirm that the image miraculously imprinted on the *tilma* resulted in the conversion of millions to the Catholic faith.

"The message of Our Lady of Guadalupe helped to build bridges between cultures and worlds and began the transformation of our continent into a Christian continent of hope," said Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, executive producer of the film. "The apparition



HE MIRACLE AND THE MESSAG El Milagro y el Mensaje helped to unite the entire continent in a way that didn't exist before. Through her intercession, then and now, those throughout this hemisphere have found a deep and shared sense of faith, hope and identity."

The image itself has long been puzzling to the scientific community, since it has been shown to exist without having been painted, has survived despite extreme age, adverse conditions and a bombing. The image also exhibits features reminiscent of photographs, such as reflections in the image's eyes, even though it appeared hundreds of years before photography.

The film also dispels popular myths, including that the image's impact does not extend past Mexico's border.

"Some see Our Lady of Guadalupe as a Mexican or as a Latin American, Hispanic phenomenon," said

Supreme Knight Anderson. "However, this understanding is incomplete. Our Lady of Guadalupe is the patroness of all of America and of the Philippines as well. She is loved and embraced across cultural lines throughout this continent and beyond."

<u>REFLECTIONS</u> Lawrence P. Grayson AMERICA'S PUBLIC PRAYER

Thanksgiving is the time when America's religious roots and traditions are publicly displayed. While we think of feasting at tables filled with food and drink, and imagine the Pilgrims in Plymouth Colony inviting neighboring Indians to join them to celebrate a plentiful harvest, Thanksgiving Day has a much more religious meaning. It was not uncommon in the 17^{th} and 18^{th} centuries for individual colonies to set aside days for prayers of gratitude to our Lord.

In 1671, the governing council of Charlestown, Massachusetts proclaimed June 29 "as a day of Solemn Thanksgiving and praise to God for such his Goodness and Favor." Annually from 1777 through 1784, as the American colonists fought for their independence, the Continental Congress issued proclamations each fall, calling for days of "public thanksgiving and praise" and "humble supplication" to Almighty God for his beneficence and mercies. General George Washington, in turn, acted to assure that the troops would observe those days of prayer. In his General Orders of November 30, 1777, he stated, "Thursday the 18th day of December next be set apart for Solemn Thanksgiving and Praise; that at one time, and with one voice, the good people may express the grateful feelings of their hearts, and consecrate themselves to the service of their divine benefactor; and that, together with their sincere acknowledgements and offerings they may join the penitent confession of their sins; and supplications for such further blessings as they stand in need of."

Similar declarations followed. In 1789, the first year of his Presidency, Washington designated Thursday, November 26 as a day for "prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations" both in thanksgiving for his "signal and manifold mercies" and to request him to "pardon our national and other transgressions." President James Madison proclaimed days of prayer and fasting three times during the War of 1812, first to request God's assistance and then to thank him for a successful outcome.

During the Civil War, the Union and Confederate Congresses both called for days of thanksgiving, with Presidents Jefferson Davis and Abraham Lincoln issuing proclamations for military victories. On October 3, 1863, Lincoln urged that the last Thursday of November be observed "as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens" for his "singular deliverances and blessings" and "with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience."

The date for Thanksgiving was not fixed, but left to the President to designate. Since Lincoln selected the last Thursday in November, however, this date became the tradition for succeeding Presidents. In 1939, as the effects of the Depression lingered and with five Thursdays in that November, President Franklin Roosevelt, responding to a request from business leaders for more shopping days before Christmas, selected the next to last Thursday as Thanksgiving. There was significant public umbrage as Roosevelt kept it as this earlier date for the next two years. In 1941, Congress enacted that the holiday would be celebrated, as it currently is, on the fourth Thursday of November. In spite of commercial concerns for moving the date, Roosevelt kept the purpose of Thanksgiving in mind. In 1942, he called on the American people to observe both Thanksgiving and New Year's Day "in prayer, publicly and privately." The following year, in "gratitude to Almighty God," he requested "a nationwide reading of the Holy Scriptures during the period from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas."

The tradition of a national declaration of gratitude to God has continued, with every President since Lincoln issuing a proclamation annually. In 1953, President Eisenhower requested "all of us" to gather on Thanksgiving Day in "our respective places of worship and bow before God in contrition for our sins, in suppliance for wisdom in our striving for a better world, and in gratitude for the manifold blessings He has bestowed upon us and upon our fellow men."

President Reagan, in 1984, urged: "Let us pause from our many activities to give thanks to almighty God for our bountiful harvests and abundant freedoms. Let us call upon Him for continued guidance and assistance in all our endeavors. And let us ever be mindful of the faith and spiritual values that have made our Nation great and that alone can keep us great." In 2004, President George W. Bush wrote: "We are grateful for our freedom, grateful for our families and friends, and grateful for the many gifts of America. On Thanksgiving Day, we acknowledge that all of these things, and life itself, come from the Almighty God." Four years later, he stated: "let us all give thanks to God who blessed our Nation's first days and who blesses us today. May He continue to guide and watch over our families and our country always."

President Barack Obama has continued the tradition, at least ceremonially. Although his proclamations more frequently refer to God obliquely through a statement about George Washington's or Abraham Lincoln's gratitude to the Almighty, or to express gratitude to the Wampanoag Indians for aiding the Pilgrims, in 2013, in his single reference to the Divine, he wrote, "let us lift each other up and recognize, in the oldest spirit of this tradition, that we rise or fall as one Nation, under God."

While these public prayers have been called proclamations of thanksgiving, they have expressed much more than gratitude over the years. As all prayers, they have been used to petition God for assistance, to thank him for his mercy and abundance, to atone for our personal and national sins, and to praise him as the "Lord and Ruler of Nations." These declarations are an overt recognition that while America has a government that neither promotes a given religion nor prohibits the free exercise thereof, belief in God is an integral part of the nation's history, culture and society.

In spite of continuing efforts to remove any reference to God from our public conscience --from our coinage, the Pledge of Allegiance, our schools – the dispositions and traditions of the American people still reflect a religious, indeed a Christian, ethos within which political leaders must govern if they are to achieve their personal aspirations. As long as the people as a whole have not rejected all public reference to God nor abandoned religious practices, and if principles based on religious teachings continue to regulate their societal behavior, it will be possible to maintain a spirit of virtue to advance the well-being of our republic and its populace.

On November 26, we will celebrate Thanksgiving. It will be a day marked by parades with marching bands, floats and balloons, by football games from morning until late evening, by amounts of food and drink that surpass our capacity to consume, and by the beginning of a month-long marketing blitz seeking our consumer dollar. While we enjoy the camaraderie and festivities of the day, do not forget its central purpose – to thank God for His innumerable blessings on us, our families, and our nation. What an expression of Faith it would be if everyone could begin the day with an act of recognition of God, attend Mass, say more than a superficial prayer, and perhaps, just perhaps, decline that extra piece of pie.



Marian Title for November



Kibeho, Rwanda. The Virgin Mary repeatedly appeared to Alphonsine Mumureke, NTHALIE Mukamazimpaka, and Marie Claire Mukangango. The apparition identified herself in the native Rwandan dialect as "Nvina wa Jambo", ("Mother of the Word") which is synonymous to "Mother of God."

The apparitions communicated various messages to the schoolchildren, urging the people to love each other, and warning of an apocalyptic vision of Rwanda descending into violence and hatred, foretelling the 1994 Rwandan Genocide. In 2001 the Holy See released a declaration approving the apparitions. The Marian sanctuary at Kibeho was named "Shrine of Our Lady of Sorrows" in 1992, two years before the genocide. An estimated 500,000 pilgrims visit the site every year.
