

Remember always, We are the Knights of Columbus, We are a People of Life, For Life, Building a Civilization of Love.



The Star Knight Awards was celebrated on Sunday, September 20 and was a blast. Congratulations to PGK Thomas *"Tim"* Matthews and the hard working brothers of the James C. Fletcher, Jr. Council for receiving the Star Council award.

This was a very special month which included a visit from our Holy Father, His Eminence Pope Francis. Attending was your District Deputy and Council brother, ME. It was truly a magnificent event and an honor and privilege to have been selected as a member of the AWD, Honor Guard to process the Bishops and other Clergy to the front of the Altar. Many remarkable and supernatural things happened on that day. There is one event that will be with me forever. A little while before His Holiness arrived the Honor Guard processed the Bishops and Priests to the front of the Altar. Eventually we received the command to sit. We waited.

The sun was beaming and it began to get hot. Something started to move, off in the distance to my right. I looked and focused and to my amazement it was the shadow of the Basilica Dome beginning to move across the front staging area where we were sitting. I looked up towards the sun which was noticeable moving to a position behind the dome as if the



We were suddenly in a protective shade and it was no longer hot. Our Pope was close to the doorstep of the Basilica. Brothers the evening sun has set and a new beginning has arrived with the coming of His Holiness and all of

the Spirit he brought with Him. We had a Holy Mass celebrated in the heart of a baby continent and relatively young government with music carrying Caribbean drums and ethnic ambience to people of all colors and ethnicity worshiping and swaying together to the rhythm. This is what I witnessed in the crowds surrounding the collected Clergy. Accepting each other's ethnicity on all fronts has been as slow as our human shells have allowed Grace to transform skeptical differences into Grace filled compassion and fraternal love regardless of differences.

<u>A Better World, One Council at a Time</u>



This year's 133rd Supreme Convention celebrated new record achievements in charity, membership and insurance.

Taking the podium before 95 archbishops and bishops, 11 cardinals and approximately 2,000 members of the Knights and their families from throughout the globe, the supreme knight began his annual report by announcing the international convention's theme, "Endowed by Their Creator

With Life and Liberty."

"It (the theme) is appropriate since we are meeting in the city of Philadelphia, a city steeped in Catholic history," he said. "My brother Knights, this is the 15th time that I will fulfill my responsibility as supreme knight to report to you on the accomplishments of your Order during the past year. Today, I report to you that the Knights of Columbus has never been stronger and more relevant."

Supreme Knight Carl Anderson noted that the fraternal year ended with \$175 million in donations and over 71.5 million hours of volunteer service.

"Our parishes and neighborhoods are better places today because of the efforts of our nearly 1.9 million members," Supreme Knight Anderson said in referring to the year's record-breaking levels of donations and volunteer service. "We are building a better world, one council at a time."

He also announced that the Order has seen impressive membership growth, especially in its newer territories; Ukraine, Lithuania, Poland and South Korea. This marks the 43rd consecutive year of membership growth, bringing the total number of Knights to 1,883,598. Supreme Knight Anderson explained that this growth, and the growth of the Order throughout the world, could only continue through the personal efforts of each individual Knight. "All of us need to make an extra effort to extend the benefits of membership to more Catholic men, so today I ask every brother Knight to recruit at least three new members this year."

Supreme Knight Anderson also highlighted the Knights of Columbus Christian Refuge Relief Fund, which has already sent more than \$3 million to assist Christians in Syria and Iraq.

"Our dollars provide housing and medical care," he said. "But we can do more. Today, I announce that the Knights of Columbus will redouble our efforts to bring aid to those victims. We will begin a new education campaign to expose the crimes against humanity that are being committed. It is time for a season of truth about what is happening to Christians."

The Supreme Knight then asked the convention attendees to join him in raising crosses, each made from olive wood from Bethlehem, as a show of solidarity for the persecuted Christians.

Supreme Knight Anderson announced that the Knights will be partnering with the group "charity waters" to build 20 new clean water wells in Africa. "As one African priest told us when he heard of our initiative, "Water is life, and I thank the Knights of Columbus for reaching out with this precious gift of life," the supreme knight said.

Finally, in discussing the Order's insurance program, Supreme Knight Anderson said that insurance in force is at \$99 billion, an amount that has more than doubled in the last 12 years, and also that the Order's insurance program has earned A.M. Best rating, A++ (Superior), for the 40th consecutive year.







Where is Christopher Columbus?

This month, we celebrate our namesake Christopher Columbus. But in spite of his accomplishments, not many know of the man. Did you know there is still even a question as to where he is buried?

Columbus died in Valladolid, Spain, on May 20, 1506, at the age of 54. He had suffered through a long terminal illness that first showed symptoms on his third voyage eight years before.

Upon his death, Columbus was initially buried in a small cemetery in Valladolid. Shortly thereafter, his body was moved to Seville. When Columbus' eldest son and heir Diego died in 1526, he was buried beside his father. But Diego's widow petitioned the Spanish court to move both bodies to the cathedral in Santo Domingo on Hispaniola. So the remains of

Columbus were moved across the Atlantic, and were buried under the right side of the altar in the cathedral in Santo Domingo. And there matters stood for two centuries.

In 1795, France captured the island of Hispaniola from Spain. By this time, the Spanish viewed the Admiral's remains as a national treasure, and wanted to prevent their capture by the French at all costs. So, relying on old records, they dug up the remains and removed them to Havana, Cuba. A century later, when Cuba won independence from Spain, the remains were moved again, from Havana back across the ocean to Seville. And so, if you visit the cathedral in Seville today, you will find the tomb of Columbus.

But that's not the whole story. In 1877, workers were restoring the cathedral in Santo Domingo and found, under the left side of the altar, a box containing human remains. The box bore Columbus's name. It immediately became clear to some that the "left" and "right" sides of the altar depend entirely upon the direction one is facing. And therefore, some argue, the body that had been moved to Havana in 1795 was really that of Diego, while the Admiral's remains had been in Santo Domingo all along. And so, if you visit the cathedral in Santo Domingo to-

Meanwhile, one historian has argued that the wrong body was moved from Havana to Seville, and therefore, Columbus's remains are really in Havana. And another historian argues that Columbus's re-

mains never left Valladolid! Furthermore, portions of the remains in Seville were given to the city of Genoa in 1892 as part of the quadric-centennial celebration.

Recently, Spanish scientists tried DNA analysis to answer the question. As it turned out, DNA was not even necessary: a cursory examination of the bones in Seville showed that they must have been those of Columbus's sickly son Diego, not the Admiral himself. So the discoverer's final resting place is probably in Santo Domingo after all.

REFLECTIONS Lawrence P. Grayson Selective Enforcement is Persecution

Mike Huckabee, former governor of Arkansas and presidential aspirant, recently asked why the government is willing to make religious accommodations to Muslims detained at Guantanamo Bay's military prison, but not to Christian county clerks who abide by their faith.

Kim Davis, the subject of his concern, is the clerk of Rowan County, Kentucky. After the Supreme Court legalized same-sex marriages, she refused to issue marriage licenses for such unions. Her faith holds that same-sex marriages violate God's law. Even though religious freedom is the first of this nation's explicitly stated constitutional rights and the Kentucky state constitution, which she swore to uphold, defines marriage as only the union of one man and one woman, Davis was jailed.

While bakers, photographers, caterers, and others in weddingrelated industries have been fined for following their consciences and not supporting what they consider sin, Davis is the first to be imprisoned for her Christian beliefs.

Similarly, in May 2014, when a federal court ruling made same-sex marriage legal in Oregon, Marion County Judge Vance Day felt that he could not perform these ceremonies because of his religious tenets. He instructed his staff to refer same-sex couples seeking to marry to other judges. Last fall, he stopped performing weddings altogether. Now he is being investigated by a judicial fitness commission, in part because he acted on his religious beliefs.

The plight of these individuals reveals how the legalization of same-sex marriage and penalties for non-adherence are leading to crises of conscience for Christians. In contrast, significant tolerance has been shown to people of non-Christian faiths. A large and growing number of cases illustrate the differences in treatment.

At Guantanamo Bay, both men and women serve as guards. Several Muslim men, who are high-value detainees -- one of whom was an al-Qaida leader and others who are reputed to have been involved with the September 11 attacks -- have objected to having female soldiers shackle and escort them when they leave their cells because Islam teaches that a Muslim man can only have physical contact with women who are related to him. A judge initially banned the use of female guards, but earlier this year rescinded the order based on the Pentagon's gender nondiscrimination policies.

In another recent case, Lt. Cmdr. Wesley Modder, a Pentecostal military chaplain for over 19 years, may be discharged from the Navy for cause. He has been charged with counseling sailors, in accord with his religious beliefs, against homosexuality and premarital sex. It is claimed that he is "unable to function in the diverse and pluralistic environment" of the modern Navy, even though he has consistently received glowing fitness reports and a recent letter of commendation that referred to him as the "best of the best."

The U.S. military, where uniformity and standards of dress and grooming have long been considered important to unit cohesion, is changing regulations to accommodate a variety of religious beliefs and practices. Under a recently changed Department of Defense Directive, Muslim service members can request to wear a beard and carry prayer beads; Wiccans can seek to carry "magic" wands; Jews can get permission to wear a yarmulke while in uniform; Sikhs can have long hair; tattoos can be allowed as religious body art; and piercings through the skin or body parts may be permitted. Even with these changes, a Sikh advocacy group has complained that the accommodations are not guaranteed, but must be requested. Hence, commanders can still deny them the opportunity to wear their religiously-mandated turbans and beards while in uniform.

Last year, a cadet at the U.S. Air Force Academy posted a biblical verse on a whiteboard outside of his room. The Military Religious Freedom Foundation, an organization devoted to keeping the military free of religious expression, filed a complaint. Although the whiteboard was for the cadet's personal use and the quotation did not violate Air Force regulations, authorities quickly had the verse taken down. The militant foundation said that the Bible verse created a hostile atmosphere by elevating one religion, Christianity, over others represented at the academy.

The Defense Department also has begun to grant exceptions to a longstanding policy that bars military troops from wearing uniforms in public parades. In July 2012, it allowed troops to wear their uniforms in the San Diego LGBT Pride parade. About 350 service members marched, some waiving rainbow flags. When the military contingent stopped at an intersection, a Navy senior chief dropped to his knee and proposed to his boyfriend, who accepted. In another gay pride parade, two male service members held hands as they marched.

In April 2014, members of the Missouri National Guard were invited to attend an event at a local Baptist church at which children were to thank them – as well as firefighters, police and other rescuers -- for their dedication and service in protecting this country and its religious freedom. They did not attend, citing a military regulation that prohibits their participation in any religious or ideologically-related event. Yet, a month earlier a military color guard was allowed to march in the Washington, DC gay pride parade.

Selective enforcement of policies and regulations that discriminate against Christian-related events, beliefs and actions is persecution. The nation has made religious accommodation to prisoners who are being tried for killing over 3,000 American civilians, to long-standing military dress policies to allow turbans, beards and magic wands, and to permit uniformed military to march in gay pride parades, but will not accommodate a county clerk, a cadet posting a Bible verse, or a Christian chaplain counseling sailors, each acting in accord with his or her religious beliefs.

Governor Huckabee stated that what has happened to Kim Davis is an example of the current "criminalization of Christianity." While not yet universal, a trend is developing. Christians are being penalized for living their faith in the public square.

If this movement is to be stopped, the Catholic Church must be in the vanguard with strong and visible opposition. It must begin with its own members, undertaking a major effort to catechize Catholics to the Faith. Large and growing numbers of them do not agree with the Church's teachings on contraception, cohabitation, same-sex marriage, abortion, and remarriage without an annulment. The bishops and priests must develop and lead a core of Catholics who believe in and live the Faith. There must be a Church Militant in deed, as well as in word.

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Marian Title for October Our Lady of the Pillar



According to tradition, on January 2, 40 AD, in the early days of the Church, James the Greater, one of the original Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ, was evangelizing the Gospel in what was then the pagan land of Caesaraugusta, now Zaragoza. He was disheartened with his mission, making little progress having only few converts who had been traveling with him. In his despair, while praying by the banks of Ebro River, Mother Mary miraculously appeared before him and his group, comforting him and promised to help.

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Mary gave him a column or pillar

as a symbol, being carried by angels with an image of the Mother on top. James was instructed to build a chapel on the spot where Mary left the pillar, a place where she and the pillar would dwell forever; so that by the grace of God, will marvel those who believed and asked in their hour of need.

James returned to Jerusalem after establishing the church in Zaragoza and was ordered beheaded in 44 AD by King Herod Agrippa I. The land he left eventually became believers of Christ through the works of his disciples.

This is believed to be the very first apparition of Mary, and the only one before her assumption. Mary was still living in Jerusalem at that time, and was believed to have appeared to James through bilocation. The church established by St. James is the very first church dedicated to Mother Mary in the history of Roman Catholicism.
