He used the power of words and acts of nonviolent resistance, such as protests, grassroots organizing, and civil disobedience to achieve seemingly-impossible goals. He went on to lead similar campaigns against poverty and international conflict, always maintaining fidelity to his principles that men and women everywhere, regardless of color or creed, are equal members of the human family.

January 18 begins a week of prayer for Christian Unity and January 23 is a day of prayer for the legal protection of the unborn child. It is my hope and wish that 2017 will be filled with peace and joy for each of you and that we work together respecting the dignity of everyone and work for peace in every one's life. I also want to congratulate our Knight of the Month for December Nick Pollmann and our Family of the Month, the Cliff Grammich, Sr. Family and thank them for all they do for our Council.
