### Message From The Grand Knight

Mike Joseph Asks: Are You Reaching Out To The Volunteer-Minded? Active Men Make Excellent Candidates; You Need A Plan, A Pitch, A Hook

As I prepared for work one morning, it struck me that the best recruitment opportunity for the Knights is one I've thought of before, but failed to follow up

on. We have three parishes under our wings and yet not every male communicant is a Knights of Columbus member. Why not? More striking: we don't have as Knights all who volunteer at St. Francis, St. Mary's and St. Martin's. Here are men dedicated to assisting the Church as Eucharistic ministers, lectors, ushers, choir members, special projects leaders, or parish council members, among the many roles they serve. Men who volunteer are unafraid of stepping in. Men with charitable hearts know how to fit commitment into their lives, while serving their family and working long hours to provide for them.

Knights ought to be like these men (many already are, I know), helping their parishes in visible ways. But if, like these men, you're a volunteer, you should be approachable. You should have something to say about the Knights, and be able to share why these untapped brothers should join, to feed their heart, their friendships, their families, *and* their Church.

We need something in the church bulletins, always, about the Knights, and we need volunteers speaking in front of the church (after obtaining permission from their pastors, also Knights) for volunteers. But let's show by example that Knights are leaders in charitable and Church activities. As **Past Grand Knight David Ball** once asked: Can we wear our KoC nametags to church? Or to a church function, to invite conversation from those who aren't Knights, but who have a Knightly leaning?

**You should always have your "elevator speech" ready,** a 30-second mouthful, a pitch, that allows you, after striking up a friendship, to ask and counter any question and to detail benefits of being a Knight, as if you were on an elevator and were going to part ways at the 8<sup>th</sup> floor. You may ask: "Did you ever think of becoming a Knight?" If his reply is, "I'm already doing stuff for the Church, I have no time for you guys," say, "Fine, OK. Just keep doing stuff, but represent as a Knight, and add a few meetings a year at Father Cuddy Hall and some hours selling Tootsie Rolls. We have so many other benefits! Come to Family Dinners—no one will need to cook at home that night, and you might find yourself spending more time with your Knightly brothers than you thought. You'll be among friends, great men, even men you want to understudy. Do you know we have two professional chefs? I'll bet your wife would *love it* if you stepped up in the kitchen!"

### That's an elevator speech!

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benefit of Montgomery Council 2323, which brings us together on two Lenten Fridays, are coming up. **Read in this issue about Past Grand Knights Tom Reilly,** a retired police officer, and **William Lander,** a retired FBI agent, also a founder of Father Cuddy Hall. In fact, brother Lander is the oldest living PGK—*Happy Birthday*—he turns 90 on Jan. 23! (Brother Reilly turns 85 April 19.) See what *they* have to say about the Order and why being a Knight is even more important than in their day: Membership allows young family men to feel fulfilled in their Faith while fighting the greater temptations of the time. Another talking point! The Knights offer something men have long sought, a way to live out their Faith, while protecting their virtue and that of their family, staying true to their wives and children. Knighthood indeed.

**My friends, my brothers, let's not place our light,** our nametag, under a bushel, but make it shine front-and-center in our conversations. Don't be afraid to ask a friend in Faith, a fellow parishioner: *Have you considered becoming a Knight of Columbus?*

# What's YOUR "Elevator Speech" To Win Someone Over As A Knight?

"Listen in" on this conversation ...

Bill: "Hey Mike, how's it going?"

Mike: "Great. How's your wife and kids?"

Bill: "Keeping busy, that's for sure."

**Mike:** "Hey, Bill, I know I've mentioned it, but please consider coming over to Father Cuddy Hall for a Family Night in Lent. We fry fish two Friday nights, and you could feed your family of seven for about \$25. We sponsor a Spaghetti Dinner night, too—just \$35 for a family—and I know kids love pasta. From the proceeds, folks in Haiti get medical treatment and supplies. I've been thinking about your kids—do you know Knights at the local, state and national levels offer high school and college scholarships?" **Bill:** "I didn't know that!"

**Mike:** "And Bill, we have family and youth sports activities, like a free-throw contest coming up, with prizes. Your kids play basketball. Wouldn't it be cool to see them compete at the state championship?" **Bill:** "That sounds great."

**Mike:** "Why not come to dinner? I can share more about the benefits—there are many—I'm certain they'd help you as a dad preparing for the future. We don't ask for lots of time, just some, and you and your family will appreciate any event because we always try to make them fun."

Bill: "Thanks Mike, great—I'll check with my wife and we'll plan on seeing you at the Spaghetti Dinner!"

**To craft your own elevator speech,** don't exceed 200 words or 60 seconds. Less can be more. A 30-second speech often is more effective than a longer one.

- **Hook them with something** that interests them.
- Be simple and clear in language. Use humor. Use powerful, visual, descriptive words and phrases. *Make the pitch memorable*.
- Call them to action, and share how Knights membership will specifically impact their lives, and their loved one's lives.
- > Practice what you intend to say to deliver it smoothly.

### <u>Chaplain's Chat</u> Every Life A Gift: KofC Encourages Rosary Novena, Annual March For Unborn By Fr. John J. Dillon



I hope every Council member and his family prays a Rosary novena from Jan. 14-22 in anticipation of the  $42^{nd}$  anniversary of the infamous *Roe v*. *Wade* decision legalizing abortion. I encourage Council members to take action and support a culture that values human life at every stage.

**Quoting liberally from the Knights of Columbus** article "A People of Life and For Life," I remind my fellow Knights that the Order remains firmly committed to defending the right to life of every human being, from conception to natural death. As featured in the last *Courier*, one of the Knights' most successful efforts, with state and local Councils partnering with Supreme, is sharing the cost of ultrasound machines for pregnancy centers. This way, mothers and fathers can see their own child in the womb.

### The Knights of Columbus advocate that you:

- Volunteer. Your time can save lives. Contact your local pro-life pregnancy center to see how you can help women choose life, and turn from abortion. Support programs help women physically and emotionally wounded by abortion.
- Educate. Share knowledge with others who may not fully understand the value of all human life, or find out more yourself to be a more effective witness for life.
- Advocate. Work to change laws, and touch hearts. Support your Council's prolife committee, start or join your parish pro-life group. Consult your archdiocesan pro-life office to discover issues; write/meet elected officials to discuss legislation.
- Donate. Your donation or that of your Council could make a difference in the shoestring budgets of pro-life groups. Arrange regular donations to pregnancy centers to help with counseling services, medical referrals and items for newborns.
- Pray. Prayer is the power that should support all pro-life activities. Pray on your own for life, and with your family. Besides the mothers, pray for the fathers of these children, who strongly influence decisions to end lives through abortion. The Council should include prayers for life at regular meetings and take part in the annual Day of the Unborn Child on the Feast of the Annunciation.

**The annual March for Life in Washington, D.C.**—with the theme of "Every Life is a Gift"—will be held at 1 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 22. A rally starts at noon. It commemorates the anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's *Roe v. Wade* decision that legalized abortion Jan. 22, 1973. All Knights and their families, particularly those in the greater Washington, D.C. area, are urged to join. Knights should carry Council banners and KofC posters, wear jackets with the KofC emblem, and walk together to show the Order's support for the right to life.

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Knights are urged to schedule prayer services for unborn children at government monuments or participate in other appropriate activities. Invite parish pro-life groups and similar organizations to attend or co-sponsor planned activities. # Officer Profile: Deputy Grand Knight Michael E. Bean 18 Years Preps Him To Be 2<sup>nd</sup> Gen Grand Knight

Mike joined the Knights in 1996 after his father passed away at the age of 74. In 1968, John Bean was sworn in as Grand Knight of Montgomery Council 2323. Some 37 years later, in June, his son hopes to join him in sharing that honor.

"If elected, I think I'll be the second or third Grand

Knight to follow his dad," says the Deputy Grand Knight, who has served the KofC in various roles since getting his First Degree April 2, 1996. "PGK Ron Dunn asked me to join to get involved with the softball team," he says. Since then, Mike joined the Knights Building Corp.; he's a director overseeing Hall maintenance.

Mike turned 54 on Dec. 31, so has stopped playing basketball but continues on the diamond. He plays outfield, keeping up with the younger guys, if not in speed, with a veteran's

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knowledge of the game. Mike's involved with the Shrimp Feast and Spaghetti Dinners and helps in the kitchen at many events. Along with other brother Knights, including Pat Gilroy, he started Family Night about seven years ago to raise money for Catholic charities.

**Mike, his two sisters and four brothers** (one, Chris, passed away) grew up among Knights. He remembers Knights of his dad's generation getting together frequently for worthy causes, particularly a Charity Ball his dad helped start that raised significant proceeds for the blind. John Bean participated in KofC parties and fundraisers into his retirement years. Years earlier, he played softball with the Knights. Mike fondly remembers watching him on the field.



### Dec. 5 KofC Family Night Raises \$1,271 About 115 men, women and children chowed

down on chicken and more at the Family Night Dec. 5. With help from The Family Night Team, guests were served chicken breasts, chicken nuggets, French fries, salad, and baby carrots. They also were able to visit the baked potato bar with fixin's. Beer, soda and dessert were included, all for \$10 per person or \$25 per family. The proceeds will go toward municipal Christmas toy drives in Rockville and Gaithersburg. The kids decorated gingerbread cookies on tables set up by Master Chef Guy Poirier. The crowd enjoyed the annual crazy Christmas carols competition (above), run by Pat and Karen Gilroy. Back then, the team would play other Councils, then visit the hosting Council's hall for a post-game lunch.

Mike was baptized at St. Mary's Church, went to school there and married his wife, Michelle, there. His daughter Melissa (a University of Maryland junior) and son Michael (an Our Lady of Good Counsel High School senior), went to school there and were baptized there. Mike, a former corporate IT pro, now works in commercial construction sales. Mike says if he does get installed as Grand Knight, he'd continue current programs and focus on getting inactive Knights more involved.

**"It is what you make of it,"** he says. "We have a beautiful Council here with a commercial kitchen and 10 acres of land. We need to get more use of the Hall. I remember when my parents were active, they'd have real 'barn burners,' with bands, DJs—150 people decked out for parties."

**"We have plenty of members** and activities, over 300 members, we just need to get people involved," he says. "Imagine if only a third showed up to a meeting? Picture a packed house." He likes Mike Joseph's idea to mentor new members; he himself has earned a gold shield for bringing in more than 10 new guys. "We're trying to get in younger families with Family Night. Over those years, we've raised close to \$30,000. It's for Knights and non-Knights."

**The Deputy Grand Knight** looks forward to taking the gavel, but until then, will happily and generously provide his Grand Knight all the assistance he needs ... just as Mike always has. **Past Grand Knights were celebrated** Nov. 22, including William Lander (PGK, 1964-65), who with Tom Reilly (PGK, 1979-80) make up the most senior contingent of Knights Council 2323 leaders. Both men spoke with the *Courier* about why they joined the Knights of Columbus and why they feel that being a member of the largest Catholic men's fraternal organization in the world is a magnificent asset.

### <u>Q&A: William Lander</u>

If you ever see a man with orange-tinted glasses selling Tootsie Rolls outside Our Lady of Grace chapel in Leisure World, in Silver Spring, Md., say hello, as that's retired FBI Agent William Lander, a Past Grand Knight who celebrates his 50<sup>th</sup> PGK anniversary this year. Bill is legally blind.

**Besides Bill's contributions to our Council, he has helped our Nation,** working in foreign counter-intelligence and espionage, including the high-profile **William Henry Whalen** case. Lt. Col. Whalen was the highest-ranking American ever recruited as a Russian Intelligence Service mole. When arrested, Whalen was intelligence advisor to the U.S. Army Chief of Staff. He admitted passing documents revealing our nation's most carefully guarded secrets, including nuclear weapons deployment and the country's nuclear retaliation plan. He was convicted and because he cooperated, was given a light sentence; six years imprisonment.

**Q:** So that really was you outside Our Lady of Grace, helping sell Tootsie Rolls? A: "Yes, that was me. I've sold Tootsie Rolls since the start of that program."

**Q:** You celebrate your 50th Anniversary as Grand Knight over this Fraternal Year? A: "Yes, I do. Funny, too, when I was Grand Knight, my wife and I had our fourth child that same *Continued Next Page ...*  year. We were building the Hall, and I was on the building committee, so I was instrumental in getting it built. It was finished in 1965. I remember Bishop John Spence came out and dedicated it."

### Q: What was it like when you were Grand Knight?

A: "When I was Grand Knight, we had 15 couples who attended everything. We instituted a group of dinners, we called them 'Around-the-World Dinners,' and they had different dishes—Italian, Polish, German. I was a 'choppa-roppa.' I chopped carrots and vegetables."

### Q: Why did you join the Knights?

A: "I joined at the same time as another agent in the Washington field office of the FBI. He said, 'Bill, something is missing, we don't have a club we can join and become active in as Catholic men.' The acting Grand Knight lived a block away, so we asked him."

### Q: Why should men these days join the Knights of Columbus?

A: "Because it's exactly what young people nowadays need. If they'd join and be active in the Knights, they would find fulfillment of their Faith. Which is really what we need. Particularly now. Back in the 1950s, everything was conservative. Now, it's so liberal, and there are so many temptations, which we didn't have."

### Q: What's the key to success at the Knights?

A: "You have to devote time to the Knights. You have to involve your family—they are part of it, much more today than in my day. The wives have, in some places, their own auxiliary. And you need to involve the youngsters—it's all good for them, and to get them athletically involved, too."

### Q&A: 70m Reilly

**Tom became a Knight in 1968 and the Council's Grand Knight in 1979.** He'll turn 85 this year on April 19. He was a Washington, D.C. policeman for 24 years and retired on disability; his says his knees gave out. He ran to Tootsie Roll program for about five years and often visited western Maryland to get other Councils to start their own programs.

### Q: What do you feel was your most significant achievement as Grand Knight?

A: "Working on the Tootsie Roll program, getting it established, boosting it from a small amount to \$10,000 a year. Also, with a lot of people working on it, we built Father Cuddy Hall."

### Q: What would you have like to have done, that you didn't get to do?

A: "I always thought we should have sent more to the KofC magazine. We were very active in fundraisers, and we never recorded them. I felt bad that no one dropped a line to *Columbia* about X dollars for this or that, or a program that was an advantage to seniors. We were so busy doing things, we did no publicity."

### Q: Why should young family men today join?

A: "It has to be an incentive within him to keep friendships with fellow Catholics and to get into the insurance program—there's a lot of coverage you can get. And there are lots of educational programs available—you can get money for college for you or your kids."

# **Mike Thomas is about to do it again:** *spoil all our waistlines.* It will be his 16<sup>th</sup> annual spaghetti dinner. (He has only missed one, the year he had a heart attack. But the ticker is going strong and so is Mike.) He's pulling out the stops for the Feb. 8 event, already having obtained 50 pounds of pasta with a donated gift card.

The annual Spaghetti Dinner will support St. Francis of Assisi's Medical Mission to Haiti. The Mission is in need of funds for prescription drugs, medications, vitamins, medical supplies, equipment, a nurse's salary, and patients' hospital expenses. Medical teams buy the items and ship them to Haiti.

Mike says all your eating has raised \$27,342 over time. He also hopes, as in previous years, to offer a 50-50 and a raffled basket from Trader Joe's. Last year, with 175 attendees, \$2,127 was raised for the Mission. Mike knows we can do better this year.

He typically doesn't have to spend anything for the food, either, obtaining donations from Giant, Safeway, Food Lion, Target, Harvest Bread, Harris Teeter and other stores, first starting with a letter explaining the fundraiser and following up. Last year, the folks at Harris Teeter asked, "What do you need?" Mike said: "Meatballs." They asked: "How many?" Mike: "One thousand?" And he got every one. And *you* ate them. Every one.

He says he has his system down, waiting for sales to buy the items, as most places give him a gift card.

**On Sunday, Feb, 8, dinner will be served from 3-7 p.m. at** Father Cuddy Hall. Dinner includes spaghetti with sauce and meatballs, salad, bread, sodas, beer and wine. The cost is \$10 for adults (ages 14 and up), \$7 for children (ages 7 to 13), and no charge for children 6 and younger. The most a family will pay is \$35.
