Chaplain's Reflection Invisible Powers

The coronavirus lockdown has been a difficult experience for all of us. For even the oldest among us, this is our first experience with a global pandemic. Not since the Cold War and the Cuban missile crisis in 1962 has the possibility of premature death loomed so strongly. It is very unsettling. It is a powerful reminder of what our faith constantly reminds us of, that we are not in control.

As a country, we Americans don't like being ruled by something or someone else. We didn't want a king so we fought the Revolutionary War to claim our independence. We fought World Wars I and II to free others and to keep ourselves free from dictators. Since World War II, we have fought to keep ourselves free, and to free others, from communism. But the coronavirus has proven to be a different kind of enemy. How do you fight an enemy you can't see? How do you fight an invisible enemy?

One reaction has often been to fight each other. Initially, we blamed the president and the State Department and the "spy agencies." Why didn't they know? Some have even asked, "Where were *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal* with all their investigative reporters?" We have lots of questions and few answers.

Gradually, however, we have discovered that blaming and fighting with each other helps no one. Far better to fight the virus itself. And we have discovered that the enemy is not completely invisible. Under intense magnification we can see the virus. We can help patients to battle and survive it.

Our best defense is to not get the virus. That's why we are all encouraged to shelter in place. The more we can isolate from each other, the less likely we will infect each other. Even with all of the precautions being taken by our parishes, there will still exist some risk of infection for anyone who attends a public Mass because a church cannot be "perfectly" cleaned and sanitized any more than any other public space. Hence, the continued dispensation from the Sunday Mass obligation.

Nonetheless, being still is not easy for most of us because we are social creatures meant to live in community. But it becomes easier when we realize that we are
