#### Chaplain Fr. Matthew Simmons



As I was driving north to Pennsylvania last week, I spent the night in Charlottesville, Virginia. With its main campus in Charlottesville, the University of Virginia is proud of its connection to President Thomas Jefferson. A tour-guide spoke frequently of Jefferson's honing his political views during his time in France during the Age of Enlightenment. I am a fan of the Constitution of the United States. I also have enough respect for Jefferson's intellect not to believe that he embraced everything attributed to him by the enlightened tour-guide.

The French philosophers were pushing back against the French monarchy of their time. The English monarchy did not, at that time, have as much power as the French monarchy. And there is a long distance between London and Virginia. While the American colonies might have protested taxation without representation, they were not in the same situation as France. Jefferson would have been more objective than Voltaire and Rousseau.

A Catholic political understanding takes one back not just to the Bible but to the same time in Greece - 2000 years before the French & American Revolutions. The Angelic Doctor St. Thomas Aquinas echoed Aristotle in saying that truth is an adequation between reality and the intellect. Despite what one might hear today, there is no such thing as "my truth." Human beings can know the truth. But objectivity is extremely elusive, especially in the realm of politics. There was a local politician in Brookhaven nicknamed "Truthmaster." I laughed out loud the first time I saw his poster and said I would never vote for anyone with that name. Truth is something to be respected not mastered. As we celebrate the 4th of July, we remember that, for this country to function, her citizens must have knowledge and virtue. The bishops of the US planned another "Fortnight for Freedom" leading up to the 4th. I didn't say anything about it ahead of time because I figured that those who care are already praying for our country.

This country was built by people with a faith rooted in the revelation of God in Jesus Christ. Freedom is not an abundance of choices. Freedom is the ability to choose the best. Why would anyone need other choices if he can choose the best? Pray that we continue to have the good of serving Jesus Christ available for all to choose.

# Special on Youth from Dave Klut3, DGK



Last month the Youth Group completed the Catholic Heart Work Camp trip. For those of you who haven't heard of CHWC, let me explain what happens. We traveled to Memphis early Sunday morning. After checking into our rooms for the week we went to Mass and attended our first night of praise of worship.

First, let me explain about our rooms. We shared a classroom with the youth group from Kansas. You heard me right, we spent the week sleeping on the floors in the classrooms of St. Benedict High School. Every day we awoke a 6:00, ate break-fast, went to daily mass, and then went off to our work sites. There were 30 different groups that worked all over Memphis. Each group is created from different youth groups, so you worked with people you have never met before. Our youth worked on everything from a soup kitchen, to a food distribution center, to a girls/boys club, a Birth Right office, and a few of us worked at homes of people that needed repairs or painting of their homes.

We worked all day until we returned at 4:00 P.M. Then it was dinner and showers. After cleaning up and eating we attended a nightly spiritual retreat. Each night was different: we had an outdoor adoration, a night for Reconciliation and prayers, a concert, and each night we prayed the Rosary and got together with our own group. After that we had an hour to relax until bed at 10:30. Then we started the next day all over again. We did this for the entire week. It was such a wonderful experience and I thank the Knights for helping to sponsor this very important event. We also looked fantastic in our matching shirts. Thanks again for providing those. I will wear mine often to help me remember this incredible spiritual trip. I am so looking forward to going back next year!

Our next event is July 8-11th when we will travel to Atlanta to attend the Steubenville Youth Conference. This is a weekend event sponsored by Franciscan University of Steubenville. It is a Franciscan led, Christ-centered, sacrament-soaked, prayer fueled immersion in Catholic teachings on leadership, evangelization, and discipleship inspired by the life and witness of St. Francis of Assisi. Their leadership philosophy is based on the foundation that youth leadership flows from a personal relationship with Christ. Therefore, they first give teens the tools to grow closer in their relationship with Jesus and then give them the essentials for servant leadership and evangelization. So please remember to pray for us this weekend.

We also wished Noelle "Godspeed" as he started his service with the US Marine Corps on June 13th.


