SEMINARIAN PROFILE

Wisman Simeon is a man with a quiet and pensive demeanor. But, beneath that reflective façade, he is perhaps one of the most interesting seminarians one could meet. Born and raised on the island of Haiti as the second of two children, he was introduced to the faith from the very beginning of his life.

"My mother was a seriously devout Catholic," Simeon recalled with a smile, "she loved her faith and made sure to share it with her children." Every week, Wisman's mother would wake him up to altar serve at the 4am Mass and although he would fuss about going at such an early hour, his dissatisfaction would quickly fade at the site of the pastries

waiting for him outside the front door of the church after the liturgy.

Wisman was 11 years old when he first started thinking about the priesthood. He would organize pretend church services in his room and soon got the nickname "*Ti- Pe*" or "Little Priest" from the other children. It was around this time that he became a Boy Scout and, later as a teenager, joined the *Kairo* youth movement, a Catholic retreat program dedicated to deepening the spirituality of teens and young adults.

As a young man, Wisman chose to enter medical school. However, the calling he felt on his heart for the priesthood continued to grow

more intense. Overall, he kept his priestly aspirations to himself until, at the age of twenty-one, he decided to share the idea with his mother. It was not as well received as he expected.

"You are too young to make that decision," she said with motherly jest, "it would be better for you to finish medical school so that, if you decide to leave seminary, you will have a career to support you." It was a difficult decision, but Wisman stayed in medical school out of obedience to his mother's wishes. He pensively explained how such a decision challenged him, "It was very tough. I had trouble focusing on studies because I was constantly thinking about the priesthood. I often thought of dropping out."

Wisman eventually graduated medical school in 2002 and became a licensed practitioner of medicine in Gonaives, Haiti. He got a job in social services with the government of Haiti before being employed as a resident physician for an Anglican mission hospital. Simultaneously, Wisman began working at a Catholic pharmaceutical dispensary run by the Little Brothers of St. Therese of Lisieux. When asked to share his favorite part of practicing medicine, Wiseman immediately replied, "Delivering children! There is nothing like holding a crying child in your arms and hearing them take their first breaths. You know God has brought new life into the world."

However, despite all his beautiful experiences as a doctor and the lucrative revenue he received, Wisman felt he was not fulfilling the vocation to which God had called him.

"I felt as if I had a hole in my heart," Wiseman stated, "I knew that I had to become a priest."

Finally, on August 18th 2009, he decided to leave Haiti and join the seminary in the United States. Many people wondered why he left Haiti in the first place, not understanding that, in the Haitian Church, there is no concept of a "late" priestly vocation. Since Wisman was older than most men entering seminary in Haiti, he chose to come to America. Thus, he began applying to become a seminarian for the Diocese of Palm Beach. In November of the same year. he visited St. John Vianney



College-Seminary in Miami for a weekend of retreat and discernment, an experience which solidified his decision to stay in the United States and serve the Catholic Church in the state of Florida.

On March 17th 2010, he was formally accepted as a seminarian by Bishop Gerald M. Barbarito and immediately started taking classes to

learn English at Barry University, entering the minor seminary shortly thereafter. In May of 2012, Wisman Simeon received his Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy from St. John Vianney College-Seminary and in August of the same year was accepted for further priestly formation in his home Diocese of Palm Beach at St. Vincent de Paul Regional Seminary, where he currently resides as a theologian in his second year of study. He hopes to be ordained in three years' time.



Before the close of his interview for this article, Wisman had this to say: "To all of the people who are reading this article, I would like to say that it is never too late to embrace your vocation and when you do find it, you will be filled with joy," and to those who are parents to potential priests, "when you have a child who chooses to do something in the Church, do not try to block them. Give freedom to your children to serve and love God's people."
