

A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAPLAIN, **REVEREND MARTIN VALLELY**

Dear Brothers.

In this month of June. we are rejoicing that our Holy Rosary parishioner and Brother Knight, Paul Edmondstone, is being ordained a

Deacon. This will be the final major step in his journey towards ordination as a priest next May. Please know that all are warmly invited to the ceremony, in which five men will be ordained Deacons. This will take place at the Cathedral Basilica of Christ the King in Hamilton, on Thursday, June 20th, at 7:00 P.M. Pray for Deacon-Elect Paul, and for the others: and prav for many more to rise up and respond to the call of the Lord to serve him worthily as priests and deacons in his Church, in these challenging times.

Over the past year, we have been looking at different parts of the Bible, and it will not be long before our introductory series will be drawing to a close. I wanted to pause this month to just note that, as you will surely have observed if you have sampled different parts of the Bible, it is an extraordinarily rich and varied collection of widely differing types of literature. We sometimes fall into the misconception of assuming that every part of the Bible is like every other part, since it appears to us to be one big book. And since it is routinely called "The Word of God", we might assume it is basically all one continuous sermon.

But there are many kinds of writing. Yes, there are sermons and other exhortation-type writings, especially in the Letters of Paul and others. But there are also histories, reminiscences, genealogies, comedies. tragedies, dramas, fantasies, myths, parables and allegories and even things in the Bible do not seem to be particularly

word-cartoons. There is poetry, proverb, advicegiving; there are legal codes, eye-witness reports, soaring dreams and recounting of visions, philosophical reflections, and love songs. There are cooking lessons, construction plans, obituaries and laments, greeting cards, prophecies of things to come, and apocalyptic forecasts of the end of all things. And of course there are proclamations of the mighty deeds of God, most notably in Gospels. Even within different sections of one book, you can find a variety of styles, maybe even evidence of a variety of authors, all under one title. The Bible is quite literally a work with "something for everyone". Or, as the word "Bible" implies, it is not a book, but a whole library.

And it is important that we make an effort to read the different types of writing in a manner that respects the differences in style and intent. Think of a newspaper. You don't read every part of the newspaper the same way. You don't read the news reports on the front pages the same way you read the editorial page and opinion columns. You don't read the comic strips the same way you read the sports scores. Everything you read calls for its own way of being examined. Reading something the wrong way leads to lots of trouble. Remember that, while reading the Bible is wonderful, it is work. We never embark on it without prayer first, and lots of We ask God to show us what his humility. distinctive truth is in every page, every word. God can use anything, even the sad recounting of his people's infidelities and sins, in order to reach our hearts and to teach us his truth.

This might be a good time to mention two particularly vexing aspects of the Bible, which have been causing a lot of trouble through the ages, and maybe especially in our own times.

melodramas, One is the fact, already alluded to above, that many

edifying, uplifting, or heroic. Sometimes people are scandalized by reading further into the texts---they had sort of assumed the Bible would be "purer" than it often is. For example, how could God condone a lot of the horrible violence we read about in so many places? A short answer: remember that the Bible is not only about what God has done, it is also about our response to what God has done. It portrays, in all its splendor and all its messiness, the relationship between God and ourselves. Like any family relationship or history, it has its dark parts. And sometimes Biblical figures have presumed that their decisions and actions were supported by God, but a more careful reading reveals that God was only permitting some things, not encouraging or even initiating them as had been assumed. In some ways, the scandalous parts of the Bible can actually be oddly comforting. Their presence shows us that God is not afraid to be in the midst of our messiness. They reveal how patient God is with us, and how he has revealed himself gradually over time, in keeping with our capacities to grasp him. He walks with us every step of the way, like a loving parent with a growing child.

The other aspect is the disturbing sense one gets that the Bible contradicts modern scientific discoveries, and seems to portray a primitive and discredited understanding of the universe and how it works. This "well, it's either the Bible or science" conflictdilemma is exactly what has in our time turned many people, notably many young people, completely away from religion and even from belief in God. Again, not an easy matter to address. Short answer: it is a false contradiction. No one is asking that you choose between the Bible and science. The same Holy Spirit is the author of both, and God does not contradict himself. This is why it is so important to learn how to "read" the Bible, and its various kinds of writings, as I mentioned above. The Bible is not a science textbook, nor is it pretending to be one. The truths God is teaching us through the Scriptures are not so much the "what, where, when and how" truths, but rather are the "why" truths. Once we really grasp that, things begin to fall into place better, and the seeming contradictions prove

themselves to be very much in harmony. Faith and reason are always meant to work together, like two wings with which to rise to wisdom. Much more can be said on this. I refer you to Bishop Robert Barron's writings and videos on this subject as one excellent source of clarity.

Speak to us, Lord! We are listening!

On May 3rd, Brothers, Sam Cervoni, Ken Fleming and I, supervised a Special Olympics Dance involving fifty-four Special Olympians and five Adult Supervisors. Music was supplied by DJ Nate Entertainment. A good time was had by all.

On May 4th, Brothers, Vic Lefebvre and Joe Milton, attended a Faith in Action – Life Activities Meeting, hosted by the Marion Council, at St. Dominic's Catholic Church in Oakville. Brother Knights from five Halton Region Councils, as well as Ms. Elea Hofman, Executive Director from Halton Alive were present. The following were discussed:
