Blood Bank Notes

Fellow Knights: During the month of September we had 8 donations! Way to finish up the summer! Thank you to those who are able to help with this gift of life.

Finishing off this section on hemoglobin we will be looking at some of the fewer known variants and their symptoms. Perhaps the 'most common' of these rarer types in Hemoglobin C (HgbC). Similar to sickle cell, the gene for HgbC has a slight mutation in the beta chain (called a beta-C gene) that changes its amino acid structure. It is mostly found in about 2 to 3 percent of people with West African heritage. As with the sickle cell condition, it also provides some protection against malaria. Side effects for those who inherited two copies of this HgbC gene (diagnosed with Hemoglobin C disease) include a shorter red blood cell life (which is usually 120 days) and a mild to moderate enlargement of the spleen.

Another form of hemoglobin, Hemoglobin E (HgbE) is more prevalent in those of Southeast Asian descent, e.g., Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand. It also has a slight mutation in the beta chain (from the beta-E gene, as I'm sure you have guessed by now). Those who have the hemoglobin E disease (have two HgbE gene copies) have smaller sized red blood cells, shorter red blood cell life, and a mildly enlarged spleen.

Generally, inheriting one copy of a mutated gene does not manifest itself in a diagnosed disease; however, that individual is a 'carrier', one who could pass the gene on to their children. While most of the disease states are caused by receiving a copy of the same mutated gene from each parent, there are some individuals who inherit one copy each of two differently mutated genes (e.g., a beta-S gene and a beta-C gene \square Hemoglobin SC disease; or beta-C gene and a beta-E gene \square Hemoglobin EC disease.) These individual will manifest various symptoms based on the combinations they received and their environments.

Some individual's conditions are further complicated by rarer hemoglobin variants, some of which are termed 'thalassemias'. These are genetic changes in the DNA code for either the alpha or beta chains in the hemoglobin molecule. Bone marrow transplants have been suggested as a treatment. Regular blood transfusions may be needed by those more severely affected.

Please continue to make an effort to visit the blood bank; as you know, the gift of blood is the gift of life for someone. For an appointment, call 1-800-879-4484. Remember to use our group number 'OKC8' when you check in. God bless.

COUNCIL FIELD AGENT REPORT



In a new report published by Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF) the group lays out the various ways Planned Parenthood (PP) has engaged in abuse and potential fraud with American tax dollars.
