Pro Life

Below is a note which will appear in many church bulletins in Delaware regarding HB-160, the Euthanasia Bill. Please do your part, spread the word, and take action. Even if you live in PA or elsewhere, it helps to know the facts, and be able to discuss it.

URGENT...

OPPOSE HB 160, a bill that will legalize Assisted Suicide in Delaware!

We in the community need to oppose HB 160, the "End of Life Options Act," for the primary reason that it abandons persons in their moment of need and isolates them from family and trusted physicians. The bill seeks to kill, rather than to care for patients. The bill needs to be opposed on many levels:

•It violates God's law, "Do not kill," by allowing fallible humans to take life away. •It violates the physician's Hippocratic oath to "first, do no harm" and turns doctors into killers.

•It fails to focus on pain management and the physical, psychological, and spiritual needs of the patient, aiming to eliminate suffering by eliminating the patient.

•It is opposed by the Delaware Medical Society and several hospice organizations, who call it "fundamentally inconsistent with our role as physicians and healers".

•It lacks safeguards against abuse, coercion, and corruption of the health care system by allowing unsupervised lethal drugs in the home, providing immunity to all involved in the killing of the patient, and opening the door to unscrupulous intent.

It fails to consider mental health, specifically depression, when evaluating a patient.
It opens the possibility of abuse in targeting vulnerable populations for death instead of care: the elderly, the disabled, and the depressed.

•It leads to an overall rise in suicide rates.

The bill, both lethal and unnecessary, acts to impose assisted suicide on the citizens of Delaware and compromises the integrity of the state's health care system.

This dangerous legislation is part of a larger, national agenda through Compassion and Choices (formerly aka The Hemlock Society) to normalize assisted suicide in as many states as possible. It is opposed by leading medical communities, including the Delaware Medical Society.

Delaware citizens facing a terminal diagnosis and who may still have years to live, deserve our support, love and care. We urge the legislature and the governor to reject assisted suicide, physician-assisted suicide, and euthanasia, as enshrined in HB 160.

OK – WHY SOCKS? The infantry spends all of their time on their feet. Oftentimes they have no laundry facilities, so they have to wash their socks in the canals and other unclean water sources, which can render them unusable within a couple of days. Gone are the mega-bases in Afghanistan and Iraq, along with the logistics chains that supported them. The burden for basic supplies has fallen more and more on the individual service member and their families. With the cuts in defense spending we have also been shipping basic hygiene gear as well as non-perishable food items to cover their needs.

WHO WE'RE HELPING

We are currently supplying Marine and Army units supporting the fight against radical Islamic fundamentalism in Afghanistan and Iraq. Your help goes a long way in making their deployments easier by taking one more worry off of their minds, and letting them focus on the job at hand. Donations are used to purchase socks and other supplies and have them shipped to our brave American Heroes in harm's way.

A Little Information about the group we are partnering with. The San Clemente Marine Corps Support Group operates under the mantra of "Seeking Higher Ground." It also means that we are continually looking for ways to serve the needs of an underserved community who put the needs of their Nation ahead of their own. SCMCSG is a registered 501 (C)(3) non-profit (Tax ID Number 452846419), therefore any contributions are tax-deductible.

While we have a national presence, we are still a "Mom and Pop" organization headquartered in our home. We take no salaries or pay them. We have no facilities. Volunteers shoulder


much of the work done on our behalf. As a result, 98% of all donations go towards our programs that directly support the Marines and their families.
