Archbishop Joseph Kurtz, who serves a s president of the U . S Conference of Catholic Bishops, spoke to a packed congregation reminding attendees of h e i r responsibility to

stand up for life during the annual Memorial Mass for Life celebrated at St. Martin of Tours Church Jan. 18 in downtown Louisville.

"Whether you came here on your own or someone brought you, you are here because you have a responsibility to Christ," the archbishop said. "That responsibility is to use all the gifts you have to stand up for life."

Standing up for life is important, the archbishop said, because of the way people are treated in the world today. Pope Francis, he noted, has used the phrase "throwaway culture" to refer to the ease with which people do away with what is no longer useful to them.

"That's what's happening with people," said the archbishop. "People are held with so little respect."

The archbishop said that some may feel they've worked long enough in the church and want to step aside and let others take the lead on life issues. Some may think they are too young for such a responsibility.

He told the congregation that this is not so and referred to the day's first reading, from the first Book of Samuel in which God calls on Samuel. The archbishop reminded the congregation of Samuel's response — "Speak Lord, your servant is listening."

He encouraged those gathered to heed that calling, which he said is to be "ambassadors for Christ" and, as such, responsible to defend life.

"This is a very important message," said Rick Arnold who along with his wife, Celesta, organized the Mass. The Arnolds are the Knights of Columbus State Council culture-of-life chair couple. "As Catholics we have to stand up for all human life, from conception to natural death," said Arnold.

Part of Arnold's work as an advocate for life has been to help facilitate the installation of ultrasound machines in pregnancy resource centers.

This, he said, has been a "blessing" to those centers.

"Most of the time, when mothers and even fathers see the child in the womb, they decide to choose life," he said.

During the celebration, young people carried in 42 white roses — one for each of the years since the United States Supreme Court legalized abortion with the Roe vs. Wade decision.

The Mass, which was sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, the Knights of St. John and the Ancient Order of Hibernians, concluded with a rose ceremony. More than 100 schools, churches and organizations were recognized in the ceremony for re-committing to pro-life ministry. A representative from each was called up to receive a red rose as a symbol of this commitment.

Following the January 10th St Margaret Mary #15979 Council Business Meeting, Brother Mack McNeley shared his first hand reports from a recent two-week trip to Israel and Jordan with highlights, insights, photos, and videos. "MY TRIP TO THE HOLY LAND" After Mack's 15 minute prepared presentation was complete, eager questions and observations from the membership stretched out for another hour.

Mary Queen of the Holy Rosary Council #14372 in Lexington is helping with the parish's college care package program. Twice per year the parish sends care packages to the college students that are registered in the parish to let them know that we are thinking about them. The council is helping the parish with this endeavor by paying for postage and also including a finger rosary (pictured below) and instructions on how to pray the rosary in every package.



January was a great start to the new calendar year and the second half of the fraternal year. The state has met the monthly membership quota and won a good deal of money in the membership contest. Keep up the effort and we will continue to succeed. At present we are over 50% of our quota for the year.

More important is the tremendous good that is being done by our councils in support of the church, communities, life, and youth throughout the state. As I visit the councils, I encounter these marvelous events. When possible I have tried to have them posted on the state website. So much good goes unnoticed outside the local area because we are not aware of all that is going on. I ask that, as your councils do things, send a photo or two with an explanation and we will place it in the state newsletter. Your program may give good ideas to other councils and multiply the good that you do.

The state of Kentucky will have two new Catholic FM radio stations as a result of the efforts of our brothers in the Brandenburg and Madisonville councils. The stations will begin broadcasting in February in Hopkins County and in April in Meade County. This is a positive response by the Knights to Pope Francis' call for the laity to get involved in evangelization.

In David, Kentucky on February 5 there will be a ground breaking ceremony for a new volunteer center to house persons coming to Appalachia to help the mission in outreach programs to the poor, such as home repair. Our brothers from several councils are active in this through our Stewards of Appalachia. To save money for the mission, the Knights provided the design work and paperwork for all the necessary permits. The Stewards of Appalachia will also provide a good deal of the work finishing the interior of the building.

Council 1055 in Paducah raised funds and dedicated a second Ultrasound Machine in Paducah. While raising

funds for this program, the members of the council made contact with an organization in Missouri that had two surplus machines. The council quickly made arrangements to pick up the machines and bring them to Kentucky for placement. Thus, Council 1055 is responsible for the placement of four Ultrasound machines in the state. Council 762, with help from St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton Council and Mary Queen of the Holy Rosary Council, have raised the funds for a new ultrasound machine to be placed in Morehead, Kentucky. That machine should be placed this spring.

The Knights are also stepping up activity in support of youth. This is the season for the Culture of Life and the Alcohol and Substance poster contests. Our Soccer Kick contest has been completed and the Basketball free throw contests are in full swing. In the new event category, one of our councils has started softball leagues for boys and for girls in their area.

In January the Knights of councils 5634,13053, 2761, 4665, 14604, 14471, 13304, 14234, 15841, 4473, 12562, 12354 and 15979 joined to hold the Archdiocese Priest Appreciation Dinner. The Guest speaker was Brother Knight Archbishop Kurtz. Over 300 people were there to thank our priests, sisters and deacons for their guidance and service in our journey back to our Father.

Finally, I am pleased to announce that we will soon have two more councils formed to do good in their locality. Please welcome Council 16125, Knottsville, into the State Council. Brother Bruce Whitehouse is serving as the interim Grand Knight. In addition, the required number of members have been through the first degree, and paperwork is in process to form a new council at Jesus Our Savior parish in Morehead.

February Events; Tuesday, February 3, marks the 72nd Anniversary of the sinking of the U.S. Army transport Dorchester off the coast of Greenland and the selfless acts of four chaplains who saved the lives of many men onboard. The chaplains were Lt. George L. Fox, Methodist; Lt. Alexander D. Goode, Jewish; Lt. John P. Washington, Catholic; and Lt. Clark V. Poling, Dutch Reformed. While the transport was sinking on that day in 1943, the four chaplains of differing faiths handed out life iackets to soldiers. When there were no more lifejackets, the four chaplains removed their own and gave them to others. The chaplains then went down with the ship, arm-in-arm in prayer. The national observance was established in 1957.

February 12, 1809, Abraham Lincoln was born in a log cabin in Sinking Springs Farm, in Hardin County, Kentucky.

From Program Director Kent Hoskins Programming tip of the month

The State & International Program Awards competitions annually recognize the best programs or projects conducted by local Councils in the six (6) service areas: Church, Council, Community, Family, Culture of Life and Youth activities. Now is the time to begin putting our entries together.

Just to be clear, these awards are given to the best single program or project in each State Jurisdiction based on effectiveness, originality and adherence to the principles of the Order, i.e. (Catholic, Service and Fraternal qualities). Each Council may submit up to six (6) entries, one in each service area mentioned above.

Use Supreme Form #STSP (available on the website or from me) as both entry form and as your cover page. Include photographs, newspaper articles or any other form of media that makes the case for your project. Describe it in one or two pages. What was the purpose? How many Council members and their families were involved? How effective was it?

The best way to submit these entries is in report form using a clear report cover but anything that gets the message across is fine. One other thing---please don't use DVDs, videos or CD ROMS.

A few tips:

- 1) You can't win if you don't enter.
- 2 Late entries don't count
- 3) Activity must have taken place after July 1, 2014
- 4) Only one (1) entry per category
- 5) Drop Dead Deadline is April 15, 2015

6) Send entries to State Deputy NOT to Supreme Council
