Council 7847 Hopkinsville completed the installation of 176 new pew kneelers for Sts. Peter and Paul Catholic Church. The total project was about \$12,000. It was 50% funded by the KOC council. The council provided the manpower to remove the old kneelers that were 12 years old and in dis-repair, and install new kneelers.

The project had been in the planning stages for about 6 months. The installation teams of about 20 Knights were able to complete the installation in about 9 hours with no disruption to church activities.

Sunday afternoon October 19, 2014, the 12th Annual Knights of Columbus Motorcycle Ride for Wednesday's Child sponsored by Councils Msgr. McKune (14471) and Msgr. Newman (4665) was staged. Due to inclement weather, the Ride had to be postponed a week to the 19th, however the Ride still had 59 participants and raised \$2,775 for the Wednesday's Child Program. The Wednesday's Child Program works to assist in the adoption of older and sometimes difficult to place, children.

The Diocese of Covington held its annual Seminary Ball on October 24th. The ball had over 500 attendees this year. The photo below is of the Seminary Ball Planning Commitee. Assurance for Life Pregnancy Center had a need for a portable ultrasound machine to be used in five clinics in eastern and south central Kentucky. The cost of the machine, the five docking stations and a portable examination table cost approximately \$24,000.

The Knights of Columbus Council (#12774) at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was approached and asked to take on this project under the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative. This is a program where a local council raises half the money and the Supreme Council provides the remainder.

After completing the paperwork and getting the project approved, Seton Council began working on raising the necessary money. Our initial plan was to go to all Lexington parishes and ask for donations after each Mass. The decision was made to start with our own parish at Seton. We included information in the church bulletin about the project and how Assurance for Life would benefit having a portable ultrasound machine in their clinics. Fr. John Moriarty was very supportive of this project and mentioned it in his homilies and had a second collection for the ultrasound machine the weekend of the drive.

After the Saturday evening Mass the lady that handles the collection came up and said, "I don't know how much money you got but I can tell you that it is the most money we have ever collected for a second collection." After the first Mass on Sunday a parishioner came up and said that she believed in the

work we were doing and wrote out a check for \$1,000. After the second Mass a man came up and asked if we could use a second machine. I told him that we probably could but we were just trying to raise enough money to buy the first one. A week later he donated \$10,000 to the project. After all the money was counted we had raised \$14,640.34 from our parish. Since the total cost of the project was estimated to be \$24,000 we had raised more than half of the required funds at our own parish and we didn't need to approach the other parishes in Lexington.

Once the money was raised, we submitted the paperwork to the State. They signed off on the project and the requested funds and forwarded it to Supreme. Supreme reviewed our project and a check for the balance was sent to our Council.

In August we presented three checks totaling \$24, 640.34 to Assurance for Life Pregnancy Center for the purchase of the ultrasound machine and supporting equipment. The equipment was ordered immediately and received in early October. Because the ultrasound machine is portable we thought it would be nice to bring it to all the Masses for the parishioners to see. On the weekend of October 18-19, 2014, the machine was blessed at each of the Masses and Cindy McDaniel (Executive Director of Assurance for Life) thanked everyone for their generosity.

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It has been stated that 79% of abortion minded women, once they see the ultrasound of their baby, will choose life. This is what makes the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative so important.

The following is a reprint of an article entitled "Kehoe Council celebrates 100 years of charity, fraternity" by Editor Laura Keener that ran in the October 31st edition of the Messenger.

The Father James Kehoe Council Knights of Columbus, Ludlow, recognized its 100th anniversary, Oct.18, with Mass at Sts. Boniface and James Parish, Ludlow, Bishop Roger Fovs was the celebrant and Father Lawrence Schaeper, pastor of Sts. Boniface and James Parish and chaplain for the Father Kehoe Council, concelebrated. Following Mass the celebration continued with a dinner and reception at the council's facilities. Frank Shav, State Deputy for the Knights of Columbus, and Fred Porciello, Grand Knight for the Kehoe Council, were in attendance. "I congratulate the Father Kehoe Council of the Knights of Columbus on their 100th anniversary," said Bishop Foys. "How much good they have done and how many hearts they have touched by their charitable work in these past 10 decades is beyond counting. Bishop Foys joined the Knights while serving in the Diocese of Steubenville. A few years after he was installed bishop for the Diocese of Covington, Knights from the Kehoe Council asked if he would like to join their council, and he did. Asking Catholic men to join them in their ministry to fulfill the three principles of the Knights of Columbus — charity, unity and fraternity — has been an effective method of recruitment.

Carl Biery was asked to join the Knights while he was attending Villa Madonna College, Covington. Mr. Biery was honored for 45 years of service as a Knight at the anniversary celebration. "I remain a Knight because I like all of the things we do, the fundraisers and helping people. It's just something I love to do," said Mr. Biery.

Not surprising given his many years as a knight, Mr. Biery is the institutional memory for the council. He was also the state deputy for many years. Mr. Shay, the current state deputy, is also a Father Kehoe Council member. In fact, over its 100-year history,

the Kehoe Council has had four state deputies, more than any other of the 101 councils in the state. "It's been a breeding ground for leadership," said Mr. Shay.

The Kehoe Council Knights of Columbus was founded under the leadership of the first Grand Knight, John J. Donovan. There were 103 names on the original charter. The council was established to serve as a Catholic, family, fraternal, service organization. Further honors were bestowed upon Brother Donovan when on Oct. 4, 1954 Pope Pius XII appointed him as a Knight of St. Gregory the Great. The Order of St. Gregory the Great is one of five orders of knighthood of the Holy See. The honor is bestowed on men and women in recognition of service to the Church and for their outstanding witness as faithful Catholics to their community.

The council has always called Ludlow home moving in 1965 from its original home in the business district on Elm Street to its current building just down the street and along the river at 828 Elm Street. In 1972 a grotto with a life-sized statue of Mary was built and in 1979 Bishop William Hughes dedicated the shrine to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

"It's a great organization," said Father Schaeper. "The Knights do a lot for pro-life in supporting the life of the unborn and they do a lot for seminarians in promoting vocations to the priesthood and helping us as priests. They are a positive force in the Ludlow community, following the principles of their founder, Father McGiveny. They are very faith-filled and have a deep love for Christ and love for his people and extending that love to others, especially the poor and the sick and the suffering, and just a witness to life through the love of Christ."

Father Michael J. McGivney, a priest from Connecticut, officially chartered the Knights of Columbus in 1882 as a fraternal benefit society. According to the Knights of Columbus website, "The Knights were formed to render financial aid to members and their families. Mutual aid and assistance are offered to sick, disabled and needy members and their families. Social and intellectual fellowship is promoted among members and their families through educational, charitable, religious,

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social welfare, war relief and public relief works."

The Kehoe Council has a long and impressive list of charitable endeavors in the Diocese of Covington. In the pro-life movement they, along with the other 15 Knights of Columbus councils in the Diocese of Covington (collectively known as the Northern Kentucky Knights of Columbus) and the State Council, help sponsor the annual essay contest organized by the diocesan Pro-Life Office. They also help with scholarships for students wanting to attend the annual March for Life in Washington, D.C. They also help with the annual golf outing that benefits the Lifeline Fund of Catholic Charities – Diocese of Covington. The Lifeline Fund provides material assistance to women experiencing an unplanned pregnancy.

Kehoe Council Knights can be found serving food to the hungry and homeless at Henry Hosea House (ECHO), Newport, and Parish Kitchen, Covington. They also are supporters of the St. Augustine Outreach center, City Heights, Covington.

The Knights are strong supporters of vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Each year they provide every seminarian with a gift of \$500 for their personal use. And when the Seminary Ball was reestablished four years ago the Knights quickly volunteered to assist on the Seminary

Ball committee. For 14 years the Kehoe Council has hosted the annual Clergy Outing, a grill-out for priests, deacons and seminarians.

The Kehoe Council raises funds for the Sisters of Notre Dame's mission in Uganda by routinely sponsoring and hosting pancake breakfasts at their motherhouse, St. Joseph Heights, Park Hills. They also help the Sisters of Notre Dame (SND) with their annual Fourth of July Picnic, which also supports the Uganda mission.

Notre Dame Sister Marla Monahan's father, Ed Monahan, was a member of the Father Kehoe Council Knights of Columbus and was on the social concerns committee when the Knights began the pancake breakfast fundraiser. "He and the Knights were especially concerned about and supportive of those persons in our world who are poor and marginalized. They believed in the African proverb that it takes a village to raise a child and wanted to help raise awareness of our brothers and sisters in need," Sister Marla said. "This organization of the

Catholic Church was very important to him [her father], both as a way to put his faith into action and to deepen relationships with his fellow Knights. In my experience, the Kehoe Council Knights of Columbus truly live their Catholic faith: through their faith in God, their fellowship with one another, and their service of love in our world."

Sister Marla said that she has many fond memories as a child of gathering with other families of the Knights and "it was the best place to meet Santa at Christmas."

In addition to financial support the Knights are committed to offering prayers and moral support for seminarians, priests and women religious by sending them cards and letters. For Kehoe members who are ordained priests, their brother Knights show their support by attending their ordination and first Mass. The Knights also present brother priests with their first vestment.

Many people in the Diocese of Covington may have a coveted rosary that they received for their First Holy Communion. What you might not know is that rosary may have been a gift from the Knights of Columbus. For decades the Kehoe Council has provided rosaries for First Communicants in the Diocese of Covington. They also offer need-based educational scholarships for children wanting to attend a Catholic school at one of the diocese's inner city schools.

The charitable contributions extend beyond the walls of the Church. The Kehoe Council sponsors Scouting activities and Ludlow youth football and cheerleading teams. The Knights organize a Tootsie Roll campaign to raise funds for Redwood School, Ft. Mitchell and New Perceptions, Edgewood. Both organizations serve the men- tally and physically disabled members of the community.

In times of crisis the Knights are quick in their support, oftentimes offering financial support to organizations like the St. Vincent de Paul that work as first responders in parishes and the community. This was especially evident when tornadoes struck southern Kenton and northern Pendleton counties in 2012. The Kehoe Council's Lenten fish fry is legendary and is the council's primary source of financial support. They also host a spaghetti dinner that is gaining in popularity.

And while many of these charitable undertakings date back for years the Kehoe Council Knights of Columbus are still finding new ways to reach out to help people. On Nov. 30 the Knights will host its first-ever event for veterans. After a 40-day stay last year at the VA Medical Center, Ft. Thomas, Mr. Porciello became aware of the plight of many veterans.


"I know how important it was for my wife to take me out on the weekend and some men at the VA don't have family to take them out," Mr. Porciello said. "Some will be there for the rest of their lives, they are going to die there."

Mr. Porciello enlisted the help of his brother Knights to host a football party for veterans from the VA in Ft. Thomas at their riverside facility. "As Catholic men we try to do things that make a difference in people's lives," Mr. Porciello said. "It's going to be a wonderful afternoon and with God's grace we will do something more with them throughout the course of the year to honor our veterans and the men and women at the veterans hospital who don't have families. I will get more out of it than they will."

"Kehoe has done a lot of good things for the Church both in Ludlow and throughout the diocese over the past 100 years," said Father Mario Tizziani, pastor, St. Cecilia Parish, Independence, and state chaplain for the Knights of Columbus. "They are called to be the spiritual leaders of lay men through their corporal works of mercy and striving to do their best to be leaders in activities and functions in the Church. I encourage them to continue their good work, especially for Kehoe as they reach this amazing milestone in the history of the Church and their council and as they continue striving after the cross being an example to the community of faithfulness."

The Kehoe Council Knights of Columbus is now asking young men to consider joining the fraternity to continue the tradition of charity, unity and fraternity. "The most important thing is we need for young men to join," said Mr. Porciello. "They will be among people with Christian values and that's important in today's society. Everybody talks about the evil. Without men who believe in God and who go to church on Sunday and who aren't ashamed to go to church on Sunday, the world would dissolve. We Knights stand up and say, 'We believe in Jesus,'

and we follow him and try to do some of his deeds so the world will survive."

From State Deputy Frank Shay

My Brother Knights:

The first weekend in November I had the privilege of representing Kentucky at the Supreme Mid-Year Meeting. The meeting was filled with presentations concerning growth, program and evangelization. At the meeting Supreme Knight Carl Anderson announced that the Ultrasound Initiative is celebrating five years with 500 machines delivered throughout the country. Kentucky has played a significant role in this program with two machines placed in Paducah, two in Northern Kentucky, one in Madisonville and one in Lexington. There are currently two more machines in the late stages of the fund raising. These machines will be placed in Morehead and in Vine Grove.

Supreme Knight Anderson added: "Not only has this program saved the lives of countless unborn children, but it has saved many mothers — and fathers — from a lifetime of regret." As Knights and as Kentuckians this is a record to be proud of and one to share with the public.

In discussing Evangelization the Supreme Knight asked us to think about how we could explain "Love" to a totally rational being such as Mr. Spock of Star Trek. It would be impossible without using the words Charity, Unity and Fraternity. Knights are called to express this love through evangelization using our new program "Building the Domestic Church: The Family Fully Alive initiative that was introduced at the supreme convention and began in October. The Supreme Knight said that this is a very important initiative for the Order and one that will help hundreds of thousands of families looking for greater pastoral support, greater formation, better programs for their children. He added that, the program can help prevent divorces, because it encourages family prayer, closeness, catechesis, and better communications among families." We must



be sure that we share the Family Alive Program Books with our pastors to get their support in introducing the program to our Parishes.

In summary concerning evangelization Mr. Anderson stated "The greatest fraternal benefit that we offer the world, is ourselves, the opportunity to have Christian brotherhood with men and women who take the call to Christian life seriously, and do what Pope Francis has described as fraternity – that each person becomes a neighbor who cares for others," the supreme knight concluded. "That's charity, that's unity and that's fraternity. And that is what we are as the Knights of Columbus."

While in Baltimore we were also taken to visit the National Shrine to Pope St. John Paul II. This was a moving experience and once again we were given the opportunity to touch a vial of the blood of Pope St. John Paul II.

"The shrine itself is an initiative of the Knights of Columbus, and houses one of the major blood relics of St. John Paul II. The new "A Gift of Love: The Life of Saint John Paul II" exhibit is a unique 16,000-square-foot permanent tour de force that invites visitors to journey through nine galleries that trace the life, papacy and teachings of Pope John Paul II. The multimedia experience includes unique artifacts, audio-visual components and engaging interactive displays in a setting that inspires deep reflection on one of the major intellectual, spiritual and historical figures of the 20th century. The exhibit focuses both on the events that shaped him and those he shaped: from his childhood to his youth in Nazi-occupied Poland, to his ministry as priest, bishop and cardinal during the Communist period, to his election to the papacy in 1978 and the subsequent remarkable, dynamic program that he oversaw as pope for the next 26 years, including the great lessons of his poignant final days." In his closing remarks Carl Anderson stated that "The vast majority of men who are Knights of Columbus members were asked to join by a family member or a friend. And the vast majority said that they never or rarely ask someone to join the Knights of Columbus. That has to change, and that message has to come from you repeatedly. Ask a friend to join. Ask a fellow catholic to join, that's a responsibility of membership."
