The first week of April brought us the Easter Triduum, or Paschtide, beginning with the somber Holy Thursday Mass commemorating the institution of the Eucharist and culminating with the Holy Saturday services, thus bringing to an end the penitential season of Lent and setting the stage for the glorious Easter celebration, the most holy day of the liturgical year. What a great beginning of the month! It was gratifying for me personally to see the number of knights and their families involved in the Holy Week services as well as those of Easter. Their children were assisting at the altar, and knights and/or their wives were serving as lectors, and Eucharistic ministers. Some were handing out bulletins; others were carrying up the Offertory gifts. Still others sang in the choir. How gratifying to have such involvement. I would like to give special recogni-

tion to **Ed King**, the recently new Commander of the Assembly Honor Guard. With both St. John's and St. Mary's requesting an Honor Guard for the Holy Thursday Mass, it was Ed's task to enlist enough knights in regalia to serve. These men, divided into two groups, served the respective churches and remained until Midnight guarding the Eucharist in its new temporary Altar of Repose, where it remained through Good Friday. Third Degree member **Chase King**, son of Ed and Cheryl and now a graduating senior at Subiaco Academy also remained at the Altar of Repose until Midnight. He is a great example of our fine young men who have become recent knights.

Of course one big annual April event is the Charity Rummage Sale, an event that couples with the October Sale to provide much-needed funding for several local charities. [see Rum-

I'll make your mouth water by mentioning the pork chops, pulled pork, and hamburgers as a portion of his culinary art. Spring Charity Rummage Sale Surpasses Expectations

Except for the usual hyper-busy first day of the April 10-11, 17-18 Charity Rummage Sale, most of the workers felt the crowds and sales were smaller and slower than ordinary. The final result, while certainly not a record, was greater than our guess. With \$418 in post sales including one monetary donation, our net sales edged by the \$25,000 mark for a total of **\$25,148.40**. This was roughly **\$1400** more than the same sale one year ago but around **\$1150** less than our previous sale in October. As pointed out in the past, our fall sales inexplicably have bet-

ter results than our spring sales. It's to assess available funds for charitable purposes and to consider a possible new recipient of our charity as well as to consider increasing current monthly allocations. **Tom Gilleran, Dick Smith, Treasurer Larry Stidman, and Joe Giompolletti** were absent. Present were **Chairman Stan DeGruccio, Dennis Bosch, Jim Lockwood, Jim Reiter, and Grand Knight Andy Anderson**.

All in all, the weather was our friend throughout the sale. Except for one brief downpour, we were spared from the rain that had been promised. There was an ominous forecast for two days of heavy rains. Fortunately, those rain events did not materialize.

The Arkansas Knights of Columbus State Convention, held this past weekend at Embassy Suites in Little Rock, culminated with the Saturday evening banquet and the announcement of Hot Springs Council 6419 as the recipient of the coveted Large Knight of the Year Award. Representing the local council were delegates **Andy Anderson**

as Grand Knight and **Vincente Gonzalez** as Deputy Grand Knight, **David Myers**, and **Charlie Cook**. Also present were Vincente's wife **Gladys**, Charlie's wife **Carol**, and David's son **Dayton**, chief Squire, who was presented the Arkansas Squire of the Year Award.

Council 6419 led in most of the criteria used in judging the top council, but **Grand Knight Anderson** points out that the category separating us from the rest was our dominance in charitable endeavors. Congratulations to Council 6419 for its good work

Rummage Sale, concluded

\$4720.74 to buttress the proceeds from the recent sale, committee members not only agreed to serve our present Hot Springs charities but decided to increase the monthly allocation to three of those as well as adding a new monthly recipient. Local charities continuing to receive our monthly aid are Jackson House, increased from **\$500 to \$600** monthly, Project Hope (Hot Springs Food Bank) raised from **\$400 to \$500** monthly, Change Point Crisis Center, raised from **\$200 to \$300** monthly, Christian Charitable Medical Clinic, remaining at **\$400** monthly, The Caring Place (Alzheimer's Day Care), remaining at **\$400** monthly, Samaritan Ministries (Men's homeless shelter), remaining at **\$400** monthly, Safe Haven (Women's homeless shelter), remaining at **\$400** monthly, The Branch (Residential living and rehabilitation for those dependent on alcohol and/or drugs), remaining at **\$400** monthly. Our twice-a-year recipient of financial assistance is St. Vincent de Paul Society, a Catholic Charity serving those in need within Garland County, **\$2000. annually**. Newly added for monthly support is the organization for **Disabled American Veterans, \$200. monthly**. For a twelve-month period the total donated through Council 6419 to these organizations comes to **\$45,200**. An additional **\$3000** goes toward the upkeep of

Council 6419.
