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Golfing for St. John's School

Hans Purkott, Chairman and Wonder Man of the area golf courses, has done it again! With a lot of help of course. Once again his efforts, coupled with those of a lot of fellow Knights, Squires, and others have produced another windfall for St. John's School. A windfall it is, albeit not to the degree of last year's result. Some unexpected last-minute complications cut into the total profit.

Unfortunately several ladies' teams canceled because of the heat. Another negative was that Hans was unable to collect as many prizes as last year and, as a result, had to use some proceeds to purchase prizes. On the other hand, our Squires had a fabulous day at the bank. For one thing their efforts resulted in a donation of 22 rounds of golf from the Grand Knight of the Russellville council. Hans purchased

those rounds for \$550. to use as prizes. Altogether he spent more than \$1300 for prizes. On top of that, the use of Magellan Golf Course for 140 golfers cost more than last year: \$4549.97. Stamps, Danny and Mary Morrison, Larry Nieman and Bob Kortenb Chef Giompoletti bowed out in the afternoon, turning the reins over to the young Squires who served the afternoon golfers hamburger lunches. Chairman Hans acknowledges the heavy work done by David Myers, including his corporate sponsorship. I'm getting old.

So, for what it's worth, here are a few of my own conclusions.

That's really not a surprise though some people seem to be shocked when they come face to face with the eventuality either for themselves or for someone close to them. The other fact to bear in mind is that people die at every age. We all have an expiration date, although most of us don't really have any idea about how long we have left. This tells me two things. First, there is nothing unfair when someone dies "before his time," since he really didn't die before his time. It's a fact of life. No one is promised a tomor-And, second, this very reality should motivate us to live well each day as a gift, not as something we take for granted. Remember to live each day as if it were your last and you will never be disappointed. And this leads me to a secret to living life fully that I would like to share with you.

I believe that life has a purpose, a higher call, a divine reason that gives it a fullness of meaning, a richness of being. That purpose is union with God. Like a runway, life's purpose is to allow us to leave behind the gravity of this world and to soar to free-flight into the boundless

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

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Hot Springs Fourth Degree Assembly Hosts Successful Exemplification

On Saturday, July 11 the Hot Springs Fourth Degree Assembly welcomed 33 candidates for the Exemplification ceremony in the Parish Hall of St. Mary of the Springs Church. The Degree team included Newton White, Bob Koch, Joe Kanopsic, Doug Hall, and Larry Nieman of Hot Springs, Jacob Delay of Cabot, Jimmy McKinnon, Marc Rios, and Jim Limbird of Little Rock, and Father Bill Elser of Hot Springs Village Sacred Heart Church.

Candidates hailed from Texarkana, El Dorado, Little Rock, Van Buren, Conway, St. Vincent, Morrilton, Hot Springs Village, Arkadelphia, Pine Bluff, and Hot Springs. Of the 33 new members 16 now belong to our own Assembly. It was a larger class than ordinary and those from our Assembly comprised a particularly large group, perhaps a record.

It was a full afternoon through early evening of activities, beginning with an 11:30 a.m. light lunch for men and their wives. When the preparation for the Exemplification began at 1 p.m., activities for the ladies began and continued till 3 p.m. At the conclusion of the Exemplification all participants attended the 4 p.m. Mass at St. Mary's. Activities concluded with a banquet at 6 p.m.

In Case Someone Asks You: Apologetics in Action

A good number of Catholic beliefs are not explicitly supported by the Bible. Intercessory pray to saints, particularly to Mary, is one of our practices that Protestants often find offensive and insist are non-Biblical. Belief in Purgatory is strongly implied in the Bible but, again, not explicitly defined. And since non-Catholics typically believe the Bible is the only source of the truth, that difference often makes difficult a reasonable discussion of our differences. Divine Tradition—those truths found in non-Biblical writings from the earliest centuries-are not always found in the Bible. But they are critical in any discussions we have with Protesof why we believe certain things that they do not believe. Invariably they turn a deaf ear to the idea of a Divine Tradition passed on from the earliest writers of the Church following the death of the last original Apostle, John.

But our belief in Tradition is clearly substantiated in the Bible. The Bible does tell us that Jesus said many things that are not stated in the Bible. John 21:25 "Jesus did many other things as well. If every one of them waswritten down, I suppose that even the whole world would not have room for the books that would be written." St. Paul says, 1 Corinthians 11:2 "Hold fast to the traditions that I handed on to you." And again, 2 Thessalonians 2:15 "Hold on to traditions, whether ORAL or by letter."

As for Protestant belief that the Bible is the only source of divine truth, quite simply it is not. It's the **Church** that is the "pillar and foundation of truth." (1 Timothy 3:15). For 393 years after Christ there was absolutely no Bible. The Canon of the Bible was determined in two Church Councils--The Council of Hippo (393) and the Council of Carthage (397). By whom? The CATHOLIC CHURCH. Many Protestants have not a clue that the Bible they treasure came to them through the Catholic Church. So the determination of the Canon is a perfect

illustration of the Church being the "pillar and foundation of the truth." not the Bible. The Church is and always has been guided by the Holy Spirit. The truth is that the Church could exist to this day and to the end of time, still spreading the truth, even if the Bible had never been written. For centuries before the availability of the Bible, the Gospel was spread through the power of the spoken word as well as through written letters.
