### **Council Member Louis Kosarek Dies**

Louis Kosarek, long an active member of Council 6419 and Fourth Degree Assembly 1892, died unexpectedly at his Hot Springs home on August 19.



Louis was born on New Year's Day of 1928 in Ennis, Texas but spent most of his professional life in and near Berwyn, Illinois, outside

Chicago, where he was a successful builder, focusing on brick masonry. He was a member of Masonry Contractor Association, as well as the North Riverside (Illinois) Sportsman Club. In Berwyn he met **Violet Kmoch** and married her on July 1, 1950 at St. Odilla Catholic Church. They became parents of one son and three daughters.

As they began to think of eventual retirement, they became familiar with Hot Springs as they traveled each year from Berwyn to Ennis, Texas, to visit Lou's family. Several years before Lou retired, they chose Hot Springs as their eventual retirement home, bought a lake property in 1972, and Lou himself began constructing their new home in 1981. They made the permanent move here in 1990. Their new church home became the Catholic Church of St. John the Baptist. For several years Lou helped count the weekend collections on Monday mornings.

On March 6, 1996, Lou became a member of Knights of Columbus Council 6419, and soon after joined the Fourth Degree Assembly. He has been an active member of both organizations, including the Assembly's Honor Guard that serves at ceremonial occasions such as the Christmas Midnight Mass and funerals. At the time of his death, Lou was serving as a Trustee of the Assembly. Through the years he has served in various capacities. For several years he frequently did K.C. kitchen work, preparing meat for special dinners. And for a long period both he and Vi took a major role with the annual Christmas

Dinner and Dance. They conducted the popular raffle and door prize event. But the biggest job was spread over several weeks as they solicited and collected prize donations from local merchants. In addition, several years ago Lou organized a senior social group called "The Wiser Bunch," that meets on schedule at St. John's Parish Hall. This group meets for recreation cards and other games—and refreshments. At the time of his death Lou served as president of the group.

Just two months ago Lou and Vi celebrated 65 years of marriage

Lou was predeceased by his parents, his daughter Rosemary and his grandson Duncan. In addition to Violet, he is survived by his son Louis, Jr., daughters Shirley and Caroline, and seven grandchildren.

A rosary service, led by **Father James West**, was conducted Monday evening, August 24 at Caruth-Hale Funeral Home, and the Rite of Christian Burial, celebrated by Father West was the following morning at the Catholic Church of St. John the Baptist. The Honor Guard of Assembly 1892 served at both services.
