On March 31 council member **Danny Morrison**, Chairman of last fall's Drive for People with Disabilities (Tootsie Roll Drive) presented a check of \$3575 to **First Step School** Executive Director **Brett Chancellor**. First Step is a local school for handicapped pupils. The "**I Can Dance**" organization for handicapped youngsters also was the recipient of \$500 from the Tootsie Roll Drive as was **Arkansas Special Olympics**.

The annual council Baby Bottle Campaign has wound down. Thanks to our efforts and those of generous parishioners of St. John's and St. Mary's Churches, we were able to present \$8000 for the work of Change Point, the local pregnancy crisis center. Congratulations to council member **David Myers**, who chaired another highly successful campaign. Our efforts, which have included the donation of an ultra-

sound machine, are designed to discourage abortions. We are gratified each year to learn the number of babies saved as a result of ultrasound imaging. We thank all for their great effort.

Council 6419 has joined in with other state councils to raffle a fine Chevy Colorado pickup truck with proceeds going toward support of our diocesan seminarians, currently about 40 of them. Work horses **George Purifoy** and **Danny Morrison** stepped forward to take the lead in local ticket sales. Tickets sell for \$10 each. Sales will end at the end of this month, and the drawing will be the end of May. On a recent Sunday the truck was parked in front of the St. John's Parish Hall as robust ticket sales took place. From Father George Sanders: "Should We Cry Over Spilled Milk?"

I'd like to begin with a brief recollection for all of us, a childhood memory really. There comes a time in all of our young lives when we pass the infantile milestones of bottles and sippie cups (You know, the ones with built-on lids to prevent the inevitable knocked-over drink) to real grownup cups or glasses. There is a sense of pride in our accomplishment; we are "babies" no longer. We soon learn that with our newfound freedom comes a responsibility to remember where our glass is on our tray and to refrain from thoughtless, even joyful, flails or inattentive moves that could result in the sudden loss of our drink.

But for most adults, who haplessly witness this sudden catastrophe unfolding in front of them and quickly assess the situation rationally, they often conclude that there was really little harm done that could merit this impending emotional explosion. After all, since there is still a half-gallon of milk in the refrigerator, no problem. From their grown-up perspective the loss felt by the child could seem so trivial in the moment. "No need to cry over spilled milk," they think. But from the high-chair, the view is a bit different. The heart of the child is crushed. He doesn't care if you have twenty gallons of milk in the refrigerator and five milk cows in the backyard, that's YOUR milk, HIS milk spilled. And this was his big-boy cup, the sign of his new-found big boy status. Maybe he is NOT a big boy yet, he gasps. His heart skips a couple

beats at the thought as the pain now floods from his heart and through his eyes, nose and mouth, and anywhere else it can get out. In the moment he is inconsolable.

But like clockwork, Mom flies gracefully into the picture from the next room, consoling him with assurance that it will be all right. Her maternal care brings both calm and hope to his broken heart. She promises that we can fix it and make it all better again. She tells the child that this is not the first time a cup of milk has been spilled. In fact, she reminds him that his Dad spilled his drink at supper a few nights ago. These things happen, even to big boys. But then with motherly wisdom she asks, "Do you want to help me make it better again?" The child, now filled with a small but growing hope that all will be well, begins to dry up the tears and to fix his eyes intently on his mother. "Yes," he says between sniffles as the waters begin to subside below flood stage. Mom goes over to the cabinet and gets the paper towels, rolls off several, and folds them into a blotter. "Now," she says, "let's clean this mess up." She invites her son to help her, placing his hands on the towels with hers. Once the tray is clean she bends down to clean up what fell onto the floor as the child watches intently. In a flash Mom has whisked her faithful mop from its place in the kitchen closet, which is never far from her reach with a toddler around, and like a speeding bullet she completes her rescue. He couldn't do it all of course, but he did what he could and his mother did the rest. When finished, Mom returns close to him, placing her face next to his and asks ever so gently,

"All better now?" "Yes, Mommy," he replies as he reaches up for a big hug and the dissonance of life turns to harmony in her embrace. "Now I bet my big boy is ready for another cup of milk, huh?" she generously and trustingly offers. His mother then rinses his big-boy cup off and goes to the fridge, pours him a new glass of milk and then hands it to him allowing him to set it down in front of him again on his tray, like the big boy they both know he is. "Thank you, Mommy," he says as his smile affirms that his mom was right once again: even our worst failures and losses can be made right. No matter what, we can be forgiven, restored and strengthened by the tender embrace and loving hand of our mother.

In this story, I hoped to relate to you a picture of what really happens behind the doors of the confessional. We come with our hearts broken by our own actions, many of which were not intended, but which just happened in the distraction and weakness of the moment. Mother Church immediately assures us that these things do happen but that they can be fixed; we can be forgiven and returned to our former state of grace before the "spill." Through spiritual counseling and acts of penance, she lets us acknowledge our actions were the cause of the problem (the first step to true healing) and lets us help make it right again with encouragement and recourse to prayer, spiritual exercise and restitution as needed. Then she does the part we cannot do: she cleans up the whole mess, absolving us of our guilt and restoring our
