Arkansas is roughly 6 percent Catholic. And yet remarkably this diocese surpasses others in which the Catholic population is considerably

greater. Something is definitely going right here in Arkansas, and much of this success goes to **Msgr. Scott Friend**, Vocations Director for the Diocese.

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Beloved Council Member Tom Gilleran Dies



It is with heavy hearts that members of Council 6419 learned of the death of Tom Gilleran Monday afternoon at Na-

tional Park Medical Center. Tom was 75. For several years Tom had had serious health issues, mainly related to poor blood circulation in his legs but also multiple surgeries, including open-heart and vascular stents. His many friends feared that he would lose one of his legs. In-

stead, his death resulted from a fall last Saturday that caused a brain bleed doctors could not bring under control.

Tom leaves behind his wife Barbara, his sons Tommy and Shawn, their wives, six grandchildren, and many friends, who will remember his devotion to his family, St. Mary's Church, and to his many works of charity that included the community, the church, and Knights of Columbus Council 6419. Tom was predeceased by his oldest son Paul, who died in a car accident in 1988.

For several years he did volunteer work for Jackson House, The Caring Place, and Habitat for Humanity. St.

Mary of the Springs Church depended on Tom for a variety of jobs, including ushering at the Saturday Vigil Mass and helping set up for special events like the annual St. Mary's picnic. Whatever he was called upon to do, Tom was ready. For our K.C. Council he was equally ready to serve in different capacities. He rarely missed a council meeting, but he was far more than a duespaying member.

Joining Knights of Columbus in 1960 while still in his native Rhode Island, he became inactive for many years before reactivate-

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From Father George Sanders: "Let's Walk Together"



On his recent return from Armenia, Pope Francis was asked about the possible guilt of the Catholic Church in the marginalization of the LGBT community and whether the Church should ask for forgiveness for how it may have assisted or aided

the current anti-gay sentiment that apparently led to the mass shooting in Orlando. I believe his response was coherent, clear and comprehensible. But its profundity could be overlooked if one does not look a bit deeper than the sound bites highlighted in the media.

First, I would recommend that those reading this column would benefit more if they took the time to actually read what he said (Google "The Pope Answers Questions from Journalists on the Return Flight from Armenia"; issued 6/27/2016 from the Holy See Press Office). My brief comments will assume the reader's prior knowledge of his comments.

His first comment was a reference to the Catechism of the Catholic Church where he reminds us that all persons, regardless of their orientation "must not be discriminated against, they must be respected and accompanied pastorally." He continued that "if a person in this condition (i.e. gay) has good will and seeks God, who are we to judge?" So what was he saying? Doesn't the CCC condemn homosexuality as disordered?

In order to give a fair listen to the Pope's words we should always keep one thought in mind: he is intelligent, purposeful

and integral in his thoughts and comments. By listening carefully to his comments in context and as a whole thought and then holding them all in tension before snapjudging what he is saying based on a snippet or sound bite, we can actually determine his intent and appreciate what he is really saying instead of jumping to erroneous conclusions.

So let's begin with first looking at his premises:

- 1. His comments will be in agreement with the CCC. From this we can safely assume that he views the homosexual act as disordered and, therefore, not befitting the dignity of the human creature. The Catechism is clear that there is no sin in being gay; it's the homosexual act that is sinful. This is a huge point and will return later in our discussion.
- 2. He is urging us to respect all persons in general but specifically those who self-identify as gay as "persons" who are made in the image of God and worthy of our respect, as they are, without any changes. This is the character of love for which we are called in Christ. Incidentally he is acknowledging that we, as Church, are perhaps guilty of marginalizing members of the LGBT community by our failure to accept them as persons or by our actions that confirm our prejudice that they are defective in some way and "persona non grata" who are to be avoided.
- Following these remarks, he explicitly acknowledges that the Church should ask forgiveness from gays for the failure

- to courageously take action on their behalf but adds that we must equally ask forgiveness from the poor, from exploited women and children and for blessing the proliferation of arms. If we are listing carefully he is challenging us to positive action, to do something.
- Pope Francis tells us that "if a person has good will and seeks God, who are we to judge?" He also states that this person must be "accompanied pastorally." This idea of walking with someone is guintessential Francis. Much more common in Latin America or Europe, where people actually routinely walk to where they are going, this image illustrates the idea of fraternity. Walking together presupposes agreement or friendship. Persons walking together talk and discuss ideas. They do not have to agree in every aspect (and usually don't) but they find value in communication and mutually benefit from the shared journey.

Now let's try to pull all these themes together. Pope Francis is challenging us to be prepared to walk with anyone who will journey with us. In this specific case we are speaking about walking with members of the LGBT community. This is where attitudes make all the difference. For us as Church to walk with a member of the gay community, we must BOTH be willing to honestly discuss where we are in our life and our own, unique personal outlook. As a base for these discussions, we must both be

Tom was an endearing friend to many people. Along with his generous giving of himself, those of us who knew him well remember him for his love of corny jokes and colorful expressions. Taking leave of friends, he'd usually say, "I'm so glad you got to see me!" We heard his expressions with such regularity that we could join in to complete them. He would question the truthfulness of a statement with, "It's not cessanarily so." When asked how he was feeling, he'd answer, "Ultra-dynamic," even though he often wasn't feeling that way. If any of us commented that "we thought" this or that, his response almost without fail was, "And what did I tell you about thinking?" Or to feign hurt feelings, he'd say, "Now I resemble that."

Tom was definitely one of a kind. It would be hard to find someone who was more focused on service to others. His absence from our council and from his circle of friends will leave a gaping hole. We will miss him greatly.

Local Stores Seriously Curtain Council's Tootsie Roll Efforts

Council 6419 has go-getter cochairman for the 2016 Drive for People with Disabilities, otherwise known as the Tootsie Roll Drive. **Danny Morrison** and **George Purifoy** more than proved their mettle with the state-wide drive to raise funds for support of our diocesan seminarians. They were faithful soldiers in selling raffle tickets for the 2017 Chevy Colorado truck, netting from our council alone \$11,000. Already they are busy laying the groundwork for the Drive for People with Disabilities.

At this point Danny and George have secured Sam's Club for October 8, and Wal-Mart on Central Avenue for September 18. The Wal-Mart on Albert Pike, which has long been the biggest income producer, is still uncertain. The manager is on vocation until Wednesday, but at best we will get only one day instead of the

long-standing two-day collection. In addition, the new Wal-Mart Market on Airport Road is a good possibility for a collection site. A letter will be submitted next week to request that privilege from the store manager.

Just a few years ago we were netting around \$6000-6500 for the local First Step School and for Special Olympics. In fact, going back a good number of years we also brought in that much or even more from corporate donations brought in by two or our long-deceased members **Marvin Poe and Richard Knoth.** The corporate donations effort was abandoned years ago, mainly for lack of donation solicitors.

The current downturn in our collections comes directly from the local stores

denying our request for a two-day collection. Moreover, the Kroger stores, a consistent collection site for many years, have totally shut down our collections. And the Wal-Mart Super Stores not only are now limiting us to one day but actually just one afternoon (or one morning! The result of course is that contributions to First Step and to Special Olympics have been cut to no more than half, if that much, of past collections.

Because of the cut in collection hours, fewer volunteer collectors are now needed. Danny and George of course still need a good number of volunteers, but they are signing up people only for one-hour time slots instead of the former two-hour slots. Please volunteer your help or respond positively if you are asked to be a volunteer. Call George at 690-9891 or Danny at 615-4943.

Dear Jim,

In 2008 we had a crazy idea: pass out books at Christmas Mass! Why? For 32 percent of people who attend Mass at Christmas, it is the only time each year they attend Mass.

Since then, we have partnered with thousands of parishes and distributed more than 15 million books and CDs. Everyday we receive emails, phones calls, and letters from people telling us how one of these books changed their life.

What began as a crazy idea has become the most successful large-scale evangelization effort in America today. And yet, driven by our commitment to continuous improvement, each year we strive to make this incredible initiative more effective in every way.

Late last year, as we were shipping more than three million copies of *Rediscover Jesus* to more than four thousand parishes across the country, the leadership team at Dynamic Catholic gave me a new challenge: "Why don't you write a book that is specifically designed to re-engage disengaged Catholics and increase engagement among those who are at Church each week but don't really get it."

It was a beautiful challenge.

And resistance plays a powerful role in each of our lives every day, which is apparent in the opening pages.

Authors often share advance copies of their books with family and friends. You are very much my family and friends, and so I am honored to present you with this advance copy. As you read it, I ask you to pray, in a special way, for all the people who will receive it this Christmas. Pray that their hearts might be open to a new relationship with God and his Church.

I know how busy we all are and how difficult it is to find time to read. I would just encourage you to read one chapter each day. They are short chapters, designed for busy people, but if nothing else, read Chapter One today.

As an Ambassador, you are more familiar with my work than most, so I would like to let you know that I have included three stories in this book that I have used elsewhere. They were necessary to the continuity of the story, and I felt it important to have my journey documented altogether in one place. I am not losing my mind; I have repeated myself with intention and thank you for indulging me. I am still learning from the repeated stories, and I hope you will find something new in them also.

May God bless and reward you for your generosity toward the Dynamic Catholic mission. We are in this together, and together we are doing great things.
