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From Father George Sanders: "When Wholesome Games Take a Nasty Turn"



The following article from Father George was printed in December 2013. His current article will return in January.

Back in the day when kids actually played outside after school and games like "Kick the Can," "Hide

and Seek," kick-ball and sandlot baseball were all the rage, we often got together for a friendly game of "King of the Hill." On our block in the 60's, it was more entertainment than competition. These epic battles normally took place in my front yard, since it was a quickly sloping yard that terminated in a grassy drainage ditch before joining the seldom traveled road, providing a fairly wide, ready-made and safe field of combat. The noble pugilists included knights, maids and squires (from 5 to 12 years old) with the imagined story line more important than athletic ability. In our war games, women and children competed as well as the men in the welltimed and executed Hollywood stunt roll. (You know, the kind John Wayne might have done jumping from a crashing stage coach (being much more appreciated by the crowd than pride of place at the top.)

In our neighborhood of kids, it was really a lot of fun, and everyone was welcomed to join. But what was great kids' play loses some of its innocence and charm when we continue trying to play the same game as adults. No longer for fun, this game can be serious business with the players willing to do anything to get to the top. You probably know what I mean. In the adult game, being King of the Hill is all that matters, whether in friendly conversations, social engagements, or life in general. The weapons of warfare are jobs or positions or friends or vacations or educational/professional pedigrees; it's a matter of who you are, what you have, who you know and what you have done that gets you to the top. Reminiscent of professional wrestling, there are no friends, only foes in this free-for-all. Though many find themselves drawn into the game, there are two things that one should know before thinking about joining the fun.

First, the only way to get to the top is to pull everyone else down. The only way you can win is by making sure no one stands higher than you. You must dominate all contend-

Seasoned players of the adult type of this game are experts at one-upmanship. If you went to Chicago, they have been to Venice When you re excited about the new Ford you just bought, the words can barely escape your mouth before they begin to opine voluminously on the benefits of their BMW ("It costs quite a bit more, but it is certainly worth the price difference.") It's the rules of the game. No one can pretend any advantage over you. He must be cut down at all costs.

One other thing that you might want to know before committing to this game is that no one ever really wins. Your coronation is but momentary, a fleeting fame, because as soon as you scrap your way to the top, someone else will try to discredit or malign you so as to ascend to your rightful throne at the crest of the hill. That's just the way it is played. For those veterans of the game, I have noticed that they are all too often wounded, bleeding and battered, but they are still climbing that hill hoping against hope that they will finally win on the next try. In this adult game of King of the Hill, the only winners are those who have stepped far enough back to see the reality of the game and have come to see that the real winners in life have left this game in the innocence of childhood, where it belongs.

Plans in Infancy for Major Fund Raiser Toward Support of Seminarians

Many of you know that the Diocese of Little Rock for several years has sponsored a large dinner party aimed at generating funding for our diocesan seminarians. The event is called "A Taste of Faith." For a few years it was held at the Little Rock Embassy Suites, where it drew several hundred Catholics from parishes around the state. Then in August of 2014 the dinner was moved to the Little Rock Convention Center, whose banquet room can seat considerably more than Embassy Suites, and the attendance for and 2015 2014 must have been 7 0 0 - 8 0 0 people.

Their formal dinners are lovely, including ample beers and wines. Also included are talks by key clergy members, including Msgr. Scott Friend, the diocesan Director of Vocations. Present are Bishop Taylor and many priests. Our seminarians are always introduced and they provide a nice program, including music, and a few of them tell their vocation stories. Of course, the attendees have responded in advance of their plans to be present, an absolute essential item of information for the

planning committee. While there is no charge for tickets to the dinner, everyone knows the purpose of the dinner and, therefore, an appeal for a monetary commitment is forthcoming. Msgr. Friend has the honor; and if you know, Msgr. Friend, you know he knows how to make a strong appeal.

St. John's and St. Mary's Parishes have had excellent representation at these annual dinners from the beginning. **But now we would like to initiate a similar fund-raising dinner locally.** Of course we have had a couple of such dinners in our council hall, but now Council 6419, with consideration of the major importance of the cause, would like to expand the size of our local contribution in support of our future diocesan priests.

The Diocese of Little Rock has chosen Saturday, November 12 as the date for our first fund-raising event. That is the first date that representatives from the Vocations Department can be present. It is hoped of course that **Msgr. Friend** can be present as well as **Father Erik Pohlmeier** and others. Msgr. Friend's health is a pos-

sible conflicting issue.

So our plans are very preliminary, with most details still to be determined. The Diocesan Office has requested that we choose an event name different from "A Taste of Faith." At least tentatively, that name will be "Our Living Supper." The dinner is being sponsored by Hot Springs Fourth Degree Assembly 1892 and the chairman of this first event will be Faithful Navigator **Joe Kanopsic.** So far, members of Council 6419 and Assembly 1892 have pledged over \$1700 toward financing the dinner.

The chosen site is the Parish Hall of St. Mary of the Springs Church, which has a seating capacity of approximately 250 people. A principal organizing couple is **Sue and Dennis Wood**, who are requesting other volunteers to step forward to join the organizational phase. seminarians and seeing them through the long journey to ordination. Consider this: In 2014 the population of Arkansas was approximately 3,000,000 with 122,842 (4.1 percent) Catholics. In contrast, the Diocese of Galveston-Houston at the same time had 6,249,000 people of which 1,181,000 (20%) were Catholic. In spite of this huge difference in the Catholic population, while the Diocese of Little Rock currently has 41 seminarians, Galveston-Houston has 47, just six more. Clearly, the efforts by the Vocations and Seminarian Office of

our diocese have been incredibly fruitful. Certainly **Msgr. Friend** has had remarkable results, as have his assistants, including **Father Erik**.

While our "Living Supper" plans are in their infancy, this undertaking is of huge importance. We're talking about support of our future priests. In a world that has seen a big decline in our priests and other religious, our Diocese is obviously doing something right. The seminarian increase in recent yeas has been gratifying. But we

realize that we must do what we can to make easier the long journey from the discernment stage to ordination and a lifetime vocation.

Our hope is that local interest in this undertaking will reap great rewards for future diocesan vocations. This mission is too important to neglect. Conceivably there could be more people wanting to participate than we have present space to accommodate. Wouldn't that be a nice problem to have? In that event, who's to say that we can't eventually relocate to larger venue? Please help us do this work for the Lord

Ben Stein's "Confessions for the Holidays"

Apparently the White House referred to Christmas Trees as 'Holiday Trees' for the first time this year, [2005] which prompted Ben Stein, to say, on CBS Sunday Morning, "I am a Jew, and every single one of my ancestors was Jewish. And it does not bother me even a little bit when people call those beautiful lit up, bejeweled trees Christmas trees. I don't feel threatened. I don't feel discriminated against. That's what they are: Christmas trees. It doesn't bother me a bit when people say, "Merry Christmas" to me. I don't think they are slighting me or getting ready to put me in a ghetto. In fact, I kind of like it. It shows that we are all brothers and sisters celebrating this happy time of year. It doesn't bother me at all that there is a manger scene on display at a key intersection near my beach house in Malibu. If people want a nativity scene, it's just as fine with me as is the Menorah a few hundred yards away.

"I don't like getting pushed around for being a Jew, and I don't think Christians like getting pushed around for being Christians. I think people who believe in God are sick and tired of getting pushed around, period. I have no idea where the concept came from, that America is an explicitly atheist country. I can't find it in the Constitution and I don't like it being shoved down my throat.

"Or maybe I can put it another way: where did the idea come from that we should worship celebrities and we aren't allowed to worship God? I guess that's a sign that I'm getting old, too. But there are a lot of us who are wondering where these celebrities came from and where the America we knew went to.

"In light of the many jokes we send to one another for a laugh, this is a little different: This is not intended to be a joke; it's not funny, it's intended to get you thinking.

"Billy Graham's daughter was interviewed on the 'Early Show' and Jane Clayson asked her 'How could God let something like this happen?' (regarding Hurricane Katrina). Anne Graham gave an extremely profound and insightful response. She said, 'I believe God is deeply saddened by this, just as we are, but for years we've been telling God to get out of our schools, to get out of our government and to get out of our lives. And being the gentleman He is, I believe He has calmly backed out. How can we expect God to give us His blessing and His protection if we demand He leave us alone?'

"In light of recent events... terrorist attacks, school shootings, etc. I think it started when Madeleine Murray O'Hare (she was murdered, her body found a few years ago) complained she didn't want prayer in our schools, and we said OK. Then someone said you better not read the Bible in school. The Bible says thou shalt not kill; thou shalt not steal, and love your neighbor as yourself. And we said OK.

"Then Dr. Benjamin Spock said we shouldn't spank our children when they misbehave, because their little personalities would be warped and we might damage their self-esteem (Dr. Spock's son committed suicide). We said an expert should know what he's talking about. And we said okay.

"Now we're asking ourselves why our children have no conscience, why they don't know right from wrong, and why it doesn't bother them to kill strangers, their classmates, and themselves.

"Probably, if we think about it long and hard enough, we can figure it out. I think it has a great deal to do with 'WE REAP WHAT WE SOW.'

"Funny how simple it is for people to trash God and then wonder why the world's going to hell. Funny how we believe what the newspapers say, but question what the Bible says.

"Funny how you can send 'jokes' through e-mail and they spread like wildfire, but when you start sending messages regarding the Lord, people think twice about sharing.

"Funny how lewd, crude, vulgar and obscene articles pass freely through cyberspace, but public discussion of God is suppressed in the school and workplace.
