(Councils of District 10—Benton, Hot Springs Village, and Hot Springs—hosted the convention. Large Council of the Year has come to our council three of the last four years! I congratulate council members for this achievement. So much involvement in multiple areas has resulted in this high honor. The involvement goes beyond our council members to many council wives and council friends who have played indispensable roles in our council success, especially with our

twice-a-year Charity Rummage Sales. So congratulations go to them as well. Thank you members; thank you, ladies!

Our responsibility as hosts included arranging the Saturday evening Mass at St. Mary's and also the Sunday morning Necrology Mass officiated by **Father George Sanders**. Having participated in Masses at both St. Mary's and St. John's, I declare that their choirs are top quality. On Saturday night I heard one of the best vocals ever from **Denise Steinhaus**, wife of council member John. Following the Mass, I heard one visitor ask where we hired the choir. One small hiccup was our failure to have secured a reader of Scripture. **John Steinhaus** came forward to do just that.

Three of our council wives did a fabulous job with decorations at the

Arlington banquet room. **Cheryl King, Carole Cook, and Evelyn Worsham** brought their creativity to design and build gorgeous table arrangements for all tables and a special creation for the head table. The Friday night dance was quite nice, largely because council member **Larry Womack** and his band **Salt and Pepper** provided the music.

The focus of the Convention was our seminarians, present and future, including the sale of raffle tickets for the 2016 Chevy Colorado pickup truck. State Deputy Adrian Dominquez recognized **Larry and Madelyn Womack's son Luke**, one of our diocesan seminarians whose ordination to the

## Successful Rummage Sale Behind Us

Once again, we have closed out another successful Charity Rummage Sale. "Success," as in the case of this Rummage Sale is a relative term. With \$25,668 gross proceeds, we surpassed the \$24,718 total from our Sale one year ago. On the other hand, we fell almost \$6000 behind our 2015 fall sale, which brought in \$31,500, our record sale. Over all, our usual crowds seemed somewhat smaller than ordinary, though the half-price items in *Spirit Hall* on the last day

brought the usual large crowd. It is an interesting observation that, without exception, the fall Sales for whatever reason have generated more income than the spring Sales.

As always, thousands of man/woman hours combined to carry out our mission to financially assist nine major charities in Hot Springs. Several men and women have committed themselves to devote many hours to our cause, working frequently even on cold winter days when the

temperature inside *Spirit Hall* is about as cold as that outside (and also in the summer heat when the buildings are miserably hot) Several men are on-call throughout the year to drive throughout the county collecting donated items.

**From Father George Sanders: "Offerings"**

"Blessed are You Lord God of all creation For through your goodness we have received the bread that we offer you, fruit of the earth and work of human hands. It will become for us the Bread of Life."

This, as I am sure you recognize, is the prayer that priests pray over the offerings at every Mass. Though it is fairly short, it is brimming with meaning, and if we listen with our hearts we can find within its lines a secret to happiness and purpose in our lives. Let's now look at this ancient Jewish Blessing a little more closely together. In the first few words we recognize God as the Creator but more importantly as Our Creator, the One that made heaven and earth and all that is in them. This is a very profound beginning and one that will form the foundation of everything else we will say here. Through this recognition we are professing our relationship to Him; He made us and we are His. Through professing the title "Lord God" we are recognizing his right to rule over us and our dependence on Him; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture, who exist only at and for his divine pleasure. We further address him as Blessed. In doing so we are paying appropriate homage to Him and worshiping Him, the act of attributing worth or value. Calling God *Blessed* also shows our thankfulness for his benevolence to us, his creatures, servants and sons.

Now that we have properly stated our relationship, we proceed to qualify why we are blessing Him. We bless Him because His Goodness has given us the bread that we are now offering to Him. This within itself is a profound theological point. We are confessing that we have nothing of our own, nothing originating from us, that we can give Him. That which we do now give Him is from His gifts to us. We are intentionally offering the gifts on the altar back to God, yet with one very important difference.

In this offering, the "fruits of the earth and vine" which we acknowledge are gifts from God are going to be mixed together with our own personal gift, the work of our own hands. Without God's first action, creation, we would have nothing to give but as a result of his gift and in recognition of His Goodness to us, we add something from ourselves to the offering; we add our cultivating, our harvesting, grinding, preparing and baking; we add our fermenting, our time and bottling. In a word we add our craftsmanship to what God has given us. If you think about this, it's kind of an amazing thought that we are "creating" something new from His Creation and gift to us; grapes become wine, wheat becomes bread. In so doing we are joining God in this creative movement; together we are bringing into existence something that, by divine design, requires a joining of human and divine agencies to create something that will become our offering of thanksgiving

back to God, a sacrifice acceptable to Him.

And now the final movement in this Great Thanksgiving begins. The prayer ends with the acknowledgement that this sacrifice, which is made in response to God's command and offered willingly and in thanksgiving to Him for his divine goodness to us, will be changed once again in its reception; creation will be re-created. If you will accept it, this creation and re-creation is the meaning of life. Just like the wheat and the grapes, God lovingly gives us life at our conception and fills us with all the things necessary to grow and to develop into the sons and daughters He intended. But this is the first creation. We will add our own craftsmanship to His gift, by our lives. What we add, of course, will be up to us. And what we will be in the end depends on our decisions and whether we are willing to make our lives an offering that is acceptable to Him. Life in its essence is realizing that life itself is a gift from God, Our Creator, and then treating this gift with the dignity and honor it is due. By recognizing that we are not our own, and acknowledging our Lord God by our actions, we put life in its proper perspective. Gratefulness for His Goodness to us leads us to receiving with thanksgiving all that God has given us and then offering it then back up to Him. It is in this act of creation and recreation, of receiving and offering, that life actually begins to make sense. Living life

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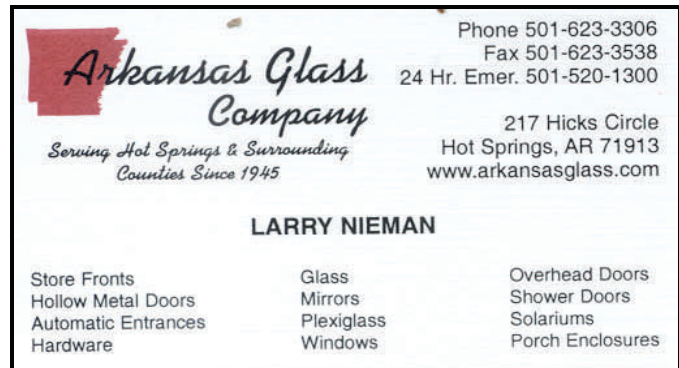

Point, the local pregnancy crisis center. Our annual Baby Bottle Campaign, chaired by David Myers, this year brought in \$8000 toward operating expenses of Change Point, whose purpose is to redirect pregnant women's intent to abort unplanned, unwanted pregnancies. This \$8000 is supplemented by an additional \$300 each month from our twice-a-year Charity Rummage Sales. The ultrasound used by Change Point also was a donation from Council 6419 in conjunction with the Supreme Council in New Haven, Connecticut.

The dominant activity of Council 6419 in the month of May clearly was our spring Charity Rummage Sale that once again involved a huge number of men and women. I will leave the details of this undertaking to Chairman **Jim Lockwood**. [See his article, p. 1].

On the horizon is another major Fourth Degree Assembly involvement: a dinner patterned after the "A Taste of Faith" dinner held each

year in Little Rock for support of diocesan seminarians. Our local effort, tentatively to be called "Our Living Supper," is set for October 29. Since this undertaking will be sponsored by the Fourth Degree Assembly, I will leave further details to Assembly Faithful Navigator **Joe Kanopsic** [See Joe's article, p. 2] At this time I express a special thanks to **Cheryl King, Carole King, and Evelyn Worsham** not only for their special contribution to the State Convention with their beautifully decorated tables but also for overtime work convincing the State Deputy to allow them (and us) to use those same decorations for the October 29 dinner for seminarian support.

Our ambition has led us to begin putting together a Second and Third Degree Exemplification team for District 10, which will complement our present First Degree team. We will be meeting on alternate Mondays at

6:30 p.m. for training purposes. We met on May 23, so we hope to see you at the next meeting on June 6.

Other special interests of mine (and of other individuals at both St. Mary's and St. John's) are the Haiti and Russian mission involvements. St. Mary's and St. John's have been supporters of much-needed quality of life improvements in rural Haiti. Several men are active participants in this work, traveling to Haiti with supplies and with their expertise in varied projects. **Father West** of St. John's promotes mission work in Vladivostok, Russia.
