As of June 30, 2021 total membership stands at 2,014,569 with Texas accounting for approximately 109,000 members.

Pretty good numbers, right? Maybe, because another often heard utterance is "you can't drop members therefore the numbers just grow unchecked". Not so. There is a proscribed process that must be rigidly adhered to before a member can be dropped. The process is based on doing everything possible to retain members before dropping them. If the process is followed, members can be dropped from your roles. I hear from other District Deputies and other State Leaders every year stories of Councils trying to drop members and not doing it the proper way. This is where stories are heard about Councils trying to drop the 99 year old who has been a member for sixty years because he hadn't paid dues in two years (he was in assisted living but the Council didn't keep up with him), the member who had been deceased for five years, but again the Council didn't keep up with him, or the Council who turned in a list of drops which included their Financial Secretary.

So, take another look at the membership totals from the Supreme Secretary's report. In the 2020-2021 fraternal year Order wide membership grew by 87,410. membership gain was 15,094. That is about eight tenths of a percent net growth.

In Texas net gain was 605. That equates to a little under six tenths of one percent net membership growth.

The Knights of Columbus is not a parish ministry. This is a startling fact to some. Yes, in Texas we intentionally align Councils with parishes and yes, the Supreme Council is pushing for Councils to align that way in all jurisdictions and yes, this can cause confusion as to what the KofC really is.

Because our members are passionate about supporting their parishes and their priests important aspects of the KofC are often misunderstood or not known. In this vein, here is a summary of important facts every Knight should know.

INSURANCE

The Venerable Father Michael McGivney founded the Order explicitly as a "lay organization, the goal of which would be to prevent Catholic men from entering secret societies whose membership was antithetical to Church teaching, to unite men of Catholic faith and to provide for the families of deceased members."

The KofC was founded to provide life insurance for members. Too often members are heard uttering a variant of "all the Knights want to do is sell insurance". That is not all the Knights want to do although it is at the core of what we do.

The truth is our insurance program is why we were founded and helps keep us financially strong.

In 2020, Knights of Columbus donated more than \$150,000,000 to charity. In the last decade over \$1,500,000,000 has been donated to charity by the Knights of Columbus.

Approximately 28% (556,010) of members have life insurance, long term care, disability insurance or an annuity with the Knights. Just imagine what we could do if that number were higher!

Yes, the KofC does want to insure members.

HISTORY OF NOVEMBER FEASTS

Everybody knows the secular holiday of Halloween, but not everybody knows it derives from a holy day, All Saints' Day on Nov. 1st which is followed by All Souls' Day on Nov. 2nd. The root word of Halloween – "hallow" means "holy" and the suffix "een" is an abbreviation of "evening". It refers to the Eve of All Hallows, the night before the Christian holy day that honors saintly people in the past.

More than a thousand years ago in Ireland and Britain, a common custom of Christians was to come together on the eve of the Feast of All Hallows Day to ask for God's blessing and protection from evil in the world. Often, they would dress in costumes of saints or evil spirits and act out the battle between good and evil around bonfires. That's the source of the modern observance of Halloween.



Every year, on Nov. 1st, Catholics and other Christians around the world observe All Saints' Day which honors all saints of the church deemed to have attained heaven. In the Eastern Orthodox Church, All Saints' Day is observed on the first Sunday after Pentecost. The Christian concept of

the importance of the individual soul underlies All Saints' and All Souls' Day which are observed worldwide primarily in the Catholic and Anglican traditions. Here's a look at the tradition of this holy day. While now observed on Nov. 1st, All Saints' Day was originally celebrated on May 13th. Pope Boniface IV formally started what would be later known as All Saints' Day on May 13, 609 AD when he dedicated the Pantheon in Rome as a church in honor of the Virgin Mary and all martyrs. The current date of Nov. 1st was established by Pope Gregory III during his reign from 731 to 741 AD, when he dedicated a chapel in Rome in St. Peter's Basilica in honor of All Saints'. While the celebration was originally limited to Rome, later, in 837 AD, Pope Gregory IV ordered the official observance of All Saints' Day every Nov. 1st, and extended its celebration to the entire church.

All baptized Christians who have died and are now with God in glory are considered saints. All Saints' Day is intended to honor the memory of countless unknown and uncanonized saints who have no feast days. We thank God for giving ordinary men and women a share in His holiness and heavenly glory as a reward for their faith. This feast is observed to teach us to honor the saints, both by imitating their lives and by seeking their intercession for us before Christ, the only mediator between God and man. The church reminds us that God's call for holiness is universal, that all of us are called to live in His love and to make His love real in the lives of those around us. Holiness is related to the word wholesomeness. We grow in holiness when we live wholesome lives of integrity, truth, justice, charity, mercy, and compassion, sharing our blessings with others.

Here are some reasons why we honor the saints:

- The saints put their trust in Christ and lived heroic lives of faith
- The saints are our role models
- The saints are our Heavenly mediators who intercede for us before Jesus, the only mediator between God and us
- The saints are the instruments that God uses to work miracles at present

Traditionally, All Saints' Day is a Holy Day of Obligation, meaning Catholics must attend Mass, unless they are prevented by illness or another sufficient excuse. However, Mass attendance was not mandatory this year because the holiday fell on a Monday. When Nov. 1st falls on a Monday or a Saturday adjacent to the Sunday Sabbath, Catholics are encouraged, but not required, to attend Mass.

I'd like to share a story with you told by Father Anthony Kadavil, who is Chaplain at Sacred Heart Home in Mobile, AL. "What is it like to be a Christian Saint? It's like being a Halloween pumpkin. God picks you up from the field, brings you in, washes all the dirt off you. Then he cuts off the top and scoops out the yucky stuff. He removes the pulp of impurity and injustice and the seeds of doubt, hate and greed. Then, he carves you a new smiling face and puts His light of holiness inside you for the whole world to see. This is the Christian idea behind the carved pumpkins during the Halloween season."

For the Good of the Order (cont'd)



November 2nd is All Souls' Day, a day to pray for the souls of all who have died. Among Catholics, prayers are offered for those in purgatory waiting to get into Heaven. In the Americas, church ritual mixed with native celebration of ancestors. Mayans, Incas, and other native Americans had great reverence for the dead, and ancestor worship was culturally important. That tradition blended into the Catholic holy days of the dead. In many Latin countries, Nov. 2nd is a national holiday – the Day of the Dead or Dia de los Muertos, the climax of the Day of the Dead. It's the climax of three days of celebration: All Hallows Eve, All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, People often dress as skeletons as a way of remembering the dead and celebrating their ancestors.

In Catholic Churches on Nov. 2nd, for All Souls' Day, one of the readings during Mass is from the Book of Wisdom, which is biblical for Catholics and Eastern Orthodox, but not for Protestants who don't include it in their Bible: "The souls of the just are in the hands of God, and no torment shall touch them", the Book of Wisdom says. "They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead: and their passing away was thought an affliction and their going forth from us, utter destruction. But they are in peace".

In closing, I would like to remind you of Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, November 28th. Please try to attend Mass if possible – it is usually celebrated at 9 AM. I'd also like to give you an all-encompassing Prayer of Thanksgiving written by John J. Cardinal Carberry, Archbishop of St. Louis on December 8, 1977. It is a beautiful prayer and I hope you feel inclined to pray it at your Thanksgiving Dinner.
