"Crucify him" versus "Father forgive them!"

Venerable Brothers, I want us to reflect on "crucify him" versus "Father forgive them!" Crucifixion is an act of execution of a person by nailing or binding the person to a cross; this was performed by the Romans and others. The one to be crucified was stripped naked, and then followed the most awful moment of all. He would be laid upon the cross with his arms stretched along the cross-beams, and at the center of each open palm the point of a huge iron nail was placed, which, by the blow of a mallet, was driven home into the wood. It was unanimously considered as the most horrible form of death and punishment among heathen nations in early centuries. But to a Jew it was regarded as a greatest disgrace and a curse (Deut.21: 22-23). This punishment began by subjecting the sufferer to scourging. In the case of Jesus Christ, however, his scourging was rather before the sentence was passed upon him (Jn. 19:1). When Pontius Pilate declared: "Behold, the man!" the Jews cried out in response "Crucify him, Crucify him!" (Jn. 19:6). Pilate himself was surprised to hear Jews demanding Jesus' crucifixion, for he stated "I find no guilt in him" (Jn. 19:6). Luke also established Jesus' innocent in his narrative that Pilate **pronounced Jesus' innocence three times** (23:4, 14-16, 22).

Normally, the condemned one carries his own cross to the place of execution, which was outside the city, in some conspicuous place set apart for the purpose. Before the nailing to the cross took place, a medicated cup of vinegar mixed with gall and myrrh was given, for the purpose of deadening the pangs of the sufferer. Our Lord refused this cup, that his senses might be clear (Mat.27:34; Jn.19:29). The accounts given of the crucifixion of our Lord are in entire agreement with the customs and practices of the Romans in such cases. He was crucified between two "malefactors" (Is. 53:12; Lk. 23:32), and was watched by a party of four soldiers (Jn. 19:23, Mt. 27:36;54), with their centurion. The "breaking of the legs" of the malefactors was intended to hasten death, and to put them out of their misery (Jn. 19:31); but the unusual rapidity of our Lord's death (Jn. 19:33) was due to his previous sufferings and his great mental anguish. The omission of the breaking of Jesus' legs was the fulfilment of a type of Exodus (Ex. 12:46). He literally died of a broken heart, a ruptured heart, and hence the flowing of blood and water from the wound made by the soldier's spear (Jn. 19:34).

On the cross, Jesus Christ uttered seven memorable sentences, namely "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do" (Lk. 23:34). Second, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (Lk. 23:43). Three, "woman, behold, your son" then he said to the disciple, "behold your mother" (Jn. 19:26-27). Four, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachtani?" (Mat. 27:46) or "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" (Mk. 15:34). Five, "I thirst" (Jn. 19:28). Six, "it is finished" (Jn. 19:30). Seven, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit" (Lk. 23:46).

According to Luke, the first words Jesus spoke on the cross were "Father, forgive them" (Lk. 23:34). The question is why should Jesus pray for the forgiveness for his enemies? Maybe Jesus wanted to be more practical. Because he himself has taught us to love our enemies and to pray for those who persecute us (Mt. 5:44). In the opinion of Saint Aelred the Abbot, Jesus' prayer "Father forgive them" is full of warmth, of love and of unshakable serenity. As if, it was not enough to pray for them; he also wanted to make excuses for them. He completed the prayer, saying "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." They are great sinners; yes, but they have little understanding of judgment; therefore, Father, forgive them. They are nailing me to the cross, but they do not know who it is that they are nailing to the cross. If they had known, they would never have crucified the Lord of glory. Therefore, Father, forgive them.

In conclusion, Venerable Brothers, let us follow the good example of Jesus as St. Peter admonishes us that Christ suffered for us and left us an example to follow in his footsteps (1Pt. 2:21-24). Jesus has made it abundantly clear that if we do not forgive others their sins, our heavenly Father will not forgive us (Mt. 6:14). Do we need to hold grudges against those who trespass against us and continue to ask God for mercy? Let us admit that to err is human but to forgive is divine and do our best to forgive one another. As a matter of fact, all human beings have tendency to make mistakes. Therefore, let us do our uppermost best to forgive those who seek to crucify us for no reason, and like Jesus Christ, whenever we hear crucify him we will respond, Father forgive them for they do not know what they are doing!
