Chaplain's Reflection Fasting by Subtraction

In the Gospel passage regarding the greatest commandment, a scribe correctly interprets what Jesus said as meaning that 'to love (God) with all your heart, with all your understanding, with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself' is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." (cf. Mk 12:28-34).

This means that if our Lenten sacrifices do not demonstrate that we love our neighbor as ourselves, they are nothing more than a modern day equivalent of burnt offerings. While traditional Lenten sacrifices like giving up certain foods are a form of self-denial, they are focused only on ourselves and not on the good of our neighbor. And if these sacrifices make us irritable with those around us, they are actually a negative.

Since Lent is a time for spiritual growth, let me suggest a different kind of Lenten penance. Since Lent is still relatively young, you might find these suggestions helpful in your own life.

Lent always highlights three things: prayer, fasting and giving alms. We are all familiar with prayer. Prayer is our personal conversation with God. We can do that in formal prayers or in private conversation with God using our own words.

There was once a little girl who was asked if she said her night prayers. She replied, "I started to. But then I thought to myself, 'I bet God gets tired of hearing all these prayers,' so I told God the story of the three bears!" But, you know what? That little girl got it. Prayer is telling God the story of our lives and inviting God into our lives.

Fasting is typically giving up some amount of food. But there's another way to look at "giving up." What if we decided to give up negativity? One suggestion would be to give up saying just *one* negative thing each day. For example, if you ordinarily say 20 negative things to your brother each day, for Lent only say 19! Don't say the one additional negative comment.

Giving alms, obviously, involves giving of what we have to help someone else. It is stewardship when we do this because we believe in God. But have we ever thought of giving praise or compliments each day? If we are going to subtract one negative thing each day, why not compliment each person in our family each day. Each day for the rest of Lent find something to praise every person in your circle of family or friends, most especially your spouse, to whom you made vows "to

It's time. It's time to rip the band-aid off and address the wound. No more kicking the can down the road. No more closing our eyes, covering our ears and hoping things resolve themselves. It's time to face the truth, address the problems and endeavor to institute permanent changes in how we conduct daily operations in order to resolve the problem. "What problem" you ask? The financial crisis that the Clubhouse is in.

In my five short years as a Knight, the hot topic at the Council has consistently been the steeply declining revenue for the Clubhouse. I've heard many well-intentioned proposals for boosting said revenue and ideas for attracting new clientele to rent our Hall, only to watch those ideas expire for lack of commitment to change. I myself succumbed to the seemingly logical decision to renovate the Hall and thereby increase the pool of prospective clients clamoring to throw money at us to use a beautifully-renovated space. The decline in rentals continues - the truth has hit hard yet again.

I have convened an Oversight Committee (comprised of trustees, officers, Executive Assistant Frank Zarelli, and business and financial experts Mark Svrcek and Tim Stocker) to work with the Clubhouse Board to gain a clearer understanding of this crisis. As an example of our findings, allow me to share a snapshot of critical financial data gleaned from Frank Zarrelli and (Clubhouse Accountant) Ed Jordan's initial analysis:

In 2015, catering revenue from membership was \$236,674, and 2018 is on pace to be \$134, 838. That's a 57% decline in Membership-generated revenue of \$101,836 in just the past four years alone. Every entrepreneur and businessperson would then look at their expenses and expect a corresponding decline in expenses. Brace yourselves for this calculation: In 2015, catering expenses were \$167,592 and 2018 is on pace to hit \$135,326. That's a 20% decline in expenses of only \$32,266 over the same 4-year period and equates to 100% of projected 2018 revenue.

Brothers, this represents only one segment of the analysis done to date. We currently have a stack of 60+ and 90+ day overdue invoices

have and to hold."

There was a story about a woman who had decided to divorce her husband. However, before she divorced him, she wanted to give her marriage one last chance. So she decided to spend a 30-day period in which she found something to praise her husband for every day and refrained from criticizing him each day. At the end of 30 days, her husband was a different person. She didn't divorce him! But who had changed? She had changed and, therefore, he had the opportunity to be different as well.

We don't change the world by changing someone else. We change the world by changing ourselves. If we are putting out negative energy, it will be reflected back to us. If we are putting out positive energy, that will come back to us as well. We can go through life reacting to what happens to us and ending up frustrated, angry or depressed. Or we can go through life creating a positive energy field around us.

So, if we subtract one negative comment and offer a compliment to each person in our lives for the rest of Lent, we will have a new family on Easter. The family will be different because we are different. We work miracles, not by trying to change someone else, but by changing ourselves!
