Grand Knight's Message

Brothers,

This past Monday, February 25, a bill dubbed the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act was put to vote in the Senate. The bill would have required that doctors care for a newborn baby who survived an abortion the same way they care for other newborns. If doctors failed to give medical care to a living baby, they would face criminal penalties.

The bill failed to garnish the 60 votes required to overcome a filibuster. The opposition stated there was no need for the legislation and cast it as an attempt to limit women's abortion choices. So, I ask, what about the rights of a living, breathing, human being? The U.S. is one of only seven countries that permits abortions past 20 weeks and we now have states that allow an abortion up until birth and even infanticide after an abortion.

I will not present a list of the Senators who voted against the bill, you can do that on your own. Sadly, candidates that have thrown their hat into the ring for the 2020 Presidential run will be on the list of those who voted no.

I have seen polls where most Americans are not in favor of 3rd trimester abortions. Even with that fact, we allow a group of politicians to make decisions that go against our wishes.

Keep all of this in mind when it comes time to cast your vote or better yet, let these politicians know how you feel right now. Continue to pray for the defenseless infants and the mothers who are considering an abortion. Also, pray for the doctors and abortion clinic staff that they might be enlightened and have a change of heart.

Venerable Father McGivney

Father McGivney's vision remains as relevant as ever in the changed circumstances of today's church and society." - Pope John Paul II

Is now the time for an American parish priest to be declared a Catholic saint?



In Father Michael McGivney (1852-1890), born and raised in a Connecticut factory town, the modern era's ideal of the priesthood hit its zenith. The son of Irish immigrants, he was a man to whom "family values" represented more than mere rhetoric. And he

left a legacy of hope still celebrated around the world.

In the late 1800s, discrimination against American Catholics was widespread. Many Catholics struggled to find work and ended up in inferno-like mills. An injury or death of the wage earner would leave the family penniless. The grim threat of chronic homelessness and even starvation could fast become realities. Called to action in 1882 by his sympathy for these suffering people, Father McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus, an organization that has helped to save countless families from the indignity of destitution. From its uncertain beginnings, when Father McGivney was the only person willing to work toward its success, it has grown to an international membership of more than 1.8 million members.

At heart, though, Father McGivney was never anything more than an American parish priest, and nothing less than that, either - beloved by children, trusted by young adults, and regarded as a "positive saint" by the elderly in his New Haven parish.

In this incredible work of academic research, Douglas Brinkley and Julie Fenster re-create the life of Father McGivney, a fiercely dynamic yet tenderhearted man. Though he was only thirtyeight when he died, Father McGivney has never been forgotten. He remains a true "people's priest," a genuinely holy man - and perhaps the most beloved parish priest in U.S. history. Moving and inspirational, Parish Priest chronicles the process of canonization that may well make Father McGivney the first American-born parish priest declared a saint by the Vatican.
