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CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

The Gift of Unity in Charity

Since Easter, the beauty of the liturgy has been accompanied with the book of Acts of Apostles recalling the miracle of the beginning of a Christian community and its unity. This unity is a gift, the great gift for which we should pray every day for Christians and human beings, especially nowadays when Christians and minor religious entities are being persecuted and decimated.

Barnabas who was sent to Antioch "saw the grace of God," which is the unity of the believers in Christ Jesus who remained faithful to the Lord in firmness of heart.

May the penetrating grace poured out by the sacraments unify us more perfectly in Christ and in His teaching through the Catholic Church, which is not something decided later by the work men did in the early experience of the Church. Indeed: "In keeping with the Lord's command, the Gospel was handed on in two ways: Orally "by the apostles who handed on, by the spoken word of their preaching, by the example they gave, by the institutions they established, what they themselves had received - whether from the lips of Christ, from his way of life and his works or whether they had learned it at the prompting of the Holy Spirit and "In writing by those apostles and other men associated with the apostles who, under the inspiration of the same Holy Spirit, committed the message of salvation to writing." (CCC 76).

"In order that the full and living Gospel might always be preserved in the Church, the apostles left bishops as their successors. They gave them their own position of teaching authority." Indeed, "the apostolic preaching, which is expressed in a special way in the inspired books, was to be preserved in a continuous line of succession until the end of time." (CCC 77).

This living transmission is called Tradition, since it is distinct from Sacred Scripture, though closely connected. Through Tradition, "the Church, in her doctrine, life and worship, perpetuates and transmits to all generation all that she herself is, all that she (Continued on page 3)

Habitat for Humanity Habitat for Humanity of Washington, DC Building the Pope Francis House in Northeast DC

Habitat for Humanity of Washington, DC (DC Habitat) has received a generous, anonymous donation in honor of Pope Francis and his recent visit to Washington, DC. Because this donor is passionate about engaging the Catholic community in charitable work, he has challenged DC Habitat to raise funds to match this \$60,000 contribution. The affordable housing charity is enlisting both volunteer service and financial contributions from the DC Catholic populace, as well as from interfaith groups and student organizations. The purpose of this house is threefold:

- To honor Pope Francis for his commitment to social justice and reinvigorating the Catholic Church;
- To provide a unifying, celebratory opportunity for both Catholic and non-Catholic volunteers to work together toward a common goal (as Pope Francis says, "Work confers dignity."); and
- To further Habitat's mission of building and preserving homes.

The Pope Francis house will be a rehabilitation of four one-bedroom condominiums in a building at 60th Street NE in Washington, DC.
