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Chaplain's Reflection The Problem of Suffering

The Old Testament figure Job complains that life on earth is a drudgery and that his days on earth come to an end without hope. Job is a prosperous landowner, blessed with a happy home and faithful to his religious duties. The Lord even boasts to Satan about what a virtuous man Job is. Satan responds that Job's prayers would stop if his prosperity suddenly failed. So, the Lord reluctantly lets Satan do his worst. When some of Job's friends come along with words of religious comfort, it doesn't seem to help him at all.

Even today, the human condition can still suffer "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune." What might a Christian have to say to Job or to people who reject the idea of a good and wise God? There is no easy answer to take away their pain. Job's cry of loneliness, grief and despair may not be the most profound insight into life, but his feeling is honest and strong.

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus responds when sick people come to him by simply healing them. Jesus does not debate the meaning of suffering, nor claim that suffering is a form of atonement for sin, nor say that suffering is God's way of testing our spiritual strength. No, Jesus simply stretches out his hand and heals.

Of course, Jesus no longer walks the earth, but the hands of Jesus still cure because his hands are our hands. Naturally, we cannot make illness go away like Jesus could. But we can help to ease the suffering of those around us by letting Christ himself act through us to ease the loneliness, care for people in need and comfort those who are anxious or broken hearted.

In his book, *The Problem of Pain*, Irish author C. S. Lewis reflects on the problem of suffering despite the existence of our good and gracious and loving God. C. S. Lewis concluded that like Job, we should humbly acknowledge the limits of human wisdom and not presume to fully fathom why God permits suffering and evil.

In *A Grief Observed*, C. S. Lewis vividly describes his own reactions, as a man of faith, to the slow and painful death from cancer experienced by his wife, Joy. His own rational faith fell to pieces when confronted with suffering of a devastatingly personal kind. He wrote, *"Where is God? Go to him when your need is* Grand Knight's Station

May is upon us, a welcome respite from a soggy/chilly/"what's-next" winter. And it's not just the weather that is springing to life, our Clubhouse activity level has sprung to life as well. Yes, you read that right, Clubhouse is trending toward positive!



The behind-the-scenes efforts put into the website and the word-of-mouth referrals have thus far resulted in 30+ Saturday bookings and the phone keeps ringing. The Oversight Committee and Trustees' financial reviews and business practice guidance enabled Clubhouse to pay \$12,000 in overdue bills and to show a \$2,000 profit for the month of April. Yet we've only just begun; our efforts will continue and we pray that you, our members, continue to book events and that the results therefore continue trending upward.

Unfortunately, our building itself is a completely opposite story; the years of neglect and lack of routine maintenance is accelerating the demise of systems that have already well exceeded their projected lifespan. The overwhelming majority of our mechanical systems are older than 20 years and some are pushing 30 years in service. We're working diligently and as swiftly as possible to tackle that conundrum and your participation moving forward is crucial.

In deference to the space required to publish our proposed budgets here in *Knight Life*, I'll close now with an apropos quote:

desperate, when all other help is vain, and what do you find? A door slammed in your face and a sound of bolting and double bolting on the inside. After that, silence."

Yet, even though his faith was shaken by the death of his wife, C. S. Lewis did not lose his faith. Through the darkness of this experience he came to love his wife even more deeply after her death. God had helped him realize that because the love he and his wife had for each other had reached its earthly limit, it was ready for its heavenly fulfilment.

Faith has to come to terms with the Cross. That is where Jesus himself entered fully into the darkness of human suffering. It was then that Jesus turned to God and also seemingly found a door slammed in his face, as he cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Yet God did not forsake Jesus, but brought Him through death into the fullness of life.

The Jesus who was crucified in weakness is the very same risen Lord who is with us in our own suffering moments. He is with us as one who knows our experience from the inside. Having gone down into the depths and having moved through those depths into a fuller life, he can enable us to do the same. Jesus is the good shepherd who, even as we walk through the valley of darkness, is there with his crook and his staff, leading us to springs of living water.

Father John Carroll was once the pastor of St. John's Church across the street from Rosensteel Council. In later years Archbishop John Carroll collaborated with Benjamin Henry Latrobe to construct the first metropolitan cathedral in America. Mr. Latrobe, a civil engineer and architect, had a significant influence on the planning of the District of Columbia and the final construction of the Capitol in Washington. The cornerstone of the new Baltimore Cathedral was laid in 1806 as construction was started. However, completion was delayed until 1821. The War of 1812 with the attack on Fort McHenry and Baltimore City by the British disrupted and delayed all plans.

The Basilica, America's first cathedral, is located on North Charles Street near the Walters Museum. The Peabody Music Conservatory is just a short distance North from the Inner Harbor. At one time, more priests were ordained there than in any other church in America. Fr. Michael McGivney, founder of the Knights of Columbus, was among those many priests. Pope Pius XI raised the cathedral to the rank of a basilica in 1937 to honor its great history in the church. The crypt holds the tombs of Archbishop John Carroll, Archbishop Martin Spalding and James Cardinal Gibbons.

In 2008, the Pope John Paul II Prayer Garden was opened just around the corner on Charles Street to commemorate the occasion that Pope John Paul visited and prayed in the cathedral. The garden provides a circular brick sidewalk to access points for rest, meditation and prayer during your visit. There are benches placed along the sidewalk among the azaleas, biannual flowers and roses which provide a place for rest and reflection in the garden.

Archbishop William Lori, the supreme chaplain of the Knights of Columbus since 2012, is in residence and can often be found celebrating Mass at this historic Maryland basilica. Recently, he has spoken out strongly against the deportation of those people who were brought to this country as small children and have grown up as American citizens.

If you plan to attend the convention in Ocean City, MD, with Rosensteel Council you will have an opportunity to meet with Archbishop Lori as well as take part in the many scheduled events. You may wish to share these memories with everyone at our monthly luncheon on May 22.

Building Association Update

A major mechanical failure in our primary air conditioning system has prompted the need to assess the condition of our building's mechanical equipment. As a result, the mechanical equipment was inspected, tested and evaluated by a mechanical engineer, who recommended replacement of five of our major air conditioning units (each is from 25 - 33 years old), the boiler heat system which is more than 60 years old and broken exhaust systems.

We plan to install a small solar system that is projected to cost half our present utility bill over 12 years; this projected savings will then be used to finance the replacement of the heat and cooling systems. These repairs to the existing heating and cooling equipment are included in the presented proposed budget shown on page 3 and financed over 12 years with the equipment as collateral.

Additional projects are being studied and planned to address the age of the building; resurfacing the parking lot and rain Frank Zarrelli water management.
