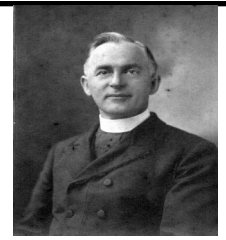

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## Chaplain's Reflection Physical Resurrection

On Easter Sunday, Jesus was physically resurrected in a glorified body and he appeared to witnesses chosen by God with whom he ate and drank. His disciples were preconditioned to believe in physical resurrection as a possibility, because our Christian belief in the resurrection of the body has its origins in Judaism. After death, the body returns to the earth, dust to dust, but our soul returns to God. Judaism and Christianity both believe in the eventual resurrection of all people of all ages, whose human bodies will be reunited with their souls at the end of time.

Belief in a bodily resurrection may seem foolishness to contemporary minds who require scientific proof of everything. But when viewed through the eyes of God, why would rebirth and resurrection be any more miraculous than birth? The coming together of sperm and egg in procreation is surely a miracle of the first magnitude.

Yet in his preoccupation with the things of this world, man ignores the miracle of his own existence. The idea of rebirth may seem hard to imagine because we have never experienced a similar occurrence. Although we can be active in procreating life, we cannot participate with God in the re-creation of life, something which He has reserved for Himself.

The re-creation of life is counter to any biological theory. Obviously, it was our loving God who created all men. So, surely resurrection is not beyond the capacity of God. Some wise men have simplified the concept of bodily resurrection by posing an analogy which brings it within the experience of man. A tree, once alive with blossoms and fruit, full of the sap of life, stands cold and still in the winter. Its leaves have browned and fallen, its fruit rots on the ground. But the warm rains come and the sun shines. Buds sprout. Green leaves appear. Colorful fruits burst from their seed. With the coming of spring, God resurrects nature.

Within this illustration are several ideas regarding the resurrection of the body. First, man does not

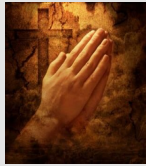

achieve his ultimate redemption through any action of his own. Rather, the concept of resurrection underscores man's reliance on God whose grace and mercy revives those who sleep in the dust. Second, resurrection is not just a private matter for the righteous individual. It is a corporate reward for the entire community of believers. And third, physical resurrection affirms unequivocally that man's soul and his body are the creations of a holy God.

Resurrection affirms that the body is of value because it came from God and it will be revived by God. The concept of resurrection serves to keep God ever in man's consciousness, to affirm the value of God's world and to heighten, rather than to depress, the value of man's worthy strivings in this world. We do not know what the afterlife will be like when our souls are reunited with our bodies at the end of time. But we can be sure that our good and gracious God will make the afterlife better than anything we ever dared to dream was possible.

Instead of focusing on Memorial Day, let's wish a happy Mother's Day to all members of the Rosensteel Retiree's Club who are mothers. The basic idea of celebrating mothers goes back to the Greek and Roman civilizations when the Greeks paid homage to the mothers of their gods and Romans dedicated a spring festival to the mothers of their gods.

In the 16<sup>th</sup> century, a celebration called "Mothering Sunday" was inaugurated as the day for visiting one's mother, whereby the eldest son or daughter would bring a "mothering cake" to the family gathering.

In this country it was started by a woman. Anna Jarvis of Grafton, West Virginia, wanted to celebrate the life of her mother, known as "Mother Jarvis." Mother Jarvis was a young Appalachian homemaker and lifelong activist who had organized "Mother's Work Days" to save the lives of those dying from polluted water. During the Civil War, Mother Jarvis had also organized women's brigades, encouraging women to help without regard for which side their men had chosen. At the time, there were many special days for men, but none for women.

On May 10, 1908, a Mother's Day service was held at a church in Grafton where Anna's mother had taught. Thus was born the idea that the second Sunday in May be set aside to honor all mothers, dead or alive.

In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill designating the second Sunday in May as a legal holiday to be called "Mother's Day," dedicated "to the best mother in the world, **your** mother."

We'll have a little surprise for all mothers who come to our next luncheon that will be on Tuesday, May 28. Hope to see you there.
