COUNCIL 12633 PROACTIVE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Two guiding principles of the Knights of Columbus are Unity and Fraternity. Unity denotes the act of supporting each other and working together to attain a goal. Fraternity, at the inception of the Order, often meant providing assistance to the widows and children left behind when the family breadwinner died unexpectedly. Today, Knights continue to focus on the care of those brothers and their families who are ill and in distress and they also actively support the church and its priests.

Holding true to these principles, Knights from Father John Savoca, Council 12633 in Lenoir City, Tennessee have helped a number of families in need.

HELPING FAMILIES

One such situation involved a brother Knight who was confined to a nursing home and wasn't able to maintain the exterior of his home and grounds. When the Council was made aware of the declining condition of the home, assistance was offered to his wife and 12 Knights and 2 spouses over a three day period spent a total of 220 hours power washing the home, cleaning out the garage, replacing an exterior door, trimming low hanging tree branches and all shrubs around the house. Our brother and his wife were overjoyed with the outcome, but sadly, he passed away a few months later.

OTHER EXAMPLES

Yet another example of helping the widow of a brother Knight who passed away involved 3 Knights who worked 9 hours cleaning out her garage of tools and other things and then conducting a tool sale and giving the proceeds to the family.

A church project the Knights took on was to renovate 9 classrooms at the St. Thomas Parish Family Life Center in Lenoir City Tennessee. Classroom walls were painted, carpets cleaned, new blinds hung, shelving installed to accommodate new video equipment and wall mounted TV monitors were suspended. This was all accomplished by 30 Knights and their wives, contributing 170 hours of worktime.

PROACTIVE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

These and other similar situations where Knights have provided assistance to people spawned the Proactive Assistance Program (PAP). The Council now proactively looks for opportunities to help others in need of assistance by including periodic notices in the church bulletin, reminders to brothers at monthly Council meetings, and calling individuals that have been placed on the Council Prayer List.

PAP is a shining example of the Knights of Columbus in action: a band of brothers providing assistance to Church, Family, and Community.

Understanding the Bible: The Ten Commandments, by Mark Galbaugh

Since our Why Catholic? meditations this Lent are on the Ten Commandments, let's see how the Church's Scripture exegetical tools apply to them. "Ratsach," which may mean to kill or murder, bu

First, we should note that there are two lists of the Decalogue - Exodus 20 & Deuteronomy 5 - so let's start by seeing how they compare. God reveals himself to his people at Mt. Sinai in "real time" in Exodus; whereas Moses is recalling this encounter with God to the Israelites before they cross the Jordan into Canaan 40 years later in Deuteronomy.

Exodus v.11 tells us the reason for keeping the Sabbath is that God made the heavens & the earth in six days & rested on seventh; but in Deuteronomy v.15, after declaring that even slaves should rest on the Sabbath, God explains that the Israelites must rest because they too were once slaves in Eavpt until God rescued them. Also, in Exodus v.12 God promises a long life in the land for those that honor their parents, in Deuteronomy v.16 he also promises prosperity. Finally, in Exodus v.17 wives are lumped in with the various possessions of a neighbor that a man may not covet; but in Deuteronomy v.21 the neighbor's wife is listed first. The text are very close otherwise, indicating the great respect that the author of the Deuteronomy text had for the Exodus text, & also indicating to us the great desire God has that these Ten Words be preserved. What do the differences signify? Should one be preferred over the other? It seems that both are to be taken with equal gratitude.

From here, we might want to take a closer look at some of the key Hebrew words used in this text by checking an interlinear Bible & looking up the words in a lexicon (I used www studylight.org.

Ex 20:7 "Vain" – The Hebrew word "Shav" can mean false, empty, lying, deceitful, which certainly conveys more than does the phrase in English.

Ex 20:8 "Remember" – In Hebrew "Zakar" does mean "to remember," but it also means to cause to be remembered, to make a memorial, & to bring to mind, & by association, to keep in mind. This reinforces the Catholic understanding that "remembering" for the Jews was really a "making present" of the event, just as we are made present to the death & resurrection of the Lord when we fulfill his command to "Do this in remembrance of me."

Ex 20:13 "You shall not kill" – Literally, "No kill" in Hebrew. One must wonder that God would give this command, then go on to give various conditions by which those who violate the Law are to punished by death. The word "kill" in Hebrew is "Ratsach," which may mean to kill or murder, but also to avenge. Some commentators see in this commandment a limitation on the blood revenge that can be exacted on an enemy.

Ex 20:14 "You shall not commit adultery" – In Hebrew "No adultery." The word "Na'aph" certainly means adultery as we understand it in English, but it also can mean idolatrous worship, which may be a reference to the ritual sex that often accompanied pagan worship in the ancient world. Since Israel is to be God's spouse (e.g. Isaiah 62:4-5), to worship another god is to commit adultery against the one, true God. See how rich a meaning can be gained when one is willing to look a little deeper!

Next we should look to see where these passages are referenced elsewhere in Scripture, especially where our Lord uses them, like the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7). To see how the Church understands these texts, check the index of citations in the back of the Catechism & consult the paragraphs where these are used. One will also want to consult credible commentaries. For an engaging examination of how Jesus fulfills the Law, I highly recommend Pope Benedict XVI's *Jesus of Nazareth*. The Pope's scriptural knowledge & insight are simply unsurpassed.

One could spend a lifetime studying, meditating, & praying over these holy texts. Don't be content with just the superficial meaning of the text; there are unending depths to them, which ultimately bring us along with the Israelites at Mt. Sinai to an encounter with the ineffable & unfathomable God, through which he reveals who he is & what he expects of those who call on his name.
