**Now is the Time for Columbian Squires** The Columbian Squires is the official youth organization of the Knights of Columbus. It was



established by Brother Barnabas McDonald, F.S.C., in 1925. Circles have been established throughout the United States and in many other countries.

The Knights strive for a "Circle in Every Council" and in this way we are giving an increasing number of Catholic young men the opportunity to learn the skills and attitudes of Catholic leadership. There can be few undertakings more important than developing the character of these young leaders.

A Squires Circle may be sponsored by either a Council or an Assembly (co-sponsored or "district" circles are not allowed).

There are three types of Squires circles distinguished primarily by where their members are drawn from. The three types are council-based circles, parish-based circles and in-school circles.

*Council-based* circles draw potential Squires from among the sons and grandsons of council members.

*Parish-based* circles draw most Squires from the parish and is desirable if the pastor wants a circle to serve his parish's young men and most or all of the counselors will be Knights from the parish.

*In-school* circles mainly recruit young men from a single school, usually a Catholic school. Circle meetings are often held before, during or after school in a classroom. In-school circles are appropriate if the school administration supports the idea, the school offers a large pool of Catholic young men from which to recruit and the school staff includes several Knights who could be potential counselors (of course, we can help these men become Knights if they are not already.)

Yong men may join a Squires circle if they are Catholic males between the ages of 10 to 18. It only takes a minimum of ten boys to start a circle.

A circle is governed by an advisory board, which for council-sponsored circles, consists of the Grand Knight, Deputy Grand Knight and Chaplain. The board appoints a chief counselor, a priest to be the circle's father prior and spiritual counselor, and additional Knights to be committee counselors.

Here are some selected questions and answers:

Q: What is the Columbian Squires? A: The official youth organization of the Knights of Columbus.

Q: Who are the Columbian Squires?

A: Catholic young men between the ages of 12 and 18 who are members of a unit called a "circle". (*The board of directors has authorized a pilot program Orderwide to lower the age of joining the Squires to ten years old.*)

Q: How does a young man join: A: By invitation from a Squire or Knight.

Q: How does a circle attract new members? A: By a well-planned membership campaign.

Q: How do you contact young men for membership in a circle?

A: Through other Squires, Knights of Columbus members, altar boys, religious education classes, class-to-class recruiting in Catholic schools, announcements by pastors and through publicity in parish bulletins, school newspapers, and the media.

Q: Is there a best age group for your first class? A: We recommend the 10-16 age group for the first class.

Q: Is there a minimum number of candidates required to institute a circle?

A: Yes! To institute and charter a new circle at least 10 members are required.

Q: Can a Squire remain active after his 18<sup>th</sup> birthday? A: Yes – if he was of eligible age at the start of the program year.

Q: What does it cost to join and maintain membership in the Squire?A: The initiation fee if \$1.00. Dues are determined by the Circle.

Q: Should a circle have a banking account? A: Yes. All circle checks should be signed by the chief squire, bursar and chief counselor.

Q: Should the council provide financial support for the Squires?

A: No. To develop leadership the program must be self-supporting.

Q: What is the responsibility of the council? A: Provide an adequate staff of adult leaders and provide meeting facilities (council hall, parish, school).

Q: What is the actual cost to the council in sponsoring a circle?

A: None! The Organizational Kit and circle Charter are furnished at no charge by the Supreme Council.

Q: Who is on the Advisory Board? A: The grand knight, deputy grand knight and chaplain.

Q: Does the Advisory Board have direct supervision of the circle?

A: No. This is the responsibility of the counselors. This group should serve as liaison between the Squires and Knights.

Q: Where do you find counselors?

A: Coaches, teachers, other youth group workers, fathers of prospective members, former Squires, young, new council members. A principal responsibility of the Advisory Board is to select a chief counselor, a father prior, and additional counselors as needed. All counselors must be Knights.

Q: What are the duties of the counselors? A: To counsel! Leadership training is developed through a program in which young men plan and carry out activities themselves – with advice, suggestions, and encouragement from adult leaders. A good counselor works closely with the Squires but will not do their work for them.

Q: How many counselors are needed? A: A minimum of two – the chief counselor and the father prior. Q: What is the chief counselor's main function? A: He is responsible for the overall operation of the circle.

Q: How can a good council/circle relationship be developed?

A: Through occasional Knights/Squires programs, visits by the grand knight and council members to circle meetings, through regular reports by the chief counselor at council meetings and through circle publicity in council bulletins.

## Carpenter Still Needed

If you have carpenter or cabinet making skills, let me know.
