

GROWING UP, I would sometimes throw stones into a nearby pond and watch the ripples. Whenever a stone hit the water, a series of rings radiated from the point of contact. The ripples flowed outward from the center, ring after ring.

This widely observable phenomenon helps us understand the wide-ranging impact of decisions. Newly enacted laws, for example, often have far-reaching consequences unintended by those who crafted the legislation. In our own lives, when we give good example, our actions have a positive "ripple effect" on others, including people we may not even know. Conversely, when we behave scandalously, our behavior can tear down the faith and undermine the virtue of others. Our personal lives, even our private thoughts, attitudes and decisions, can have an impact on those closest to us – family members, friends and co-workers – but also on the common good of our communities, our countries and even the world.


