## District Deputy's Report

### The Church and Papal Infallibility



The Education for Parish Service (EPS) was one of the finest programs promoted by the Archdiocese. It was a four-year program to advance our knowledge of the faith to be able to serve better in the parish.

In the course of these studies we had lectures on "Papal Infallibility," an oft misunderstood Doctrine of the Church by non-Catholics, but also by Catholics. Here are the basics:

1. The doctrine was declared in 1870 at the First Vatican Council; 2. There are three prerequisites for a doctrine to be declared infallible:

A: The pronouncement must be made by the lawful successor to Peter; B: The subject matter must be in the area of faith and morals and C: The Pope in declaring the Doctrine must be speaking "ex cathedra," meaning that he must be specifically intending to proclaim a doctrine binding the entire Church to its assent.

3. Infallibility is attached to the office, not the man. Infallibility should not be confused with "impeccability."

4. There are two examples of Papal Infallibility and both concern Mary - The Immaculate Conception and the Assumption.

5. Papal Infallibility was not invented in 1870; it is clear in Scripture that Christ promised the protection of the Holy Spirit and many of Church teachings are "irreformable" and "definite" such as those regarding Jesus, Mary, sin, grace, the sacraments, the primacy of the Pope and the doctrinal formulations of the ancient creeds. Today, although we have a number of new members, member rates are not being matched as in recent years. I believe the larger membership of the past was due to a large presence of Catholic families in the area that attended the same parish, school, workplace, shops and entertainment venues. We tend to gravitate to others who are like us. So it is easy to understand why a large Rosensteel membership existed for so long. Those conditions no longer exist.

This larger membership helped Rosensteel maintain its high charitable impact in our three sponsored parishes and the local community. We currently have activities intended to attract new members, but whether a Council officer, program director or a Brother Knight, here are nine ways to help attract new members.

# 4 Building Association

The following presents the results from operations for the Building Association for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016, Budget versus Actual. Expenditures exceeded budgeted expenditures by approximately \$8,000. We experienced unplanned repairs from water damage in the wall above the Knights' Room door which required repair and new gutters. The Emerald Room exterior doors also had to be replaced due to water damage, rust and non-closure, causing security breaches. The additional expenditures and shortfall in rent were funded by a refund of a \$2,500 overpayment to the Council, residual cash on hand in the Building Association operating account at the beginning of the year, and savings from newly negotiated insurance policies.

The fiscal year July 2016-2017 presents the following challenges:

- Updating the upper floor appearance
- Cleaning and maintenance of the heating and cooling ventilation system
- Repair of the exterior walls where there is evidence of water damage and needed paint

The updating of the Columbian and Maryknights rooms, foyer, and hallway areas plan includes:

- Remove wall carpet and trim, installing drywall, painting the walls and ceilings with neutral colors for all rooms
- Teardown and construction of a new bar in the Columbian Room. The Columbian Room bar will be extended by two feet, widened by one foot, and have a proper 4-foot opening on the end to allow service traffic to the hall. The new bar top is to be made from artificial stone or like material and will measure 30 inches wide with a drink rail of six inches. The material is easy to clean, chip resistant and durable. The bar flooring is to be made of an easily serviceable tile used in bars and restaurants.
- Teardown of the stage overhang ceiling with a new wall enclosure extending to the rear wall and a bingo cabinet
- New curtains will cover the stage walls and two side storage enclosure to the left and right of the stage
- New carpet flooring to match the neutral paint colors for all rooms
- New floor tile in the rear of the Columbian room
- All paneling in the foyer, hallway and stairwell to be removed, drywall installed and painted to match Columbian Room.

The entire project contemplates an increase to the 2016-2017 Capital Improvements budget by \$60,000, based on proposals and estimates from contractors and a motion presented for Council consideration last month. Funding for the project is based on use of the Capital Improvement Fund of \$33,000, generously contributed by our membership, and a motion for \$27,000 to be transferred from the Council. Motions are scheduled to be voted on at the next Council Business Meeting. A portion of the planned work will begin in October based on present budget approvals and funding. If you would like to see an example of the design and neutral colors for the walls, see the Jouvonal Room that is painted with the intended colors. Flooring to be used in the larger rooms will be installed in the Jouvonal Room for everyone to see by the end of October.

The Building Association Board meets on the fourth Thursday of the month at 7 p.m. Due to the volume of details to be addressed regarding the renovations, special meetings may be held at 6 p.m. on the same night as Council Business Meetings. Members are welcome to attend; please contact a board member so we may accommodate space for your attendance or advise you of any time or date changes. Thank you for your support and confidence in our efforts.

The Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem is unquestionably the most sacred church in Christianity. Consider its history: In the year 326 AD, the mother of the Roman Emperor, Helena, traveled to the Holy Land and did a survey of the area and the ancient walled city of Jerusalem. She created maps and marked sites along the Via Dolorosa, the street where Christ was forced to walk carrying his cross. These sites are noted in the present day Stations of the Cross in signs with Roman Numerals affixed to buildings over these places.

She also closely noted the location of the crucifixion and burial of Christ. In the year 333 AD, her son, Emperor Constantine, ordered the construction of a church on this exact spot. At the time of Christ's death, Golgotha was outside the walled city. But by this time hundreds of years later the city had been enlarged and the site was now inside the city. Unfortunately, this church was destroyed by a Persian Army invasion in 638 AD.

In 1099, the First European Crusaders captured the city and restored the basilica. Many years later the Crusaders were forced out by the Arab armies under Saladin. The church was honored and preserved to this day. Treaties and agreements were made with the Christians that promised safe passage to all religious pilgrims to the Holy Land. Interesting perhaps, but in 1192 AD Saladin gave the door keys to Arab families who were sworn to protect and preserve the structure. This oath and practice continues today. Catholic Franciscan Fathers and Orthodox priests are always present to assist pilgrims.

It's that time of year again. The White Oak Bowling Lanes is where you can find us every Thursday morning. Are you with us this season? It's not too late to join all your friends for another exciting and fun-filled season.
