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# Chaplain's Reflection Mountaintop Experience

Dear Brother Knights,

Has there ever been a time in your life or even a particular moment when God was very real and present to you? When you heard the voice of God speak? When God reached down and tapped you on the shoulder or perhaps whacked you on the head? When God was nearby, like a friend, guiding you, protecting you or challenging you? Experiences and times like these move us so deeply that they're almost impossible to forget.

Peter, James and John surely must have felt this way after witnessing the transfiguration of Jesus on a mountaintop. The brilliant divinity of Jesus as the Son of God, conversing with Moses and Elijah, shone so powerfully that it was blinding. The voice of God the Father proclaimed Jesus as his Son. But then, it was all over in a flash. Perhaps it lasted a few minutes, maybe less. We don't know. What we do know that it was not meant to last. Jesus had given his friends a privileged "mountaintop experience." However, the light on the mountaintop would soon give way to darkness. Jesus would lead them back down the mountain and on toward Jerusalem where he would suffer and die. There, His disciples would experience sorrow, shame, fear, confusion and anger.

Perhaps that's been our story as well. We've had mountaintop experiences. They didn't seem to last long or as long as we might like. Then the darkness came. Our darkness might have been caused by all sorts of things. Maybe we lost a loved one. Maybe we suffered a divorce. Maybe we lost a job. Maybe it was an illness or another hardship we had to endure. Things didn't go the way we planned. A dream was shattered, our heart was broken. Perhaps we became discouraged by our sins or failings. Maybe someone else's sins and failings got us down.

We can call times like this a "spiritual darkness." We feel discouraged, empty, hurt, confused, even mad. We can think that God doesn't care. Or that he isn't listening. Or that he's not there for us. Or that he's just not there at all.

It's tempting at times like this to search for or even try to force another mountaintop experience so we can feel God's closeness again. But that's a mistake. When we expect or demand mountaintop experiences, we usually end up being disappointed when they don't come. After all, if we really love someone, we would not make them jump through hoops to prove that they love us. It's no different with God.

In my very first column, I suggested that we commit to constantly asking other Catholic men the question, "Have you thought about joining the Knights of Columbus?" As we look to the coming months, I would continue to expand on that very thought. I would strongly encourage you to read Su-

And with that I'm excited to share with you some opportunities for all of us to exemplify the role of a Knight of Columbus. Thanks to the swift and diligent work of Pro-Life Co-Chairmen PGK Dan Ward and PGK Mike Koon, I am proud to announce the renewal of the Candlelight Rosary & Benediction for the Unborn. In lieu of our Social Meeting on Tuesday, October 17, Chaplain Fr. Calis will lead us in a candlelight Rosary at 7 p.m. followed by a Benediction at the historic St. John's chapel. Immediately afterwards all attendees are welcome to join us back at the Council for a meal. Please invite friends, family, and fellow parishioners; we welcome them to witness alongside us the Respect for Life.

In addition to this beautiful ceremony, we will have two membership drives this month. The first will take place on Sunday October 8, at St. Bernadette's Community Sunday. 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

Periods of darkness, as hard as they might be, can serve a useful purpose. They're opportunities for us to grow in the trust of God. God knows that it's easy for us to trust him when he seems very close and present to us. He knows it's difficult to trust when he appears to be absent or far away. But it's especially at times like this that our faith can grow much stronger.

Everyone, even the greatest saints, experience periods of spiritual darkness. But like the saints, we must persevere in faith, keep praying, and receive the sacraments. Jesus wants us to remember our mountaintop experiences especially when we are in the midst of darkness.

God sometimes gives us mountaintop experiences so we can understand that he loves us or that he even exists in the first place. Sometimes he does it to change the direction of our life or heal us of a wound. But God allows periods of darkness, too. We need to accept them and ask God how we might benefit from them.

Even if we've never had what we might call a mountaintop experience, there is something we can all remember during our dark periods: Jesus' death on the cross. Even in our darkest moments, this memory of Jesus' darkness before the triumph of His Resurrection can give us the hope to carry on.

The Knights of Columbus have been existence since Fr. McGivney founded the order in 1882 with the purpose of providing protection for Catholic families. This was all with the blessing and support of the Pope. But did you know that there is another Order of Knights that also has had the blessing and support of the Vatican for almost 952 years? It is the oldest chilvaric order of Catholic Knights in the world.

The Knights of Malta, the Hospitaller Knights or just called The Hospitallers began their existence as a Brotherhood, the Order of St. John, who maintained a hospital for Christians in Jerusalem. They offered medical services in the 10<sup>th</sup> century. After the First Crusade from Europe captured Jerusalem and the Holy Land, the Hospitallers expanded their services to a series of seven Fortresses along the Mediterranean Sea to provide shelter and protection for people traveling to the Holy Land. Soon a military unit was added to include armed knights who would protect and fight for pilgrims. In the 12th century the crusades ended and the European Countries withdrew from the Holy Land. The Hospitallers also drew back and settled on the island of Malta still providing medical services, but they also offered protection from the Barbary Pirates and Muslim armies from the East. In 1530, a Turkish Muslim army of 40,000 attacked Malta seeking to gain control of the Mediterranean. Malta was defended by 700 Hospitaller Knights and 8,000 Spanish soldiers. After a three month battle, the Turkish Muslim army withdrew in defeat. The Hospitallers had lost over 300 knights. Malta was saved.

In modern times the Hospitaller Knights have disbanded their military, but still work throughout 120 countries to offer medical relief to disadvantaged poor and sick people, especially the recent refugees from Syria, Afghanistan, Africa and other war zones.

The Hospitallers are located at Fort St. Angelo, Valetto, Malta for historic and cultural purposes. The main offices of the Knights are located at the Magistral Palace, Via dei Condotti across the Tiber River from Vatican City in Rome. The flag of the order is a Silver Cross on a red background. The Knights formal attire is similar to the regalia worn by our Fourth Degree Knights with the colors of black and silver. And after 950 years, they still maintain a modern hospital in the spirit of the Brothers of St. John in the old city of Jerusalem for all Christian pilgrims to The Holy Land.

The tickets for the always popular Christmas Luncheon on December 19 will be sold by Ray and Nancy starting at the October luncheon on the 24<sup>th</sup>. There will be a wide variety of appetizers offered before the main meal and Fr. Perkins will entertain us with some humorous stories. Remember, only current Retirees Club members and invited guests are allowed to attend luncheons or participate in the Bowling League.
