Can you remember the largest cathedral or basilica you have visited? In this area we have the National Cathedral (Episcopalian) on Wisconsin Ave. Across the city we have the National Shrine, a basilica next to Catholic University. The cathedral is 7,712 sq. ft. The National Shrine is 7,097 sq. ft. By comparison, St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City is 15,160 sq. ft. But the true giant is no longer a Christian place of worship.

The Hagia Sopia is in Istanbul, Turkey. It and the surrounding grounds comprise 200,000 sq. ft. It was built in 537 AD when the city was known as Constantinople, named after the Roman Emperor Constantine who was the first Christian emperor. With the conversion of the emperor in 325 AD, Christianity became the unofficial religion of the Roman Empire. When emperors moved back to Rome as the seat of government, the Hagia Sophia became the seat of the Eastern Orthodox Religion. This would remain so until 1453 when the cathedral was repurposed as a mosque for the growing majority Muslim religion of the country.

In 1934, the Turkish president secularized the building as a museum. It was deemed to be part of the UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Today, no religious activity is allowed in the Hagia Sophia. But as a museum, it is a very popular attraction to all.

Have you ever noticed the two red broad-brimmed cardinal's hats (Galeros) suspended from the ceiling in the nave of St. Matthew's Cathedral? Traditionally, this symbol of a cardinal is raised in his cathedral upon his death. The hat hangs until it turns into dust, a reminder that all earthly glory is passing. Did you know there are three former cardinals interned in St. Matthew's? They are as follows: William Cardinal Baum, Patrick Cardinal O' Boyle and James Cardinal Hickey. Interesting note: Cardinal Mundelein died in Chicago in 1939. His red Galero still hangs in the Holy Name Cathedral, built in 1874, at 735 North State Street.

Caution: Our monthly luncheon is on the 4th Tuesday of the month, the 22nd. This month we have a fifth Tuesday. Don't be confused on the date.


