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District Deputy's Report

Devotions to Our Lady in Latin America

Catholics in the United States of America have a strong devotion to Our Lady, but we are generally not aware of the great diversity of devotions to the Blessed Mother in Latin America. Virtu-



ally every Latin American country has an ethnic Marian devotion with a rich history of origin. This devotion is reflected in the names of Latin American women that contain "Maria"-Maria del Carmen, Maria Teresa, Maria del Pilar, Maria Angelica, etc.

In the United States, our major Marian devotion is to the Immaculate Conception, our patroness. Perhaps this is why the Vatican gave us the exquisite gift of a "rubbed" mosaic of the Immaculate Conception to adorn the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC. But Latin American Catholic immigrants in the United States hold fast to their Marian devotions from their countries of origin.

Mexicans pray fervently to Our Lady of Guadalupe who appeared in 1531, after which there were one million conversions a year for nine years. Cubans hold The Virgin of Charity with the beloved statue that was smuggled out of Cuba in the 1960's and today is in the church to The Virgin of Charity in Miami. There is Our Lady of Aparecida in Brazil resting in the largest Catholic church in the Americas by the same name in Sao Paulo. There is devotion in Panama to Santa Maria La Antigua, an ancient statue housed in the Cathedral of Seville, Spain. This image dates to the taking of Seville by King Ferdinand in the 15th century and was found under the mosque, which today is the site of the cathedral.

Here is a list of the other Virgins with similar rich histories and devotions in Latin America: Our Lady of Luján (Argentina), Our Lady of Copacabana (Bolivia), Our Lady of Carmen of Maipu (Chile), Our Lady of Chiquinquirá (Columbia), Our Lady of the Angels (Costa Rica), Nuestra Senora de las Mercedes (Dominican Republic), Our Lady of Quinche (Ecuador), Our Lady of Peace (El Salvador), Our Lady of the Rosary (Guatemala), la Virgen de Suyapa (Honduras), Our Lady of El Viejo (Nicaragua), Our Lady of Caacupe (Paraguay), Our Lady of la Merced (Peru), Our Lady of Divine Providence (Puerto Rico), la virgin de los Treinta y Tres (Uruguay) and Our Lady of Coromoto (Venezuela).

Truly the mantle of Mary is over us wherever we travel here or in Latin America.

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


Mary's Widows

The Month of the Rosary

On October 7, we celebrate Our Lady of the Rosary, in recognition of the battle of Lepanto, which took place on October 7, 1571. In this battle, the Holy League, composed of several Catholic countries, defeated the Turkish fleet. This victory prevented Europe from becoming Muslim. The victory was credited to the Virgin Mary's intercession. All of Christianity had begged for victory using the Rosary. Pope Saint Pius V instituted the Feast of the Holy Rosary in 1571.

The celebration of this feast makes us understand how powerful and effective the prayer of the Rosary is, not only in winning the battles of the world but also our own everyday "battles." With the daily prayer of the Rosary, we can achieve many graces that we need for our Christian life. I found a quotation from Benedict XV (reign 1914-22) that gives us four reasons to pray the Rosary:

"This prayer is perfect because of the praise it offers, because of the lessons it imparts, because of the graces it obtains and because of the triumphs it achieves."

For these four reasons, let us pray the Rosary next month in October! In a particular way, let us pray for all our many Christian brothers and sisters who are suffering persecution for their faith in the Middle East.

Building:

This past month the Building Association focused on maintenance projects. Plumbing was serviced for all bathrooms and the kitchen, one AC unit was repaired and hot water control valves were installed. Fill dirt was generously provided for free by Fred Adami and dispersed where we are experiencing water runoff and erosion. This effort will continue till the tree roots and embankment is covered.

If you ventured into the Jouvenal room you would see that Council member Joe Walper has carefully sanded all the walls and has begun painting. The project has taken two weeks of solid meticulous work so far. The room will be the first in the plan to renovate and update the entire building.

Three proposals were received for the renovation of the Columbian and Maryknights rooms, foyer, hallway and stairwell. This will include removal of the wall carpet, trim and paneling with new drywall to be installed. The walls and ceiling are to be painted and new trim installed. We are now vetting and evaluating each proposal and will report at the next Business meeting. The timing of the renovation will be coordinated with Clubhouse and Council activities.

Have you ever traveled to the beautiful Hawaiian Islands? If you have ventured the thousands of miles and six time zones to the west and spent time on these islands you are well aware of the beauty of this Pacific paradise. One of the islands holds a special place in the history of the Catholic faith and the commitment to its residents: Molokai Island. It is believed that Asian migrants carried the disease of leprosy (Hansen's disease) to the islands in the early 1800's. It became wide-spread among the native population. The government feared it was infectious and passed a law sanctioning a medical quarantine of those affected. The area chosen was the colony of Kalaupapa set apart from the rest of Molokai's population by steep mountain ridges. A Belgian priest, Fr. Damien, volunteered to be their pastor in 1873. The Hawaiian government in Honolulu did not abandon the leprosy colony, but Fr. Damien was the only person who remained in the colony as its pastor.

In 1884, Fr. Damien realized he had contracted the disease himself after spending 11 years on the island. Four volunteers soon arrived to assist him: Another Belgian priest, Fr. Louis Conrady; an American Civil War veteran, a male nurse and a nun, Mother Marianne Cope who came from the Franciscan Hospital of St. Joseph's in Syracuse, NY. Fr. Damien died in 1889 and his body was interned near his home in Belgium. The canonization of Fr. Damien took place on June 6, 1995 by Pope John Paul II We remember Fr. Damien on his feast day, September 26.

The following day, September 27, we will enjoy our monthly luncheon at the Council. Make plans today to bring a friend and enjoy a social hour with friends. A variety of tasty appetizers will be available followed by a sumptuous luncheon at noon.
