Chaplain's Reflection The Kingdom of Heaven

Dear Brother Knights,

Jesus describes the Kingdom of Heaven as being like a treasure or fine pearls that would require us to sell everything that we have in order to purchase it. Thus, to attain the Kingdom of Heaven we must completely dedicate our lives and our possessions to its acquisition and surrender all our worldly goods in the process.

Yet, as great as the promise of Heaven may be, and it is a promise, it still requires a great leap of faith to sacrifice the many worldly allurements that we can see, for something so much greater that we cannot see. We need look no further than the Apostle Thomas to see it is easier to believe what we can see. Although, ironically, most of us can readily profess to loving the God that we cannot see, while we feel less loving toward the neighbor that we do see.

So the price of the Kingdom of God is such that we need to have complete faith in God expressed through our love of God and neighbor. There is nothing wrong with the goods of the world. In fact, God wants us to enjoy them and to use them and to do good with them. Recall the disappointment of the master who gave talents to his three servants and found that one had simply buried them (cf Mt 25:14-30).

Even though we cannot physically see God, He shows his face to everyone of the seven billion people who live on this planet every day. But to recognize God, we must have the lens of faith. That lens might be very well developed, or perhaps is barely there. But if we are open to the possibility of a good and gracious God who knows our needs better than we do, we will be able to see His activity in even the most mundane events of everyday life.

A couple of weeks ago, my wife and I went on a walk around our neighborhood. We walked for over a hour and a half, probably a distance of four miles. We got home just before sunset and my wife realized that she has lost one her favorite earrings which had fallen off her ear during the walk. Finding something like that is like looking for a needle in a haystack.

Although the earring was not valuable, it was also not replaceable since jewelry companies are always changing the pieces that they offer. So we decided to try and find it. My wife walked while I drove the car behind her with the high beams on to illuminate the pavement ahead.

Read *The Columbian* magazine. Subscribe or follow "The Catholic Gentleman," a blog and Facebook page by Sam Guzman. I'm certain there are many many more sources of joyful, uplifting reminders of God's love for us. In closing, I turn to an oft-heard quote attributed to Esther Jno-Charles: "What you focus on expands. So focus on what you want, not what you do not want." If you're going to spend the most valuable commodity we have (time), choose to spend it focused on the teachings of Christ, our Lord and Savior.



Nonetheless, there were many spots we probably missed. After an hour and 10 minutes of looking over 90 percent of the route we had walked, she saw it on the street. No one had driven over it.

Some might call finding that earring pure luck. Perhaps, but my wife and I know that God smiled on us over a very insignificant incident in our lives. Imagine what God will do when it really matters. The Kingdom of Heaven is real. Jesus himself told us: "The coming of the kingdom of God cannot be observed, and no one will announce, 'Look, here it is,' or, 'There it is.' For behold, the kingdom of God is among you." (Lk 17:20-21).

To see the Kingdom of Heaven, all you need is the lens of faith. Even though it costs all the money in the world, it is absolutely worth it. And unlike our lives on earth of "seventy years, eighty if we are strong" (Ps 90:10), with the Kingdom of Heaven comes the promise of eternal life.

District Deputy's Report

Dear Brother Knights,

Our Maryland State Council met in late June at the Grand Knights' Annual Leadership Seminar. We talked about the importance of growing and strengthening our Councils and our Order and ways of increasing our charitable outreach. These two essential goals for strength and service go hand in hand.

First, let's talk about growing our Councils. The Domestic Church initiative will aid us in both growing and serving. How do we do this? First, visit your pastors. Learn how you can assist them, then initiate effective projects directed toward that assistance. This will open many doors for your Council.

Do not separate but integrate your activities into parish life and invite all parishioners to participate in your activities and participate in all parish-initiated activities. In this way you will display the Knights of Columbus' charism most prominently. This approach is attractive because service is attractive. Catholic gentlemen in our parishes will be encouraged to join you.

It is imperative that we add new members. We must replace the Knights we have lost. This past year, we have seen almost 600 Knights from Maryland alone go to their final reward and naturally this will continue. But most importantly, when men join our Order they are helped to become better husbands, better fathers, better Catholics.

Knights and all Christians are called to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We can do this best through our witness of a fruitful and faithful family life. A constantly renewing physical and spiritual vitalization grows and strengthens our Order, our parishes, our families, ourselves.

In his apostolic exhortation to Catholic men titled *Into the Breach*, the Most Reverend Thomas Olmsted, the bishop of Phoenix, reports some astounding facts: Since 2000, 14 million Catholics have left the faith. Religious education has dropped 24%. Catholic school attendance has dropped 19%. Infant baptisms have dropped 28%. Adult baptisms have dropped 31%. Sacramental marriages have dropped 41%. All this represents a serious breach, a gaping hole in Christ's battle lines. The bishop encourages us to "step into the breach. Be confident! Be bold. Do the work of Christ's soldiers in the world today! Fight the good fight. Put on the armor of God. Forward, into the breach!"

As Knights we do this when we grow in numbers and in faith, then we will have the strength and the unity to stand firm against the tactics of the devil.

What about charitable service? Pope Francis has asked all Catholics to "reach out to the peripheries." This is what we do as Knights and families through our charitable outreach. Our most recent fraternal survey shows that order-wide we donated \$177,500,673 for charitable causes and that Knights donated 75,112,694 hours to carry out these charitable endeavors, all in service to those in need. These numbers represent an increase of more than 2 million dollars and hours over 2015.

In Maryland, we are up as well. Our charitable outreach extends from our work with Special Olympics, vocations support, and the Coats for Kids and Food for Families programs; through our assistance to flood victims of Ellicott City and our donations to our brothers and sisters in Louisiana after their devastation and of course our ongoing support to the persecuted Christians in the Middle East.

Locally, our efforts support student scholarship and the ultrasound imaging programs. Through all of this our charitable fundraising enables us to reach out


