Church Reopening Requires Commitment by Knights

The end of September is the targeted reopening of the church. As expected, some new rules will be in place. Adhering to a new seating system will require support by our Council.

Knights are expected to set up entrance & exit points; administer a program to take the temperature of church members upon entering the church after which parishioners will be escorted to a selected pew; parishioners will not be allowed to walk in and sit.

Managing this process is estimated to require 12 Knights per Mass.

Delta Church Drive to be Launched

The Delta Church program is designed to help our Council position itself to engage and bring potential new members into the Order. The program will be administered at any Mass or Event the Knights have a recruiting presence.

The goal is to enable our Council to implement additional "Faith In Action" Programs.

Specifics of the drive will be released soon.

Additional Knights have been requested to sign up for Adoration hours. It will run every week from 9 am Monday continuously through Wednesday at 6:45.

The late night and early morning hours need 2 or 3 Adoration Guardians and we still need some people. 
Habitat for Humanity is currently shut down due to the current health crisis; hoping they start up in the next couple of months.

September is Life Insurance Awareness Month

It's the one month each year that the life insurance industry coordinates a campaign aimed at educating folks about the importance of life insurance and helping them get the coverage they need.

The historian, Christopher Kauffman, spent several years at the Supreme Office and at the Museum, researching the book that he wrote on the 100th anniversary of our founding. That book, Faith and Fraternalism, notes on page 13, "...he [Fr. McGivney] was deeply interested in pursuing the topic of a Catholic fraternal insurance society among groups of Catholic laymen of New Haven." Then on page 35 Mr. Kauffman goes on, "...he [Fr. McGivney again] spent his energy in promoting the insurance feature...his emphasis on business was his pastoral concern for the social and financial security of the family."

Fr. McGivney lived both the social and the financial insecurity of a desperate family, with the breadwinner suddenly taken, that had to be supported. He left the seminary to work and support his mother and siblings.



He didn't want other Catholic families to find themselves in such a predicament. That, and uniting men of faith, was the impetus for establishing our Order.

Everyone who joined in those first years was insured; that was part and parcel of being in the organization. Now every member has a choice and every member should know what we do, and how we do it.

Here's the process I use when I meet with families:

Discover – Identify & prioritize your financial goals **Gather Data** – Collect facts & figures based on your current situation Analyze – Input data, run calculations, identify shortfalls Recommend – Propose a financial strategy designed to satisfy your goals Implement – Choose a financial strategy

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Fr. Christopher Gronotte From Boyhood to Priesthood



Coming from Kentucky, I always enjoyed the simple things in life. I guess I get that from my Dad. We didn't say much, but we always enjoyed each other's company. My mom made sure that we did our prayers, especially the family rosary which we never missed. My normal Catholic boyhood was changed up when my parents moved me from our parish school to Royalmont Academy, the Regnum Christi School that was just starting in Cincinnati.

Over the next few years, Legionary Priests and Brothers would come and visit the school to invite us on retreats and summer camps. I loved going to the camps, meeting all the different boys my age. Then my brother joined the apostolic school in New Hampshire and I thought, "What?! He just left me here with my sister! I want to go too." I only wanted to go to that school, just like my brother. I did almost everything with my brother, I looked up to him a lot. He was fun and popular, athletic and had a lot of talents. Much better than I, I told myself. So when I was filling out the application, I looked up and asked, "It asks, 'Why do you want to be a priest?', but I don't want to be a priest, I just want to go there."

"Well," said my Mom, "Just write that you're open to the priesthood." I shrugged and wrote it, thinking, Well I guess I am open to the priesthood. I would say it was God sticking his foot in the door before I could close it. I don't know where I would be if it wasn't for the apostolic school.



There was a great spirit of charity and simplicity at ICAS, the apostolic school. That spirit attracted me very much. Life at the apostolic school was amazing and I loved it.

I continued on through formation and loved every minute of it. I really loved staying busy and working with my hands, tiling floors, remodeling rooms, cutting grass, even secretariat work. Though I wasn't very good at sitting down to study, I made it through just fine. I was, you could say, a happy camper. I had found the place I loved. I looked up to my older brother, who was always ahead of me in formation, but his legacy kind of hung over me. I can never be as good as him, I thought.

A big part in the maturing of my vocation happened during internship. I was sent to Louisiana for my first year. The people of Louisiana were amazing and will always hold a place dear to my heart. Then I was transferred to Atlanta, to work as campus minister of the Lower School at Pinecrest Academy. Once again, I felt so welcome and at home. Every day was a lesson in simplicity. It was such a joy to be around all those kids, who taught me more lessons than I could ever imagine.

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It was a great time of maturing because I had to make my vocation my own. I had been pretty slow in my discernment. I loved everything I was doing and was totally happy, but I still had a feeling I was just going along without really questioning too much if this was where I should be. On top of that, quite a few fathers and brothers were leaving the Legion right around then because of the scandals of our founder, so I couldn't continue on anymore just because that's what everyone else was doing. I began to ask myself why I shouldn't just go home too. This difficult time forced me to be more serious about my vocation and make it my own. During one of my yearly spiritual exercises retreats, after night prayers one night, I went outside to think. As I walked around under the moon and the stars, I felt God's presence very close. I thought of all the great men that had passed through the halls of our seminary in Cheshire and all I could think was, I would never add up to be one of them, I would never even be as good as my brother. Then I felt God tell me it was okay, that I don't have to be like them. He loved me the way I was, and this is where He wanted me. It gave me a lot of peace and a security in my vocation that I hadn't had before. No longer did I have to try to be like my brother or anyone else, God loves me as his own Son, He loves me as I am, with all my strengths together with all my weaknesses.

Going back to Rome to finish my studies was tough. Many priests and brothers I knew had left because of the scandal, so I felt like I was going to Rome alone. It was like, "Why am I here? Where is everyone else?" At that time, I had already been in the Legion for 10 years and if you count my years in the apostolic school, it was 15 years. A lot of families knew that I had been around for a while already and so they would ask me as I was leaving, "so how much longer till your ordination?" expecting to hear maybe 2 years or something... and I would answer, "Oh, maybe 5 more years..." That caught them by surprise and it also made me think, "why is this taking so long?!" Then in prayer, it struck me that I was living my vocation to the full right then and there. I didn't have to wait. This helped me to live the present moment a lot more, which brought me a lot of peace. My vocation is not just to be a priest and it doesn't just start at my ordination. I am a religious, consecrated to God, here and now. So, when I left being someone known and counted on for many responsibilities and became just another brother studying in a foreign country, I realized that I could save souls in whatever I was doing. If God wanted me to sit at my desk and study all day long, why couldn't He use those graces that I was winning by my fidelity to Him to save more

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souls, and why not even more souls than someone who was working out in some apostolate somewhere? So that was my new apostolate. I saw that there was not really any rush to get to ordination, because I was living my priesthood already.

After one year in Rome, I did a month-long silent retreat, and at the end I would make my perpetual profession, the final, definitive one. As that day came closer, I asked God for rain as a sign of His grace raining down on me. Then I thought, "Well, that's not very nice for the other brothers, I bet they would like a sunny day. Whatever you want Lord." So the day of my profession arrived, bright and sunny. But as the mass went on, I could hear a storm brewing outside. Right when I was kneeling down, as it was my turn to say my name for my perpetual profession, a crack of thunder rang out. "Wow Lord", I thought. Back in the sacristy I asked at Fr Hernán, my rector, "Did you hear that?!"

"Si carísimo! It was just like the baptism of Jesus, like God was saying, 'This is my beloved son, in whom I am well pleased.""

"That's just what I thought!" I said. As we went outside for pictures, it was bright and sunny again. I treasured that moment as a special gift from God, a little tailor-made affirmation, just for me. After the profession, we had another five days of retreat and that was like my honeymoon! I soon came back to earth again, but with a deeper conviction of God's great love for me, which I hope to spread to all the souls I meet.

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Your Officers and Committee Chairs 2020- 2021 Fraternal Year Officers

Each year your council elects and appoints new men to take on leadership roles within your council. Sometimes these roles are well-defined while other times the role may be expanded based on that individuals talents or interests. The following text offers an approach that may be helpful for new councils in appointing their first set of officers or for existing councils looking to expand the responsibilities of their existing officers. These suggestions may not work on every campus, however, we hope this approach will benefit at least a few officer roles.

Elected Positions



Grand Knight – The grand knight is the chief executive officer of the council. He is responsible for setting council goals and ensuring that all officers fulfill their duties in reaching these objectives. He presides over all meetings; appoints program and committee directors as needed and fills officer roles in the event of vacancies; countersigns checks and orders for payment; and is responsible for the council's First Degree Team. Ideally, the grand knight should be a junior so that as a senior he can serve as a mentor for the next grand knight. - **SK Christopher Bell,** 678 447-5189 <u>christopher.bell@hilti.com</u>



Deputy Grand Knight – The deputy grand knight serves as the grand knight's right hand man and should fill in for the grand knight when he is not present. Additionally, the deputy grand knight will likely lead a committee, or multiple, if he chooses to do so. Some deputy grand knights serve as their council's program director. Ultimately, he assists the grand knight in leading the council and reaching council objectives. In some councils, the deputy grand knight role might be used to groom a possible grand knight candidate for the following year. Finally, the deputy grand knight may serve as a liaison between the council and other groups that share similar interest (i.e. Newman Club, pro-life club, etc.).-

Chancellor – The chancellor assists both the grand and deputy grand knights in the leading of the council by engaging and strengthening the council's members. His primary responsibilities include both recruiting and retaining members and to this end he should set up different events that display the different values and principles of the Knights of Columbus. The chancellor should participate in the council's degree team and should serve on both the Admission and Retention Committees.-

Treasurer – The treasurer is responsible for managing the council funds, whether in bank or school accounts. He receives money from the financial secretary and deposits funds into council accounts. He is also responsible for paying all council expenses. Finally, he balances and verifies the ledger and keeps the updated budget once approved by the council. -

Recorder – The recorder has the responsibility of recording all meetings and events held by the council. He should record minutes, conversations and other information helpful to the council and prepare them to be distributed to the council membership in a timely manner. Additionally, he should help with council event notifications, council meeting reminders, and assist with council social media responsibilities. -

Warden – The warden is responsible for the property owned by the council. He is also in charge of setting up meetings and leads both the inside and outside guards. Many college councils utilize the warden and guards as custodians of the campus ministry property which may include raking leaves, shoveling snow and assisting with maintenance of the interior. -

Inside/Outside Guards - The inside and outside guards carry out tasks given to them by the grand knight and also follow orders of the warden. They are responsible for checking membership cards and allowing entrance to meetings. Appointed Positions

Chaplain – The chaplain is the spiritual leader of the council who works to bring out the true values of the Knights of Columbus. He nurtures the faith in council members particularly through the sacraments but also through spiritual direction, retreats and other events and support. The grand knight should meet regularly with the council chaplain to see how the council can best support the Catholic community on campus. -

Financial Secretary – The financial secretary is chosen by the trustees and the officers of the council for a three year term and approved by the supreme knight. He holds an important position of continuity within the council and has the responsibility of collecting dues as well as ensuring that the council's financial recordings are kept up to date. Additionally, he ensures that membership records are current, issues membership cards, files regular reports to the district, regional, state and supreme offices and submits the annual 990 to the IRS. Because of his important role, the financial secretary cannot be an undergraduate student, but ideally should be a member of the campus faculty or staff. If no one from the campus community can serve in this role, it should be an adult member of the neighboring community. - **Gregory P Santini**



Lecturer - The lecturer provides brief spiritual discourses and reflections during business meetings for the "Good of the Order". If the lecturer cannot be present, he should appoint a council member to give the reflection for him.. - **SK Joseph M Simone**

Program Director – The program director is appointed by the grand knight and oversees the six surge with service committees (church, community, council, family, youth and culture of life). In some councils this may be the duty of the deputy grand knight. The program director should ensure that all his subordinate committees meet regularly and plan appropriate events. He communicates individual committee reports to the grand knight.

Membership Director – The membership director serves as the head of the Admission Committee and works to grow the council's membership through new and transfer members. He should actively identify potential recruits, plan recruitment programs, host informational meetings and encourage council members to seek candidates. In addition, the membership director should ensure that a council has access to frequent degrees (whether its own or local councils) and should work that each member reaches at least the third degree in a timely manner.

Retention Chairman – The retention chairman works to keep the councils members active once they join. He should consider implementing programs and practices that provide mentors for new members and he should regularly communicate with the council to encourage their participation. When students graduate, the retention chairman should help them transfer to a council in their area. At times when a council wishes to suspend members, they must have the retention chairman make an effort to keep these members or have them transfer to another council.

Other Council Positions

These are positions that are not required by or reported to the Supreme Council, however, many college councils have had found success by utilizing these roles. In many cases, these roles may be filled by council officers who have these unique responsibilities in addition to their other duties.

Campus Ministry Liaison – In order to best communicate and collaborate with other Catholic groups and ministries on campus, the council should have a liaison to campus ministry staff, student advisory board and specific groups (such as the Pro-Life Club). The deputy grand knight can be a good fit for this role.

Social Media Chairman – The social media chairman is responsible for overseeing the council's social media accounts and making sure new content is posted on a regular basis. At minimum, at least two council members should have access to these accounts, ideally at least the recorder and grand knight.

Alumni Relations Chairman – Maintaining healthy relationships with alumni members can help the council utilize these relationships for mentorship and financial assistance. The alumni relations chairman should communicate regularly with alumni and plan at least one or two alumni/council events per year, usually in conjunction with homecoming or other campus alumni events.


