Chaplain's Reflection Love as a Relationship

A young lady once asked a cattle rancher, "How strong a fence do you need to keep the cows in?" The rancher answered, "It depends on the cattleman." What do you mean, she asked? "Some ranchers round up the cattle by herding them with a helicopter. They have no personal contact. They rely on the power of greater strength. So they need very strong six-foot tall, solid plywood fences. But other ranchers go out in the pasture and call their cows by name. They only need sticks wrapped with strands of wire to fence their cows in."

The young lady had assumed that all cows needed to be forcibly confined. So the rancher's response got her to consider another possibility: namely, that with the right kind of rancher, the cows wouldn't want to escape. Cows with a relationship to their rancher know a good thing when they have it. On the other hand, cows with no relationship to their rancher have no reason to stay, and so must be forcibly confined.

The people who were asking Jesus to clearly demonstrate that he is the Messiah may have been making a similar mistake, namely, that God rules by power and force. So they expected Jesus to do or say something that would establish his authority and proclaim the power that resides within him. But Jesus responds by talking about a different sort of power. "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me, and I give them eternal life." Jesus' authority is found in a bond that gives life, an authority that is known only in a personal relationship.

We know about the power of personal relationship and empathy in our own lives. It's the power of the love that we can show when we love as God loves. What greater power is there than that? Surely the power of authentic human love is greater than any coercive power we might try to exert over each other and over nature.

We know from personal experience that loving persuasion is far more effective than coercion. Yet, in our human impatience we turn to coercion instead of building relationships because that can take time and we want instant gratification. But why would we expect such impatience of our God, who is perfect love? Perhaps, because the tragedy of human life is that where the necessary relationships in our lives have broken down, we look to the shortcut of personal power to

force our will on others.

And that relationship is stronger than death itself, for it is our Heavenly Father who called Jesus to be our lamb and raised him to be our shepherd.

God entered into a new relationship with his holy people through the sacrifice of His unblemished lamb, Jesus. This is the hope of Easter. God can create new bonds of life even when evil has seemingly destroyed all possibility of relationship. God saves us through the power of His love, expressed in His relationship to us, not by exerting any power over us.

At every Mass, the good shepherd calls you to the place where he will feed you. It is only a foretaste of the feast to come, the wedding feast of the lamb. At that table God will also kneel before you, like a mother before her crying child and tenderly wipe all your tears away from your eyes.

Flavius Joseph was born in Jerusalem in the year 37 AD. He was a member of a politically connected and well educated Jewish family. As a soldier at an early age he met the Roman General Vespasian. After time passed, Vespasian became the Roman Emperor. Flavius went with him to Rome and continued to serve him. As an advisor he later accompanied one of his sons, General Titus, who commanded the Roman army in Palestine that crushed the Jewish Revolt and destroyed the Holy Temple in Jerusalem.

He began a pursuit of recording the history of the Jewish people from past centuries up to that present day. His first book of seven volumes was titled the "Jewish War". His second book of many volumes was titled "Jewish Antiquities". Book XVIII contains a passage that has always intrigued religious scholars.

"About this time lived Jesus, a man full of wisdom, if indeed one may call him a man. For he was the doer of incredible things and the teacher of such as gladly received the truth. He attracted to himself many Jews and many Gentiles. He was the Christ. Pilate condemned him to death on the cross. On the third day he appeared to the living just as prophets sent by God had foretold. The race of those who call themselves Christians after Him has not ceased."

This book was written and later translated to Greek which was more widely understood and published in 78 AD. Flavius went on to write many more books which serve today as a valuable source of information on this early period of time. Flavius died in 101 AD at the age of 64 years.

The Holy Temple in Jerusalem was destroyed in 70 AD by the Roman Army as retribution against the Jews for their Revolt against the Empire, thus fulfilling a prophecy made by Jesus after an argument with the Pharisees concerning their corruption at the temple. "You see all these, do you not. Truly, I say to you, there will not be left here one stone upon another, that will not be thrown down." (Matthew, 24:1 -2)

Today, only a small part of its Western wall still exists. It is a place of prayer for many who gather every day. And a Muslim Mosque with a Golden Dome stands on the same site where the Holy Temple was located 2,000 years ago. The Golden Dome Mosque was built in 692 AD and is the third holiest site for Muslims.
