CONVENTION UPDATE



Those not holding office (who formerly wore red capes) will wear berets with no patch.


MATER DEI PARISH

An applicant may be a member of the Knights of Columbus or a member of a Columbian Squires Circle, in the jurisdiction of Vermont and a high school senior qualifying to graduate in June 2019.

This scholarship is given by the Vermont Knights of Columbus to assist in your education at an accredited school or college of your choice.

Applications must be returned to the Chairman, at the address above, **by March 10, 2019** to qualify for an award.

The application is in two parts with the major portion of Part II being completed by your school personal. Therefore, we strongly suggest Part II be given to them immediately to allow the maximum time to prepare their part of the application.

The filing date should be brought to the attention of the guidance personal of your school, since **delinquent applications may disqualify an applicant from consideration for an award.**

Failure to hand-write the essay may also result in the application being invalidated.

Scholarships not claimed by February 1, 2020 will be forfeited and the prize will be given to the next alternate on the list.

ST. NICHOLAS VISITS ST. LUKE'S CHURCH ON 10 DECEMER 2017

Everybody knows Saint Nicholas is the patron saint of sailors, merchants, archers, repentant thieves, children, brewers, and pawnbrokers. Further, people know that the historical Saint Nicholas was born at Patara, Lycia in Asia Minor (now Turkey) around **270-280AD**.

But did you know that In 325, he was one of many bishops to answer the request of Constantine and appear at the First Council of Nicaea? As the 151st attendee he was listed as "Nicholas of Myra of Lycia". There, Nicholas was a staunch anti-Arian, defender of the Orthodox Christian position, and one of the bishops who signed the Nicene Creed.

Nicholas also had a reputation for secret gift-giving, such as putting coins in the shoes of those who left them out

for him, a practice celebrated on his feast day, 6 December.

In his most famous exploit, Nicholas aided a poor man who had but could not afford a proper dowry for them. This meant that they unmarried and probably, in absence of any other possible would have to become prostitutes. Even if they did not, unmarried days would be assumed to be prostitutes. In another version, *Nicholas learns of the poor man's plan and drops the third bag down the chimney instead; a variant holds that the daughter had washed her stockings that evening and hung them over the embers to dry, and that the bag of gold fell into the stocking.*

Bisschopswijn (Dutch Bishops' Wine)

1 liter red wine
1 lemon
1 orange
20 cloves
2 tablespoons sugar
1 cinnamon stick
a pinch of mace and saffron (optional)

Wash and dry the lemon and orange. Insert 10 cloves into each. Put the wine, sugar, lemon, orange and cinnamon (and the mace and saffron tied in muslin, if you are using them) into a pan. Cover and bring slowly to the boil. Turn down the heat and allow the wine to simmer very gently for approximately 1 hour. Remove the spices and the fruit. Heat the wine again, but do not let it boil. Serve in heat-resistant glasses.

Saint Nicholas Cocoa Mix *cocoa or hot chocolate is said to be St. Nicholas' favorite*

8 cups (20 ounces) powdered milk
1 (16-ounce) package instant cocoa
1½ cups powdered sugar
10 ounces (2½ cups) powdered non-dairy creamer
8 ounces (4 cups) miniature marshmallows
6-8 ounces finely crushed peppermint candy
Candy canes, optional

Combine powdered milk, cocoa, powdered sugar, creamer, marshmallows and peppermint candy; mix well. Store in an airtight container.

St. Nicholas Candy



4 tablespoons gelatin
1 cup cold water
1½ cups boiling water
4 cups granulated sugar
Red and green food coloring
1 teaspoon extract cloves
½ teaspoon extract peppermint

Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Add boiling water and stir until completely dissolved. Add sugar and boil slowly 15 minutes, stirring constantly. Divide mixture into two portions. When somewhat cooled add to one red coloring and extract of cloves. To the other green coloring and extract of peppermint. Turn into separate pans wet with ice water to inch depth and chill over night. Turn out next day, cut in squares and roll each in sifted granulated sugar.


