### Chaplain's Message by Rev. Edward McGrath

Lent, our retreat, is a time to slow down, step back, take stock, repent, do penance, and prepare. Prepare for what? The revelation of God's love in the passion, death and resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, now accessible through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps this lent is accompanied by a job loss. Slowing down, stepping back and taking stock are not really a choice, they are imposed! How do we find God's love in such turmoil? If one were in Haiti, the question is quite desperate.

Our great cultural version of pride and egoism, self sufficiency, has consequences for each person. Particularly, there is the tendency to see oneself as above and against others, especially in anger, fear and resentment. Closed in on oneself, one becomes suspicious and competitive, blaming and defensive - the loss of the Garden of Eden all over again, coupled with the mistaken belief that I can save myself.

So, what can I do? Simply tend to the heart. I bring my state before the Lord with our prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Lent helps me open up more and more to the love of God that comes to us in Christ. I humbly open the mind and heart to someone more and greater. I need God. I need others, which means I need his Church.

Then, with a humble and contrite heart, I can better use the grace of my baptism and confirmation. I am better disposed, then, to live in this difficult world with its contradictions and challenges to faith, life and love believing the truth that Christ has set me free.

Faith, fraternalism and patriotism, the values of the Knights of Columbus, take on a practical importance these days and in these difficult economic times. Whatever the circumstances I find myself in - sufficiency or want, health or illness, doubt or certainty - lent can bring clarity to the mind and peace to the heart when we embrace its discipline with Christ.

### Benefits Corner by Jim Motz - Area Field agent

This past year was a momentous one for the Knights of Columbus Insurance program. Let me just highlight a few of the many milestones.

Winners for the 12 - 14 age group were **Mark Hanson** (Drug Awareness) and **Luke Berkley** (Alcohol Awareness).




