Chaplain's Message by Rev. John Sauer

As we continue our Lenten journey, it might be a good time to stop and take stock. How are we doing? Am I more charitable? Am I more prayerful? Am I less attached to food and to things? The Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving or works of charity are designed to give external expression to our inner conversion. They also help us with that work of inner conversion by making it concrete in our daily life.

Around the middle of Lent, we may become somewhat apathetic. We don't see the changes. Maybe the disciplines we chose are proving harder than we thought. Perhaps Lent has moved into a kind of routine. When that happens I try to look at why I am doing this? It is to become more like Christ and to live more fully our baptismal vocation. We can do this best by making more room in our lives for God.

In his book, The Challenge of Peace, the late Cardinal Joseph Berardin takes up this topic: God speaks very gently to us when he invites us to make more room for him in our lives. The tension that arises comes not from him but from me as I struggle to find out how to offer him fuller hospitality and then to do it wholeheartedly. The Lord is clear about what he wants, but it is really difficult to let go of myself and my work and trust him completely. The first step of letting go, of course, is linked with my emptying of myself of everything - the plans I consider the largest as well as the distraction I judge the smallest - so that the Lord really can take

Sacred Heart Cemetery Crucifix Project gets Council & Assembly support

KC Council 945 and Msgr. Henry Speck Fourth Degree Assembly demonstrated their support for the Sacred Heart Cemetery Crucifix Project with a \$1,000.00 donation at our respective March meetings, and a benefit breakfast scheduled for April 10.

This project was originated by Brother Knight LaVern Soukup in the Fall of 2008. LaVern recognized the need to replace the Jesus and Mary shrine at Sacred Heart Cemetery that had deteriorated over the years and was removed. Working with the Sacred Heart Cemetery Board, the plan evolved to erect a crucifix that would be located in the same area as the original shrine, on the East cemetery boundary, facing Cedar Avenue. It includes a 12-foot mahogany colored granite cross, with 3-foot arms, and a statue of Jesus corpus carved from white granite. The crucifix will be lighted and there will be a patio area with benches.

The cost for this project is \$25,000. Of this amount, \$12,500 has been raised from donations. There is a significant lead time to get the cross and statue created. To complete the project this year, we need to have the order placed by April 30. We have the ambitious goal of raising the remaining \$12,500 balance in one month. With your generous support, this is possible. A donation of any amount will help us reach our goal and will be appreciated. A donation envelope has been included with The Key.

Father Edward Mountain, our Council's future namesake, is a strong supporter of this project. Father Mountain commented to LaVern Soukup recently, "I intend to celebrate Mass at the crucifix when it is completed. I'm 87 years old, so you better get busy!"

PGK Tom Kingsley describes WWII experiences



Tom Kingsley recounts his interesting and somber WWII experiences.

He started by saying, "I'm no hero." But, from the moment Tom Kingsley began speaking, he had everyone's full attention. At the March 9th meeting of Council 945, Past Grand Knight and U.S. Army Veteran, Tom Kingsley, described his time as a soldier during World War II, manning a 35-ton tank as American forces swept into Germany.

Kingsley joined the Army back in 1943 when he was 17 years old, after an Army recruiter told him that he'd get drafted anyway. It wasn't long after

that he found himself in the European Theater, fighting to free that region from Adolf Hitler's grip. Kingsley recounted those days, coming under enemy fire, describing the tank that took him from the Rhine River to Munich, and describing the scene at the Dachau concentration camp as American Forces liberated that infamous site of murder and genocide.

Kingsley described the sign he saw above the entrance to the concentration camp that day in April 1945. Written in German, it translated to "Work Makes You Free." Once inside, he witnessed evidence of the atrocities the Nazis committed there against their prisoners. He saw deep ditches filled with corpses. He saw railroad cars with bodies falling out of them. He saw bodies stacked outside of a large furnace. He saw what no man should ever see.

Despite the horrors he and his comrades had seen, they needed to soldier on to Munich. His company took the Munich airport with little resistance, and later heard that a German man trying to

escape the airport was captured. That man was Wernher von Braun, the famous rocket scientist.

Kingsley became emotional when he spoke of his visit to the home formerly occupied by Adolf Hitler. Germany had been conquered. The 101st Airborne occupied that house, which had a collapsed roof. He remembers standing in the home while looking out at the German countryside. He had an uneasy feeling, having stood where Hitler had. Kingsley returned to that area in 1987. The land that Hitler had seized decades before was returned to the families who owned the land. The elaborate buildings had been removed.

"I look back and think how fortunate I was," Kingsley said. "So many people died and were suffering, but I was spared." Kingsley continues to share in the good fortune. He says there were 107 men in his company. Six are still living.

As Kingsley wrapped up his interesting hour-long presentation, which could have easily gone longer, Council 945 members and their families applauded him for sharing his story, and fighting for freedom as a member of the U.S. Army. To them, he is a hero.
