Chaplain's Message by Rev. John Sauer

We are now several months into the Year of Mercy that Pope Francis has called for the Universal Church. He invites us to be attentive to God's work of mercy in our life and to be ambassadors of mercy to those around us.

We are fortunate to have, at Sacred Heart in Owatonna, one of the Doors of Mercy for this Jubilee Year. When he announced the Year of Mercy he asked the bishops of the world to dedicated Holy Doors at their Cathedrals and other parishes in their dioceses. Bishop Quinn chose the churches of our diocese dedicated to the Sacred Heart to have Holy Doors. I encourage you to make some space for a visit to one of the Holy Doors. Celebrate Reconciliation and Mass, pray for the intentions of the Holy Father and recite the Creed. These elements will open a special plenary indulgence of God's mercy for you or a loved one.

But not all can come to a place with a Holy Door. In his visit to Mexico Pope Francis visited a prison in Juarez. While there he said in part, "Celebrating the Jubilee of Mercy with you means learning not to be prisoners of the past, of yesterday. It means learning to open the door to the future, to tomorrow; it means believing that things can change. Celebrating the Jubilee of Mercy with you means inviting you to lift up your heads and to work in order to gain this space of longed-for freedom."

We might ask ourselves if we are imprisoned by our past. Maybe it is an inability to forgive, maybe it is a grudge that we have nursed, maybe we are ashamed of past sins and are struggling to accept God's forgiveness and forgive ourselves. This Year of Mercy and especially this Lenten season are a great time to allow God to "open the door to the future." May this be a special year and season of grace for all.

Benefits Corner by Luke J. Rennie

The following is an excerpt from the February issue of Columbia Magazine:

Columbia Magazine: What role does the Order's insurance program play in relation to Father McGivney's founding vision for the Knights of Columbus?

Supreme Knight: The insurance program is - and has always been - at the core of the Knights of Columbus. We have to remember the historical circumstances surrounding our founding. Father McGivney was the associate pastor of a church that largely served an underprivileged, immigrant community. Many in that community were dying young, and many were leaving behind large families - widows and orphans - with scant resources. In fact, Father McGivney had experienced their plight firsthand when his own father died. Young Michael McGivney had to leave the seminary to return home to Waterbury, Conn., to help his family.

So the genius of Father McGivney's vision, forged through his own personal experience and suffering, was that he was able to combine spiritual principles and practical insights. That is, he was confident that a fraternal society like the Knights of Columbus could deepen the faith of its members while providing a strong sense of Catholic brotherhood. Yet the Knights of Columbus was also - in large part - his solution to the problem of financial poverty as well. It was critically important to him. He had handson involvement in the formulation of the original pass-the-hat insurance program, and studied how other fraternal benefit societies worked. And we know that he was himself the Order's first insurance member.


