








Many view America to be in a state of moral decline.

Do you believe the moral compass in this country is pointed in the right direction or the wrong direction?





Many Americans, 60%, believe abortion is morally wrong.





Digging Deeper

- 1. This question was asked of 2,079 adults and 456 Catholic Americans on January 7, 2015 through January 13, 2015. Results are statistically significant within ±2.1 percentage points and ±4.6 percentage points, respectively.
- 2. 74% of practicing Catholics, up from 65% in 2014, think abortion should be permitted, at most, in cases of rape, incest, or to save the life of the mother, or think abortion should never be permitted. 48% of non-practicing Catholics have this view. Although, 79% of non-practicing Catholics want significant restrictions on abortion.
- 3. Practicing Catholics, 38%, are also more than twice as likely as those who do not practice their faith, 16%, to believe abortion should be allowed, at most, to save the life of the mother or banned entirely.

Regardless of their position on abortion, most Americans, including 57% of those who are strongly pro-choice, want significant restrictions on abortion.


- This question was asked of 2,079 adults and 456 Catholic Americans on January 7, 2015 through January 13, 2015. Results are statistically significant within ±2.1 percentage points and ±4.6 percentage points, respectively.
- 2. 32% of pro-life supporters who strongly have this view believe abortion should never be permitted, and 25% of strong pro-choice advocates hold the view that it should never be restricted. However, there is a consensus among Americans that there should be restrictions to abortion with exceptions to save the life of the mother.




Most Americans, including Catholics, favor allowing illegal immigrants to gain legal U.S. citizenship if they meet certain requirements.




IMPRESSIONS OF POPE FRANCIS

2015: This question was asked of 1,027 adults and 222 Catholic Americans on August 4th through August 17th, 2015. Results are statistically significant within ±3.1 percentage points and ±6.6 percentage points, respectively.

2008: This question was asked of 1,015 adults and 613 Catholic Americans on February 25th through March 5th, 2008. Results are statistically significant within ±3.1 percentage points and ±4 percentage points, respectively.









STUDY METHODOLOGY

How the Study was Conducted







- This study was undertaken by The Knights of Columbus and conducted by the Marist Institute for Public Opinion located at Marist College in Poughkeepsie, New York
- This report presents the findings from a random digit dial telephone survey conducted in English or Spanish of 3,002 Americans, including both landline and cell phone sampling frames
- Reports for Americans have a margin of error of +/- 1.8 percentage points
- Data were collected in April 2015
- Analysis of sub-groups is included when noteworthy and/or statistically different
- Please note that some totals may not add to 100% due to rounding





- This survey of 3,002 adults was conducted April 6, 2015 through April 14, 2015 by The Marist Poll sponsored and funded in partnership with The Knights of Columbus. Adults 18 years of age and older residing in the continental United States were interviewed in English or Spanish by telephone using live interviewers.
- Landline telephone numbers were randomly selected based upon a list of telephone exchanges from throughout the nation from ASDE Survey Sampler, Inc. The exchanges were selected to ensure that each region was represented in proportion to its population. Respondents in the household were selected by asking for the youngest male. To increase coverage, this landline sample was supplemented by respondents reached through random dialing of cell phone numbers from Survey Sampling International. The two samples were then combined and balanced to reflect the 2010 Census results for age, gender, income, race, and region. Results are statistically significant within ±1.8 percentage points.
- There are 702 completed interviews with Catholic Americans and 409 completed interviews with Catholic Americans who practice their faith. The results for these subsets are statistically significant within ±3.7 percentage points and ±4.8 percentage points, respectively. There are 860 completed interviews with Millennials, 197 completed interviews with Catholic Millennials and 105 completed interviews with Catholic Millennials who practice their faith. The results for these subsets are statistically significant within ±3.3 percentage points, ±7.0 percentage points and ±9.6 percentage points, respectively. There are 420 completed interviews with Latinos, 196 completed interviews with Catholic Latinos and 104 completed interviews with Catholic Latinos who practice their faith. The results for these subsets are statistically significant within ±4.8 percentage points, ±7.0 percentage points and ±9.6 percentage points, respectively. The error margin increases for cross-tabulations.
