He has played piano in the Jazz Band for three years, and was a member of his high school football and baseball teams playing cornerback and starting second baseman.

When not in school, our young man has been an assistant coach for a 5th grade boys' basketball team in the local public league, a flag football referee and a coach at area basketball clinics. He has been an intern at Child Cardiology Associates and Ashburn Animal Hospital, and works 15 hours a week at The Piano Express with group piano lessons.

At his parish, he serves as an usher and altar server. With his mom, dad and his younger brother, our young man serves the Divine Mercy Outreach Ministry with their annual coat drive collecting over 1200 coats in the past two years at the annual Merciful Harvest, and the year round delivery of furniture and goods to the needy in the area. He has also volunteered in the Leadership Training Program, Cold Weather Shelter and Habitat for Humanity. Where does he find the time?

This young man has participated on the Organ Donation Awareness float in the Cherry Blossom Parade, won three gold medals in the 2011 Virginia Transplant Games and one gold and three silver medals in the 2010 National

Transplant Games. He has also served on the Washington Regional Transplant Community since 2010 as a speaker and hospital ambassador at high schools, forums and conferences. Now you may be asking, why am I mentioning his involvement with organ donation and transplants?

When he was just under 4 years old, he told his mom "it's hard work to climb up stairs". He was ill, lethargic and certainly not acting like a normal 4 year old. After a number of visits to a variety of doctors, he was diagnosed with congestive heart failure. He was placed on the organ wait list, but soon his condition worsened to the point where he was not expected to survive the night. But God had plans for our young man! Another family facing the loss of their child made the selfless decision to donate their child's organs, and our young man received the gift of life. His story does not stop there. Five years later at age 9, he became ill again, but this time it wasn't his heart, but Hodgkin's Lymphoma. After 5 long months of treatment, he was cancer free.
