Game-Changer



Brothers,

Over the past 135+ years the Knights of Columbus has enjoyed many successes. These are a credit to the unique structure under which our order operates, and the caliber of men attracted to our ranks. Our time-proven structure is the basis of a strong and effective organization at all levels of operations (council, district, state and supreme). It encourages member

involvement in a wide range of activities and is the mechanism by which we promote growth in membership recruitment, new council development, and charitable outreach. Founded by the Venerable Michael McGivney, in the basement of St. Mary's church in New Haven, Connecticut, our Order was chartered as a fraternal benefit society on March 29, 1882. As such, it provided for the life insurance needs of its members and their families and promoted fraternity and brotherhood through many charitable, educational and religious involvements. It continues to do so today by operating in accordance with the laws relating to fraternal benefit societies. These regulations require a representative form of government comprised of a supreme or legislative body and subordinate branches. Members are elected, initiated and admitted into the Knights of Columbus in keeping with the provisions of its charter, constitution and laws.

Charters establishing local councils are granted upon submission of a roster of at least 20 members or applicants for membership. The presiding officer is the Grand Knight. As the chief officer of the council, he is charged with the responsibility of observing the laws of the order in his council. In addition, the Grand Knight is the chosen leader of his council and, as such, is expected to provide the leadership needed.

Every new knight is encouraged to become active in his council by serving on one or more of these committees. "Faith in Action" is a program through which local and state councils can put into operation many needed programs by utilizing the talents and abilities of the membership. Flexibility allows local and state selection of activities of interest to the members. Manuals and handbooks are provided by Supreme and State council. An informed and active membership is the goal of every council. An active service program is a means to that end. To make administration easier and to promote increased activity, subordinate councils – generally four to five within a given geographic area – are formed into districts, the second step of our fraternal structure. A district is supervised by a District Deputy.

His responsibility is to oversee all aspects of the district operation, particularly as it pertains to council administration, charitable outreach and membership recruitment. The District Deputy serves a very important role as the representative of the Supreme Knight, the Board of Directors and the State Deputy to the local councils.

The third step in the pyramid are the jurisdictions known as state councils. In Wisconsin this encompass more than 300 subordinate councils to which over 35,500 members belong. The state councils are made up of the State Deputy and the other state officers (Chaplain, Secretary, Treasurer, Advocate and Warden), the last living Past State Deputy, the Grand Knight and a Past Grand Knight from each local council in the jurisdiction. The state council meets annually to elect a slate of officers headed by the State Deputy, elect Delegates to the Supreme Council meeting, and conduct the business of the order within the jurisdiction.

The Knights of Columbus has a proud history of achievement due in no small part to its structure a structure that invites and motivates members on all levels of operation. The results of the annual fraternal survey attest to this. The extent to which our order and its members involve themselves both in dollar contributions and in hours of labor volunteered reflects positively on our structure. The order continues to grow and will do so in the future - thanks to our structure and the men who are a part of it all!

It's these four entities (Council, District, State and Supreme) working in concert with each other that will ensure the continued growth of our order. As I write this article Wisconsin State Council is on the cusp of to have a banner year in recruitment and retention. We started strong, now it's time to finish strong! Take every opportunity to recruit new members, we have several men's conferences coming up; the new combined degree, Bishop's letter and much more – LET'S MAKE THIS YEAR THE BEST Wisconsin has ever seen, it's in our power and in our grasp to do so – "DO YOU BELIEVE?" If we do, then we can make this the best year ever! Thank you for all your doing.

Finally, I would like to share with you a Facebook post from Father Bacik, a priest in Michigan talking about the new combined degree ceremony.

"Being a member of the Knights of Columbus has made me a better man, Catholic, and priest. Yesterday I learned that the national organization has transformed the initiation process for the first 3 degrees into a 30-minute public ceremony. It is beautiful and Christ-centered. I am even more convinced that every practical Catholic male should be a Knight of Columbus. What does our Church most need? Without undermining the role of faithful women-- we need faithful men and fathers! We need Knights.

Don't have the time? We're not asking for time. We're asking for faithful Catholic men. Maybe you can't make the meetings, but can you put a coat on a kid? Could you give an hour to support people with disabilities or seminarians or women in unexpected pregnancies?

The election of State Officers is one of the most important jobs of the delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Wisconsin State Council, and council members should be given the opportunity to direct their delegates as to whom they believe are the best-qualified candidates.

In order to ensure both council members and delegates are well informed of the qualifications of each candidate for the State Officer positions and in order to minimize the cost of printing and mailing resumes in a timely manner a candidate who are proposed by their respective council may submit a one-page resume with council proposal to the State Office of the Wisconsin State Council by February 15th, 2020 for dissemination.

All resumes will be included in a booklet arranged according to the office in the following order: State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate, and State Warden. Booklets will be mailed to the Former State Chaplains, Past State Deputies, current State and Diocesan Coordinators, District Deputies, and the Grand Knights of each subordinate council. The cost of printing and mailing this booklet shall be shared equally among all of the candidates who submit a resume.



The First, Second and Third Degrees can all be done together in 30 minutes and the family of the candidate can be there to support him. How amazing that men can now share their commitment with their wives, children, and fellow parishioners!

We ran a test on a candidate in my home Council in Richland Center. We had a 19 year-old man, Brooks, home on Christmas break from the Air Force Academy. His father Bryan is a 4th Degree Knight and is a member of the Honor Guard in Richland Center Assembly 3393. Brooks didn't have lots of time while he was home spending time with his parents Bryan and Toni and his younger brother Mitchell, but he has seen the works of the Knights of Columbus through the actions of his father. He even signed up to help usher with his dad and the 4th Degree Assembly

at Christmas Eve Mass. This is a good kid and his family is a huge part of who he is and what got him to be selected into the Air Force Academy.

How amazing that Brooks was able to become the first man in Wisconsin to take this degree with his mother and 16 year old brother there to witness it. It is also a very easy degree to pull off. RMC and Past DD Ryan Cairns with the assistance of Brooks dad, Bryan where able to do this by themselves. Bryan stated, 'Brooks enjoyed the program. It was easy, concise, and it did a great job describing and representing the KCs.' Bryan would know, I sponsored him into our Council in Richland Center, drove him to Green Bay for his 2nd and 3rd Degree (150 miles away) and he took his 4th Degree back in Richland Center. All of this took a lot of effort and several months and we were hurrying.



Not only is this degree great for new members but current 1st Degree members can become 3rd Degree members by taking it.

RMC Ryan Cairns says, 'Sometimes we make it to hard on ourselves. Sometimes we just have to read them, 'I Am A Knight.' (Supreme Item #10919)

'We are Catholic men building a bridge back to faith. There is much work to be done in this world. Good work. Necessary work. And that's what the Knights do. Everyday. SPECIAL OLYMPICS

HAPPY NEW YEAR TO ALL.

IMPORTANT; Form 4584 Report on partnership with Special Olympics, DUE **JAN 31**st. All Councils should file this report, with Supreme, even if they have not been active with Special Olympics. This form is used to determine how big of a grant we get from Supreme to give to Wisconsin Special Olympics at convention. If you need to find out how much your Council has given in monies for the year, contact me. I have a listing of what has been recorded for the year.

IMPORTANT; The Team Wisconsin drive has received \$52,321.60 to date. The goal is \$125,000.00, due by May 1, 2022. This is different then what I announced at the DDs meeting. The reason being that some ID (tootsie roll) checks that were made payable to Wisconsin Special Olympics were given to local Special Olympics group. If check is made payable to Wisconsin Special Olympics, it has to go to their state office and will be recorded for the Team drive. The local group will not get these funds, without my knowing and trying to get funds transferred to that local group. If councils what to give it to local group, I would suggest having check payable to that group.

POLAR PLUNGE; Signup has been going on for a while. Check on Wisconsin Special Olympics under Polar Plunge, then check on group Knights of Columbus, to see who has signed up and donate to that person's account. These funds will be credited to the council for the Team Wisconsin drive.

On behalf of the many organizations who benefit from your efforts we want to thank you for your dedication and hard work to this fundraiser. One of the most visible beneficiaries is Special Olympics. The upcoming Polar Plunge is an opportunity for your councils to raise more money outside of the Tootsie Roll Drive. Please promote this to your councils.



You have about a month to get your Tootsie Roll orders submitted. Hopefully you have started your planning for this event now that the holidays are behind us. All of you should have found all of the necessary forms in your packets that your DD has presented to you.

Please keep in mind that we recommend running this fundraiser by mid-May but if there is a better time, you can do so. Two things to remember, your order must be in by February 1st; second your collected funds must be submitted by July 1st or you will not be receiving checks in September. All proceeds received after July 1st will be distributed the following year.

Each year we have councils asking where their checks are only to discover the money was never sent to me. The organizations that you select for your fundraising want and need the money as soon as possible so please be prompt and include the EINs of your organizations. If we did not receive money from you prior to the deadline last year, your order cost for 2019 is transferred to this year.

The state keeps 25% of the money you collect after expenses are covered. The remaining 75% is returned to the councils for distribution to their selected recipients. On Jan 11 the ID committee will be meeting to distribute the state's portion to organizations that have submitted grant requests. We have nearly \$175,000 to award and roughly \$247,000 in requests.

Once again thank you for your efforts and we hope you had a Merry Christmas, we wish you a prosperous New Year.

Here is the Supreme Family of the Month that will be receiving a nice certificate and letter.


