Getting New Members in the COVID Environment

We are finally able to attend masses, Thank God! But the number of people who can attend is severely capped and everyone is told to "socially distance" which makes a traditional Membership Drive a non-starter. *How else can we grow our membership?* It turns out there are a number of strategies we can employ to make contact with potential prospects – Let's talk about a few of them.

Our Council either has a list of people we have been talking to or we do not; this list is our starting point. We have their names because they talked to us when we held a Membership Drive, or they answered an ad about us in our parish bulletin or wanted to learn more about us when they joined the parish recently.

We need to contact them by phone, text and/or email, but we keep trying until we actually speak with them. Our approach is that we are checking in with them to make sure they are alright... "Is there anything we can do for them?" It's all part of the "Leave No Neighbor Behind" program that Supreme started in March. We ask if they would consider joining our Order so they can help others, just like we are. We also point out that they can join ONLINE whenever they want to by using the ON DEMAND version of our Multi-Degree Exemplification Ceremony.

This link allows a person who already IS an ONLINE Member OR someone who has done nothing towards becoming a member yet to join ONLINE then take the Exemplification ceremony immediately thereafter.

When we are making these contacts, our goals include:

- 1) Helping them if they need help.
- 2) Staying in touch, so they know we genuinely care about their needs.
- 3) Verifying their contact information (email, cell, mailing address) for our records.
- 4) Keeping a record of when we spoke to them, what they said/needed, what we said we would do.

That helps if we HAVE a list to work from... How do we generate a list from scratch? Here are some sources for names we too often forget to ask:

- Our own members know men in our parish that ought to be Knights. Start bringing your members
 together in small groups (socially distanced) so you can build a list of men they know. Tell them
 your purpose so they so they have time to think of people and can collect their contact information
 from address books/cell phones. It will do you heart good to see your Brother Knights again
 as well!
- Ask your Pastor, Parochial Vicar and Deacons to meet with you to explore their memory for potential members. They each have their own "Sphere of Influence" to work from.
- Check with your Parish Secretary or Pastor about getting lists of parishioners with contact information. Once you have that list:
 - a. Find out which ones recently went through the RCIA program.
 - b. Find out which ones are in current Parish Groups (Home & School, PTA, St Vincent de Paul, Prayer Groups, Ladies Groups (for the husbands/significant others), Parish Council, etc.
 - c. Find out which ones have kids or grandkids in Faith Formation or Confirmation classes
 - d. Find out which ones teach or volunteer in Faith Formation or Confirmation classes.
 - e. Have a consistent and persistent presence in your Parish Bulletin. From one week to the next, tell the parish about charitable efforts and donations by the Council, Family of the Month and Knight of the Month Award winners, plus any upcoming activities and fundraisers your Council is sponsoring.

Let's Start our Fraternal Year with a BANG... and a Huge Spike in Membership Growth!

Programs

Brothers,

Welcome to the 2020-21 Fraternal Year. While many challenges lie ahead, I'm confident that this will be a better year for us all. As you embark on your planning for this new Fraternal Year, remember 2 main points of emphasis for the year; plan to include them in all your programming over the next 12 months – The Leave No Neighbor Behind Initiative and meeting your Star Council requirements.

Leave No Neighbor Behind (LNNB) was introduced by Supreme this past spring as a means to combat the issues presented to us by the COVID-19 pandemic. It is a new Supreme featured program (fitting primarily into the Community section of the Faith in Action [FiA] umbrella). However, the 5 parts of the Initiative actually fall into all aspects of FiA. The Support Your Brother Knights activities fall into the family section; the Support Your Community and Feed the Hungry activities coordinate with the Community section and the Blood Drives fit with the Life section. All these are parts of our mission as

Knights to build up our parishes, families, communities, and councils! They spread charity, evangelize, and serve as recruiting opportunities as well.

I will cover more on this next month but do check with the State and Supreme websites for more information on LNNB – download the guidebook resources and Feed the Hungry Addendum from the Supreme website. Check out the programs and other presentations from the recent DD meeting as well from the State website.

As to Star Council, some of the requirements are the same for 2020-21. Namely, you need to get your Forms 365 and 1728 in; and fulfill your Child Safety Training Requirements as soon as possible.

Other requirements have changed significantly. They are:

- 1) No Supreme per capita will be levied for 2020-21. Councils are encouraged to pay their Catholic Advertising and Culture of Life Assessment, but Councils will not be suspended for nonpayment.
- 2) Membership quotas have been reduced from 7 to 5% (min. 3/max. 20) so it's easier to reach the McGivney Award, especially with the new Knighthood Exemplifications. These will continue to be done virtually by both Supreme and State, as well as the opportunity for Councils to do their own.
- 3) Insurance quotas have been dropped although Councils are encouraged to try to bring in 2 Insurance members. Instead, a Council is required to run 2 Fraternal Benefits seminars, online or live; can be combined with other councils or as a District. Certain parameters must be met. You must work with your Field Agent and General Agent to do this and they'll do the reporting. But, it's easier now to earn the Founders Award portion of Star.
- 4) Columbian Award will be 16 programs, 4 in each of the Faith in Action areas, but none are required. 16 of the 33 Faith in Action programs are now Featured Programs so they can earn double credit if certain thresholds are met. More on that next month.

So, we should be able to have many more Star Councils, Columbian Awards, etc. for 2020-21. Let's get off to a fast start in July-August and turn the year of Fr. McGivney's being declared Blessed into a great one. Vivat Jesus!

Charity Grant Process

A big thank you to all members who sold raffle tickets for the charity fund. Due to your efforts councils will be receiving more than \$220,000 to distribute to local charities. In addition, the state will have available more than \$90,000 in grants to distribute. State Charity Grants!!! Who is eligible for these grants? How does a council apply for a state charity grant?

Eligibility – Many times charity needs arise that is larger than the local council's treasury can handle. If the local council feels the need is valid, they should make a donation. If additional funds are needed they should apply for a grant from the state charity fund. The beneficiary does not need to be a member Knight of Columbus or a Catholic to be considered for a grant.

Application – First make sure you visit the state website forms page to get the current form: (http://uknight.org/StateCouncilSite/StateCouncilForms.asp?CN=US&ST=WI)

This form has been revised many times over the years, using an outdated form will result in delaying the application process. To complete the form, a member of the Knights of Columbus must conduct an interview with the beneficiary or their family. Under no circumstances, should the beneficiary fill out the form. Here are some helpful hints when filling out the form:

- Answer as many questions as possible. Don't skip questions because they are hard to ask. When they don't have an answer that fits the checkboxes, write in their words or your thoughts.
- When filling in the debt, understand the difference between bills the insurance company pays, and what the family owes or will owe.
- Understand their or their spouse's ability to work now or in the future,
- Can they convert assets in order to pay their debt? For example, if dealing with a life threatening illness, could retirement savings be used?
- Don't attach bills, doctor's names, or medical diagnosis documents. The only useful attachment may be a newspaper article if one exists, but this is rare.

If a grant is awarded, the amounts commonly given are from \$500 to \$2500. If the need is larger, plan or participate in a community wide fund raiser. Prior to the interview, gather resource information that may benefit the family such as nearby food or clothing pantries. If appropriate, ask if they have looked into Wisconsin disability or ask if they need legal guidance from a local attorney. Commonly it takes 10 to 12 weeks between interview and check-in-hand.

Knights of Columbus donate ultrasound machine to Vida Medical Clinic

Local councils of the Knights of Columbus led fundraising efforts for the clinic's new ultrasound machine

APPLETON, Wis. (July 1, 2020) – Vida Medical Clinic received a new ultrasound machine through donations from the Knights of Columbus. Vida is an Appleton-based free medical clinic that serves women, men and children throughout the Fox Valley.

"No woman should feel alone and unsupported when facing the realities of an unplanned pregnancy. The Knights of Columbus have been an important partner in our mission to support and lift up pregnant women, and the ultrasound machine is one of the most important pieces of medical equipment in our clinic," Vida Executive Director Anne Tretinyak said. "We are grateful for their hard work on our behalf to ensure that the technology in our clinic remains state of the art."



Local donations for the ultrasound machine came from Knights of Columbus Council #7895 Msgr. Gehl Council, which represents the parishes of SS. Peter and Paul in Hortonville, St. Denis in Shiocton and St. Patrick in Stephensville. The local Knights raised more than \$28,000 for the new machine, and the purchase was completed with matching funds from the national Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative and the Supreme Council's Culture of Life Fund. Through collaborative efforts, the Knights expedited the funding process to ensure Vida was able to

receive the new, state-of-the-art ultrasound this summer.

"We look for ways to fundraise and give back to our community that align with our faith values and that directly impact our local area," Council #7895 Grand Knight Craig Cummings said. "Donating an ultrasound machine to Vida allows pregnant women to see their developing unborn child and hopefully choose life, whether that is through parenting or placing that child for adoption."

In addition to ultrasound imaging, Vida Medical Clinic also provides other free and confidential services including Pap, pelvic and breast exams, and STD testing and treatment for men and women. Vida's Support Services Program provides education and material support to pregnant women and parents of young children including free one-on-one labor and delivery classes and lactation consultation.

The Knights also fundraised for Vida's last ultrasound machine purchase in 2012. Both donations are part of the national Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative, which has donated more than 1,000 ultrasound machines to medical clinics and centers across the United States and world since 2009. The Knights also support Vida through baby bottle drives, financial donations, supply donations and prayer.

"This donation gives us a way to support these women, lift up local families and support a culture of life in northeast Wisconsin," Cummings said.

Vida (formerly Mother and Unborn Baby Care) was founded in 1983 and is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. Vida Medical Clinic, Support Services and Youth Outreach serves men, women, young adults and children throughout the Fox Valley. The mission of Vida is to empower individuals to make healthy life-affirming decisions through free education and medical services. (vidamedicalclinic.org)

Wisconsin State Disaster Program – Leadership Change From State Advocate – Paul Lang

Six years ago, I partnered with (our WSD at that time) Ronald Faust to begin a journey that carried me into the state's first-ever Disaster Relief Program for the WI Knights of Columbus. My career background as a Firefighter and State Emergency Management Manager within that same career prepared me for that path. I organized and constructed the framework (Standard Operating Procedures, Guidelines, Forms, and Protocols) for the roadmap we use today, partnering with Peter Harrison of the Supreme Council, to lay the foundation for the Knights of Columbus Disaster Relief Program.

I added a State Disaster Relief Deputy Director (WGK Paul Shepherd from Holy Family Council 4879) to help refine the policies, procedures, and processes I wrote. Together, we formed our program to include the DRP slate of officers to help lead us after the program launched.

With brother Jeremy Soldner (State DRP Communication/Technical Chief) and brother Rob Schwerin (State DRP logistics Chief) now added to our team, we rolled out our program.

The same week (July 11, 2018) we rolled out our program, downtown Sun Prairie, WI suffered a major incident involving a gas pipeline explosion. That explosion rocked the city with percussion waves reaching (1 Mile) to our local council, and with it, large-scale damage to four city blocks containing numerous businesses and residential property. Sun Prairie sadly lost the life of one of its Firefighters (Capt. Cory Barr) while he was attempting to clear buildings before the explosion erupted. Our DRP hit the ground, running with checks in hand to assist those with immediate loss and tangibles. We were on the scene within minutes.

A few weeks after that event, Madison and southern WI experienced unprecedented flooding. We were there to provide labor for sandbagging until the early hours of the morning on numerous occasions, never giving in to the rising water. We stayed ahead of it in Madison and won the day. We partnered with so many brothers from various councils. During that time, we discovered new resources where we could be a partner, and they would partner with us: Red Cross, St Vincent De Paul, VOAD, and Sunshine Place to name a few. We are now one extensive, robust program, effectively managing any large-scale disaster that happens in WI. We also assist training our National Guard at Volk Field in WI each year. We brought in the Red Cross Blood Drives Council-wide program and worked so many other programs to aid in the disaster we now know as COVID 19. We've come so far and built so much! You can all be proud of the work you do!

However, it is now time for me to move on to another rewarding adventure within the State Knights of Columbus as the new State Advocate. With the duties of that office, including Diocesan Officer for Lacrosse, it will become busy for me. I leave this position with a deep appreciation and love of all we accomplished together, knowing this legacy is in the hands of my brothers, who will build this program to even more significant potential. Effective immediately, WGK, Paul Shepherd 4879, and WIPDD #51 Vaughn Blaeser are your new State Disaster Relief Directors. We needed two now, as the programs have grown exponentially. Please reach out to them and congratulate them on taking this vital role to help support you and your communities in times of disaster. Please partner with them by joining the program, and when asked to contribute, please personally consider this carefully regarding what you can do to assist this very worthy cause. They WILL need ALL of you!
