Brothers,

November is a Month of Remembrance. We celebrate All Saints Day and All Souls Day to start the month. Many Councils will also celebrate a Memorial Mass or other Remembrance event. I encourage all Councils to remember those brothers who have passed away.

November is also a month of Thanksgiving. Everything we have comes from the Lord. Do we take time each day to be Thankful? Do we take time each day for Prayer? Are we Thankful for every day that we are given to serve the Lord and

our fellow man?

Last month I gave an update on our progress towards our State Goals. I asked for your help to get us back on track towards growing our membership. Thank you to all the Councils that held Church Drives and Exemplifications during the month of October. We made great progress in inviting others to help us with our programs.

- For the Month of October, with 4 days to go, we brought in 100 New Members, and are currently +10 Net/Net. What a month of growth.
- 79% of Districts are Active in bringing in new members
- 33% of Councils are Active in bringing in new members
- 34% of Councils are Safe Environment Compliant
- 29 Councils with 2 FBN

We need to continue inviting men and their families to join us as we work to grow the Knights of Columbus in Wisconsin. We have a very Simple Playbook to grow out membership this year.

Over the month of October, I had the chance to meet with many Knights at the various Landing Day events that Linda and I attended. It is always humbling to hear about all the great programs that are going on in our State. I am truly grateful for all that our Councils do to help the people in their communities.

As your State Deputy, I heard from a number of members that all Supreme and the State Officers care about is the numbers. I can tell you; they are **absolutely right**. As State Officers, we see Charity Grant Requests every month, and can only fund a fraction of what is needed. On an annual basis we review the ID Grant Requests, and Culture of Life Grant Requests, and again, we can only meet a fraction of what is needed. When we watch the news, we see families struggling with homelessness and food

insecurity. There is true need in our communities, and while our Councils have great programs, they can only help a fraction of those in need. We have great programs like Food for Families and Coats for Kids that directly help people in our communities, but we need more men and their families to join us in putting Faith into Action.

Another thing that I hear is that Councils cannot find anyone willing to lead. Many times, the same Officers and Directors have been in place for years and are looking to step back a bit. This is only possible when the Council has taken the time to either recruit new Leaders, or to develop them. In addition to filling the Council Officer positions, if we are going to grow our programs, we need to grow the number of leaders. Just taking the first warm body that says yes to fill a leadership position is not a recipe for success. It is important that we take time to develop Leaders.

Since Every Council needs leaders, Every Council should be working to grow them every chance that they can. Start by inviting all new members to help with programs. When they accept, put them in charge of something, preferably something small at first. Make sure that you mentor them as needed, and then thank them. On the next program, invite them to help again, and again put them in charge of something, and again thank them. When you are planning for an event, ask everyone for input on how best to do things. Embrace new ideas and let those with the ideas take charge. Thank them after the event. Find out what they are passionate about and invite them to lead those types of programs and events. Every program and event is another opportunity to grow their confidence and leadership skills. Over time, as leadership skills and confidence grow, you can then ask them to take on an Officer or Director role knowing that they have the skills and confidence to be successful.

Brothers, the need in our communities is great. We need to grow our programs to meet those needs. Thank you for all that you do to grow our order and help those in need.

STATE CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Worthy Brother Knights,

The Bishops of the United States are calling for all Catholics to experience a Eucharistic revival. As I write this, we are holding our Men of Christ conference in Madison on October 29 with a focus on the power and presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Each diocese will plan their own events. As Knights and fathers, let us all be at the forefront in leading God's people. I encourage every Knight at every level to make it your priority to support your Bishop and your parish priest in every effort to bring attention to the holiness of the Eucharist. Jesus Christ unites us in this Sacrament. For the next couple of years, we will

be promoting events to build up our faith in the Eucharist. This will culminate in a National Eucharistic Congress in 2024.

Let us all make Sunday mass our priority, and the Eucharist the bedrock of our faith. Each month I will offer a little nugget on the Eucharist for your consideration. I've mentioned these large demonstrations of Eucharistic faith that are coming but let us not forget the power of a Eucharistic procession of one. Visit your parish for brief visits to Jesus in the tabernacle. Prayer is good. Consider that same prayer done in front of the tabernacle. Even with ten minutes with Jesus in the tabernacle or at adoration, you are telling Jesus that you really are open and available to his promptings. The Holy Spirit will use a man who prays and who strives for the Eucharistic heart of Jesus in his own free time. Never underestimate the power of a visit to the Blessed Sacrament. If your church is locked during the day, politely ask your priest that it might be opened certain hours for prayer. By repeatedly making visits like this, we invite Jesus deeper into the inner chambers of our hearts. Then when every Knight is transformed heart to heart in this way, we will be worthy inside and out to help our clergy lead the people of God back to the Eucharist.

MEMBERSHIP CORNER

To Start off this month's Newsletter submission, I want to highlight a few of our recent successes:

Membership Highlights:

- All 13 Green Bay Districts have been active this year in bringing in new members
- La Crosse Diocese established the 1st new Council of this Fraternal Year in Elk Mound (Council 18057)
- District 47 has achieved 125% of their Membership Goal before the end of October!
- Council 6568 (UW-Madison Council) which was recently awarded the Most Outstanding College Council by Supreme at the College Council Conference in New Haven continues to be a leader among all College Councils this year by bringing in 20 new members so far this year—200% of their Quota!

REMINDER: 2nd Quarter Membership Incentive:

If a council adds and exemplifies new members in October, November, and December equal to 50% or greater of their MEMBERSHIP GOAL set by Supreme, then they will receive a 40% reduction on their April 1st per-capita invoice. For a council to be eligible to achieve this incentive—they will need to have scheduled and shared with the State their Church Drive and Exemplification Schedule for the 1st half of the year as well as the 2nd half of the year (January-June) before December 31st! They will also need to have attended and received credit for 1 FRATERNAL BENEFIT NIGHT for this Fraternal Year by December 31st!

The Search for the 'UNICORN' member—where do we find them and are we looking??

This month's submission I reflected on a new member to the Order (approximately a year) whom I have been impressed with since meeting at the 4th Degree Exemplification this past Spring.

Upon first meeting him at this exemplification, I noticed how he was already in possession of the 4th degree regalia. As I introduced myself to him (at that time as State Deputy) and handed him one of our State pins, he proudly put it on immediately and wore it proudly. He was attending this Exemplification luncheon with his family—as he was also noticeably one of the youngest men in the room (he just so happened to turn 24 years old that day!).

Following the Exemplification and this brief introduction, I had the opportunity to cross paths with him since at various functions across the Archdiocese of Milwaukee—as he was actively participating in the Honor Guard! He added me on social media (Facebook) and from there I saw how proudly he was to be a Knight—actively posting almost daily the function he participates in at Church along with the various programs he does with his Council and his Assembly. His passion and enthusiasm for the Knights and what we stand for is evident by how proudly he posts about the various activities and charities that he is able to help support. He tries to help evangelize individuals via these Social Media posts.

This individual's name is Caleb Michael Anthony Laitinen from the Kenosha Council (973) and I STRONGLY ENCOURAGE all of you to add him as a friend on Social Media and follow his posts!

An individual that joined the Knights at 23. Became a 4th degree member only a few short weeks later. A person who has and is active at his parish by leading the Rosary, singing in the Choir and being a Lector since he was 19 years old. Someone who joined the Knights via e-membership online—soon was exemplified into his council and has since served as Social Media Director for his council of 200 plus members and is active in his Assembly as the Faithful Admiral!

Caleb is what I would define as a 'UNICORN.'

We have heard rumors of potential members like him—young and active in their Church—wanting to serve those in need—but do they really exist or is this just a MYTH?

I for one am glad to see that there are individuals like Caleb that exist—as all of our councils could benefit from members like him—as they will help ensure that our order REMAINS STRONG and will continue to GROW STRONGER!

Now you may ask—why am I highlighting just one member this month?

Well—it helps tell the story of an encounter that I had at a recent Church Drive that I assisted with.

As I mentioned, all of our Councils would love to have members like Caleb! The problem I hear many times is—where do we find them...or...men like him don't exist!

Now—would you believe that today Caleb might not be a KNIGHT had someone not approached him and asked him to join?

Caleb didn't just seek out the Knights—it took a member from council 973 approaching him and INVITING HIM to join their Council! I fully expect Caleb to continue his leadership within the Knights as he elevates to serve his council as a Leader in the future and even stepping forward to serve his Diocese and maybe even State Council as a leader in the future!

At a recent drive I attended, I had approached 2 individuals similar to Caleb after and before Mass. One was a lector at Mass and the other was an Usher at the Mass. SURPRISINGLY—these active men in their Parish were NOT Knights!

When I asked why they were not—the answer was simple—NO ONE HAD ASKED THEM!

I feel like this is a message that I have heard from probably the last 4 Membership Directors our State has had—the common reason men are not Knights is because NO ONE ASKED THEM TO JOIN!

After striking up a conversation with both of these men, the story became even more interesting! The man that was the Lector also served as CHAIR of the Parish Finance Council! The man who was ushering (prior to the next Mass) serves almost weekly at Mass along with his wife! BOTH MEN WERE YOUNGER THAN 35 YEARS OLD—the ideal new member many of our Councils are seeking out!

HOW AWESOME will it be for this Council to get the Chair of one of their Parish Committees into the Knights? Do you think this will help strengthen the relationship between the Parish and the Council? Do you think SEEING A KNIGHT AS A LEADER will resonate with the Parish Priest? HOW COOL will it be in the future when the man who was ushering can do so with a Knights of Columbus polo—visible with his wife helping out at Mass! ARE WE NOT A FAMILY ORGANIZATION?

This same weekend that this Drive was occurring, the local Council was also conducting their LifeSavers for Life Drive. BY DOING A PROGRAM along with their Drive—it was able to resonate with both men the various programs that the Knights do to help others—BUT ALSO how these programs can be done with their FAMILY! INSTEAD OF TAKING THE FATHER AWAY FROM THE FAMILY—WE HAVE PROGRAMS THAT ARE WELCOMING THE FAMILY!

The point of this message: WE OFTEN KNOW THE TYPE OF MEMBER WE ARE LOOKING FOR—BUT WE OFTEN AREN'T SEEING THAT MEMBER WHEN IT'S RIGHT IN FRONT OF US!

We need to engage and ASK MEN to join. In the case of Caleb and these 2 other younger men, although they may have become Knights on their own eventually—we have a much stronger chance that they join or join sooner by recognizing the leaders in our Parish around us—and approaching them with a simple invitation to join!

Sometimes we stand in AWE of the UNICORN instead of simply approaching with a kind smile and a handshake introduction!

Brother Knights,

I hope your fall is going well. As we approach the end of quarter 2 of the fraternal year, some are in need of getting some paperwork completed. There are 53 councils who have still not submitted Form 185. This form is essentially the roster for your council's team, please work on this.

As of today, according to Supreme, 81 councils still have not submitted Form 365. As you know this is a list of your directors who will help your council succeed. It is instrumental in providing Supreme with a list of individuals who

need to be Safe Environment Compliant. Let's work on this, please. On your 365 you must have the following positions filled: Membership, Program, Community and Family Directors.

The next topic of concern is our Safe Environment Status. Needless to say, without Form 365 and 185 Supreme cannot issue training invitations or track how a council is doing in becoming Safe Environment Compliant. It is critical that all councils become compliant for many reasons. We need to ensure that we provide a proper environment for those we deal with as well as ensuring that we do not allow situations to occur that can hurt others as well as ourselves. Of the 4 positions that require SE compliance there are many councils that have 3 of the 4 satisfied. I will be contacting those councils to see what we can do to help to complete compliance.

Notes from the Administrative Manager



Fire Checks

It's that time of year again when the state office receives notice of a fire and the need for a quick turnaround fire check. What is a fire check? A fire check is a program from State Charity, funding comes from raffle tickets your council sells every year. It is

designed to help someone who had a fire and is not able to live in or use their home, apartment, or family farm building. A Knight who knows of someone who had a fire may report a fire with the required information to obtain a fire check to deliver to the person in need. The recipient need not be a Knight, need not be Catholic, but has an immediate need due to a fire. The information needed for a fire check is:

- $\sqrt{}$ If it was a home, apartment, or family farm building fire
- √ Date of fire
- $\sqrt{}$ Address where the fire took place
- $\sqrt{}$ Name of the person to whom we write the check
- $\sqrt{}$ Council # of the person reporting the fire
- $\sqrt{}$ A scanned news article or link to if reasonably possible
- $\sqrt{}$ Name and address of the Knight to whom the office would send the check to for them to deliver it to the person(s) in need
- √ Submit this info to the State office preferably via email to the Administrative Manager, Steve Geishirt at Sgeishirt@wikofc.com or WISC@wikofc.com or call the office at 608-274-5750

One fire check request may be sent per recipient or incident. Thus, two separate councils cannot submit a request for the same person or event. Likewise, a check cannot be requested for each individual effected in one home or apartment. An exception would be an apartment fire where multiple units, multiple separate individuals, are affected.

A fire check is mainly to help people get going again quickly. The typical \$300 check helps them buy clothes, food, or other items. There is a limited amount of funds available every year so it's best to assess their needs wisely. If they need the funds, let's get them a fire check! If they're doing well but it

would be a nice gesture, perhaps it's better to not provide a fire check but save the funds for someone with a greater need.

While a fire check is designed to help someone quickly, some people need greater help. They may have no insurance or find themselves in debt and need greater assistance. After a fire check an Individual Charity Grant Request can be submitted to the Administrative Manager. This for can be found on the State Council website. At the website choose the "State Forms" button in the middle of the upper half of the web page. From there scroll down to "Community" header, then "Charity" sub header & choose Individual Charity Request Form. You'll need to meet with the person(s) in need to fill out this form. The state officers vote on fund distribution the start of every month often following the recommendations of the State Charity Director.

The Fire checks and Individual Charity Grant Requests funding both come out of Charity funds which is funded by raffle ticket sales. So, sell those raffle tickets which fund these good causes!

Public Relations Corner



You have your program all planned out, you held your event, and it was a great success! Well done everyone! Then the question, did anyone take photos? Maybe we should submit this to the Columbian. Oh, wait, no pictures? Often times, capturing your event with photos is an afterthought, when planning take this into account when you're planning!

They say, "Action photos", which illustrate your program, are best, as opposed to photos of people standing in a row. *Great photos capture the action of the moment*. Rather than posing for a "grip and grin" photo of your council's grand knight presenting a check to the director of a food pantry, take a photo of council members helping to stock shelves. Check presentations are nice, but action photos will tell your story!

So what makes a good photo? (Extracted from Supreme PR Guide):

- Good photos also show faces and profiles, rather than people's backs.
- Try to get close to the action, instead of standing at a distance.
- Be sure the camera is in focus and there is sufficient lighting.
- Online visual content captures more attention than online textual content. Every council with a social media presence should make posting high-quality photos a priority in order to boost engagement from your audience.
- With a smartphone and these few tips, every photo you take for your council's Facebook page can be great!
 - Turn on Your Grid Today's smartphones have many features that help the amateur photographer take images that look professional. By enabling the "grid" application on your phone's camera, you can keep a level sightline in your photos. To optimize images, your subject should intersect at least four of the grid squares and not be focused solely in the center of the grid.
 - Keep It Timely The wonderful thing about using your smartphone to capture pictures is that you can upload photos to your council's social media sites immediately. This quick turnaround time will ensure maximum relevance of these images to your audience. Don't have a social media presence yet? No problem, send your action photos to PR@wikofc.com
 - Remember Privacy Rules Keep in mind the Order's guidelines for privacy when taking and posting photos. Ask permission before taking photos of participants at your event and make them aware that photos may be posted online. Be especially sure to get permission from parents before photographing any minors. Never "tag" participants in photos you post.
- Get close to the action. When you think you're too close, move a bit closer. People's faces are perhaps the most interesting part of a photo; they should be prominent.
- Wear your Knights of Columbus gear! If your members have T-shirts, aprons or other items printed
 with the emblem of the Order, encourage them to wear these items at your events. But don't
 send photos with embedded information such as smaller photos or wording on them (including
 date- and timestamps), or collages of photos.
- Always have your camera handy even modern phones have cameras that can provide quality photos— you never know when a good photo will present itself at a Knights of Columbus event.
- 5 **COMPOSITION:** Make sure there are no distracting items in the background (e.g., a flag appearing to come out of the top of someone's head). Also, central figures should not be in shadows or oddly lit (use your flash, if necessary, even outside, and keep in mind its limited range).
- 5 **SUBMITTING PHOTOS:** Newspapers and other media will accept photos via email and website. Knights of Columbus publications will accept photos via email or thumb drive. They should be sent as attached jpeg files, and not embedded as part of a Word or PDF document. Photos that are sent embedded within other files or through a third-party online photo service often cannot be downloaded at the necessary resolution. Images should be at least 5.5 inches wide with a resolution of 300 dpi or greater. The greater the resolution, the better the image will reproduce in print. Be sure to include caption information in the email. Camera photos that are taken at a high resolution are acceptable.

<u>Action photos illustrate the activity.</u> Photos of people lined up in rows with their backs to the camera are not action photos and **do not** depict all of the ways the Knights are active in the parish and community. Similarly, photos of check presentations, "grip-and-grins," or the "line up" may be easy to arrange, but are

not very imaginative. Show readers how your council is helping people with the funds you've worked so hard to raise; **don't** show them a signed check. Limit the number of people in each shot and, as we've said before, avoid the grip-and-grins. **But if you absolutely must, at least make sure the K of C branding, logo and banner is prominent!**

Sample Photo Caption

Provide a printed photo caption, identifying the people from left to right, with the photo file.

Beatification Father Michael McGivney

The establishment of the Father McGivney Guild was certainly a milestone marking the path to our founder's canonization. It operates out of the Supreme Council office in New Haven CT. The guild serves as a clearinghouse for information regarding Father McGivney, promotes devotion to his memory, develops and distributes materials about his life and virtue, receives reports of favors received through Father McGivney's intercession, and receives news of possible miracles. Membership in the guild is open to anyone interested in Father McGivney and his cause, including members of the Knights of Columbus and their families. A guild newsletter is sent to members several times a year. All materials produced to promote information and devotion to Father McGivney are automatically distributed to members of the guild

and, once a month, a mass is offered at St. Mary's Church in New Haven.

Guild membership is now more than 178,000. The Roman process of investigation into Father McGivney's life and holiness is nearing completion, and the investigation into the reported miracle is progressing. Don't be fooled. The growth of the Guild is but one step along the way. There are over 1.8 million members of the Knights of Columbus. Why are so many so hesitant to join the Guild? We have over 35,000 members alone in Wisconsin but as of 4/1/2022 there are only 1,239 Guild member in our State. The Guild depends on us to further the message of Father McGivney. Bishops, Priest and State Membership, and Ladies

Happy Fall to All,

If you have read my pervious letters, I want to thank you and continue to discuss what it is that we do here in the State of Wisconsin and the UP of Michigan. With Knights of Columbus Insurance, we teach people to prepare for the worst and be thankful for whatever comes their way. I have spoken with many people about why the Knights have insurance, and it is very simple.

At the time of our founding, no one would sell insurance to Catholic individuals and families. Life insurance has been around for over 300 years. It is a useful concept of transferring risk of loss of life of a provider and the loss of economic value or the future income that someone would have made had they not lost their life. So, if a person makes \$100K a year and will work for 30 more years, they will have an economic value of \$3 million dollars. The question of whether they would like to purchase a policy to protect part of that future income is up to them. Most people deal in a world of probability. As agents, we deal in the world of consequences. The tragedies of life are lived by those left. The risk could have been diversified with the right amount of planning.

In our faith, the conversation of delayed gratification is a strong one. We strive to live in a way where our daily lives will show our beliefs and values. The reason the Sacraments exist are to bring us into communion with our Savior. We should do certain requirements in order to receive them, and if we are not willing to do those requirements, we should make the decision to not receive them. Two examples are fasting for one hour before receiving the Eucharist and not having committed a mortal sin.

I have always given people this advice: plan in such a way that if you need it, the benefit will take care of those you love, and if it is not needed, it will still be an incredible gift to someone.

I hear all the time that someone doesn't need insurance anymore because they are older and have no debt. I respond the same way every time. If you die, your spouse will get less Social Security benefits. No one knows how long a loved one will live after you're gone. \$1500 a month less in benefit for 10 years, is \$180,000 dollars. Passing on money tax free allows the next generation to also do the same. People do what they see modeled to them.

I try to stay away from government policies and political sides in most discussions, but taxes are not at the 70% all time high as they were in the '30s. However, the debt of our Country is at an all-time high, and it takes much more taxable dollars to give the same amount to someone you love after you die. So having part of your plan include whole life insurance that pays out 100% and most being tax free, is just one of four concepts that we will discuss on a future Fraternal Benefits Night.

I look forward to connecting with our parish members and sharing with them the reasons to consider joining us on our journey—we use the proceeds to create a better world for everyone. We are a strong company with a proven track record of Charity. We make sure your protection doesn't vote against what our faith believes.

After completing the degree, PROCESS them into your council. If the member does not wish to join your council, please REJECT him and select the appropriate reason. Then please contact me so I may take the appropriate action based on the reasoning. DDs, please follow up with your councils.

REQUIREMENTS:

- Every man who joins online needs to access kofc.org/joinus from a compatible device, <u>personally</u> complete the online application testifying to all the attestations and submit the online application <u>himself</u>.
- When possible, the member should use his own compatible device.
- The member must use their own valid email address when completing the online application.
- There is a new (as of 10-18-22) simplified process in joining online. See the video and guide above.
 - The application form was reduced from 3 pages to 1
 - Unnecessary data entry fields were eliminated
 - The verification process was renamed "confirm membership" and moved to the last step of the application.
 - The applicant can enter either agent referral code or promo code, not both.
 - The applicant's mobile phone number is required
 - The applicant's Parish name, city, and state/province are not required, but are helpful.

NOT ALLOWABLE:

- Completing the online application for a member even if they have asked you to do it for them.
- Collecting information from a proposed member on a form 100 or prospect card and using the information to sign the member up for online membership.
- Creating an email account for a member so they can complete the online membership process.

NEW MEMBER PROCESS:

Follow the standard procedures for a new e-member as with <u>all new members</u>:

- Completed form 100, or assigned e-member status in Prospect tab of Officers Online (OO).
- Admission committee vetting.
- Council action (voting) see Guidelines for Online Voting Motions if holding virtual meetings
- Degree Member must take the degree **prior** to being transferred into a council.
- Process the new 3rd degree member into your council via Form 100 submission or, Online form 100 using the Candidate tab data entry and transfer, or e-member transfer using the Prospect tab.

- <u>REMEMBER:</u> If you use either the Prospect tab or the Candidate tab to process your new members, do NOT submit a mailed paper or scanned pdf of the form 100. It just confuses the issue and might result in duplicate entries. Use only one of the available methods
- Update degree status by entering degree dates for 2nd & 3rd degrees in Member Management. This is not an automatic process

The Importance of Submitting Program Reports

It is Important to submit a Fraternal Program Form soon after a program is completed. On a monthly basis the State Council receives a database that summarizes the submitted forms. Analysis is done to determine program progress at the state, diocese, district and council level.

The analysis informs decisions regarding state program prioritization and support. Additionally, the state leadership monitors council progress toward the Columbian award. The state team determines where assistance may be needed.

As you know program reporting is was consolidated a few years back. The Fraternal Program Report Form (#10784) replaced 24 individual report forms. The change streamlined the number of forms for council officers.

Start lining up now your schools, Religious Ed classes, homeschoolers, etc. to begin working on these in January and February.

The State PPK Finals are scheduled for Saturday, November 5 at De Pere High School. Registration and practice will be 10-11 AM with competition starting around 11:15 AM. Awards presentation will follow. Volunteer help for registration, scoring, measuring, ball retrieval, etc. is welcome. Contact me, IPSD Corey Coonan or State Program Director Ernie Reinhart for more information.

Your Keep Christ in Christmas plans should also be well underway – line up your schools, Religious Ed classes, homeschoolers, parish kids and parents to participate in the Poster Contests from mid-November to December 23. All supplies you need are available for the State "True Meaning of Christmas" Contest (grades 1-4) on the State website and for the Supreme "Keep Christ in Christmas" Contest (ages 5 and 10-14) on the Supreme website. Collect and judge your posters and send the winners for the State Contest to your <u>Diocesan Program Director</u> by January 15. Send you winners for the Supreme Contest to <u>me</u> by January 15. If you have questions, concerns, contact your DD or your DPC or me as needed.

You can also get posters, billboards, gifts, Posada materials, etc. from the Supreme website and Knightsgear.com for Keep Christ in Christmas. The yard sign order has already been put in so you may need to find other sources for such if you need them, magnets also.

In the longer term (January-March), the recent Supreme Program and Faith in Action Directors Conference Call covered several areas they are promoting in New Haven. Among those are:

- 1) The new Hockey Skills Contest for ages 10-17 can be run at any time, in or outdoors, on ice, gym floor or parking lot. It's patterned after the Soccer Challenge. Anyone can compete, not just hockey players. See the Supreme website for information and Knightsgear.com for supplies.
- 2) Soccer can also be run at any time, in or outdoors. We've had very little interest in either fall or spring in Wisconsin, so we'll have to review this program and how to approach it. We can't really do meaningful Regional or State contests until we get more Councils to get off dead center and run this very easy, simple program! Really start now to consider doing so in 2023.
- 3) Councils should consider over the holidays doing a fundraiser and making a donation toward Global Wheelchairs. They are \$150 each, \$1500 for a case of 10. You can really be a difference maker this

- Holiday Season if you work with your parish, community, nearby Councils and Districts to make this happen!
- 4) One of our goals for 2022-23 is to really make a concerted effort throughout the state to get the Free Throw and Knowledge Contests back to pre-COVID levels. So, start now to get your sites and participants ready to go now for Council and District competitions. All the necessary information can be obtained from the State and Supreme websites.
- 5) Continue to work on Habitat for Humanity, Disaster Preparedness, Helping Hands, Leave No Neighbor Behind projects in the months ahead. There's always need for these.

Finally, Supreme and State emphasize to you the need to fill out and turn in your Form 10784s for <u>EVERY</u> program you do <u>WHEN COMPLETED!</u> This is the only accurate way that we can track what Councils are doing, where help is needed, evaluate programs for next year, etc. Please, get these forms in now. Don't wait for 6 months or until June to get them in. Thanks.
