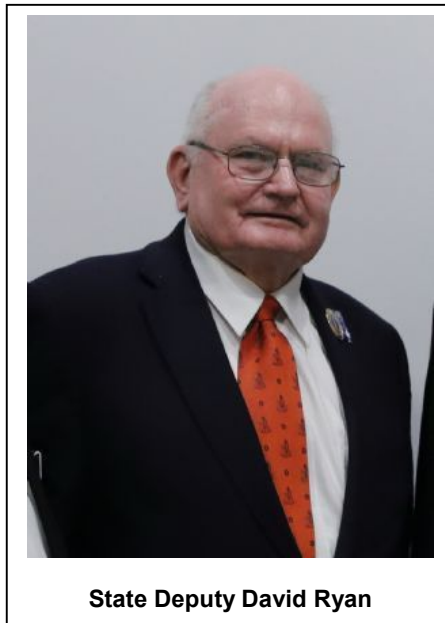

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State Deputy's Message



Brothers,

A quick reminder about my article in September's Silver Knight newsletter. Election Day will be here before we know it, especially with early voting starting on Oct 19. As Catholics we have a moral obligation to vote no on Question 6. See the September newsletter article and video from Bishop Mueggenborg. These can be found at: Nevada State Council (uknight.org) (Newsletters).

Membership is important not only to grow the order, but to replace individuals like me who are getting up in our years and are looking to step back and let younger knights take the lead. As of this writing we are still number 61 in the order with only 114 new members this fraternal year to help us do God's Work here on earth. Our goal set by supreme is 573 new members so we need 459 more new members this fraternal year. This is the largest goal ever for Nevada and over 100 above the final goal last year. We are almost a third of the way through this fraternal year, so we need 58 new members a month for the remainder of this year.

Why is this important? Nevada would like to host the Supreme Convention in 2035 and to meet Supreme's requirements for membership for consideration we need to have 10,000 or more knights in Nevada by 2030. To do this we need to average 607 new members a year, considering the average number of knights we lose each year due to deaths and other removals. As you can see, we need more than the goal set by Supreme to make the state goal of 10,000 by 2030. Can we do this? Absolutely if every council hosts four membership drives a year, which is one each quarter.

Example:

47 active councils X 4 drives = 188 membership drives.
188 X an average of 4 new members = 752 new members.

Of the membership drives I have attended this year the council averaged 8.66 new members per drive. These were not all large parishes; one was a Pahrump where they added nine new members. Even the small parishes can bring in four or more new members so the 752 should be a breeze with proper planning and execution. Again, if you let me know the dates of your membership drive, I will do my best to attend. For me to travel -- please let me know at least three weeks in advance so I can plan, and possibility invite our RGD Pona to attend.

If your council has not hosted a membership drive this fraternal year, please schedule four over the remainder of this year. Three great dates would be:

National Vocation Awareness Week: November 3 – 11 2024.
World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life: February 2, 2025.
World Day of Prayer for vocations: April 21, 2025.

If these dates do not work, at least schedule one during the months of November, February, and April in honor of these vocations' prayer and awareness times.

Our Family: God's Gift of Life and Love

"Among all who are included under the title of neighbor, there are none who deserve it more, in one sense, than those of our own household. They are nearest to all of us, living under the same roof and eating the same bread. Therefore they ought to be one of the principal objects of our love, and we should practice in regard to them all the acts of true charity, which ought to be founded not upon flesh and blood, or upon their good qualities, but altogether upon God." - St. Francis de Sales

Our families - our family life - are a gift of life and love from God. God alone is the creator and author of life, He created each one of us in His glorious and Triune image and likeness as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. He gives us everything because He loves us so much. Three of His most special, gifts: life, faith, free will. These gifts are so visible in our families:

Life: God has created a suitable partner for each one of us, calling us to be fertile and multiply. Husband and wife, by their mutual love of one another, participate in God's plan through the pro-creation of children. We must value and embrace God's precious gift of human 'life, from the moment of conception to the moment of our last natural breath. In imitation of the love of our Creator.

Faith: God loves us unconditionally, and asks us to love Him back unconditionally. He gives each of us faith in Him that we are called to nurture through prayer and trust. Not always easy, but made possible with God's own help. Spouses are called to nurture and support each other with God's love. Children are precious gifts of life and love from God - Parents and children - the family unit - are called to love each other unconditionally, mirroring God's love for us; Parents teach and share the gift of faith with their children, who do the same with their children, etc. We read in the Old Testament book of Deuteronomy (Deuteronomy 6:4-7): "Hear, O Israel! Free Will: Our Father God loves us so much that He created us to be His children. But He didn't stop there. In His providence He gives us free will: the choice to accept or reject the unconditional love He gives us. Families are called to embrace and nurture God's love together. Parents are the guardians, the decision makers, the educators, the teachers of faith and givers of love. The strength of their love for each other keeps the family together. They are asked to be open to God's will for their children. Children are called to obedience of their parents; but also to the same unconditional love their parents have for them. All in imitation of the Holy Family of Nazareth: Jesus, Mary and Joseph, who loved and served each other and their loving Father God. Sadly, our world today tells us that traditional values are no good. Human life is disposable. One doesn't have to be responsible for one's own actions. It's all about you. Only worry about you. God and religion have no place in a world that revolves around YOU and YOUR wishes and desires. This is fueled by the prohibition of prayer and religious symbols in public places, by the false love depicted in pornography, by the "I" phone, by the lack of human interaction and lack of personal responsibility, of social media. Satan is hard at work, as St. Peter (1 Peter 5:8-9) writes: "Stay sober and alert. Your opponent the devil is prowling like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. Resist him, solid in your faith." Families: stay strong in God's love.

The film "Nefarious" is a fantastic description of how Satan operates. The dramatization centers on a man possessed by a demon named Nefarious. The demon relates that lack of baptism allows Satan/evil to gain a foothold in a child prior to the age of reason (7-8 years old). Seemingly innocent gifts like a "cute" action figure of a devil "character" or a ouija board further Satan's plan. PLEASE DON'T WAIT. Baptize your child in a mainline Christian faith. Present your child in the temple as Mary and Joseph did for Jesus.

Nefarious goes on to inform us that Satan/evil has infiltrated our media: newspapers, magazines, movies, radio, TV, on-line; evil has infiltrated the political process/politicians. Families are called to pay attention to, and be aware of, what and how much media they use, and to separate truth from fiction. St. John the apostle writes (2 John 1:7-11): "Many deceivers have gone out into the world; those who do not acknowledge Jesus Christ as coming in the flesh; such is the deceitful one and the antichrist. Anyone who is so 'progressive' as not to remain in the teaching of the Christ does not have God; whoever remains in the teaching has the Father and the Son. If anyone comes to you and does not bring this doctrine, do not receive him in your house or even greet him; for whoever greets him shares in his evil works:"

- to all your child's activities; As they grow to teenage years, it may seem like they don't want you around anymore. A friend once told me that she became pregnant at age 16. She said: "My parents should have been paying more attention to what I was doing." When children seem to be pushing you away is when they need you the most;
- to being together as a family. Resist the temptation to work an extra hour in order to buy more. Children don't need more "stuff": Children need you.

Children, please:

- be obedient
- be respectful
- be open to learning
- be loving

As a family, never let anyone, or anything come between you and your relationship with God. Religious education, gaining a moral compass, is equal in importance to math, science, geography. It all begins in your home, the domestic church. Have symbols of faith visible in your home. Pray together as a family. Spend quality time together as a family. Communicate together as a family. Forgive one another as a family. Love each other as a family. After Jesus washed the feet of his disciples, the master washing the feet of His followers, He gave us a new commandment (John 13:34): "... love one another. As I have loved you, so you should also love one another."

Message from Field Agent Stephen Melancon

Brothers, when Father McGivney founded our Order, a key part of his mission was to help Catholic families attain a secure financial future. It was a hard time and place to be Catholic, but he didn't want them to feel they had to let go of their Catholic identity in order to find that stability. He wanted them to see their Catholic community as a place of security – to know that here, their faith could grow. And here, their families would be protected.

In keeping with that mission, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly recently announced updates to our member benefits. Now, you might not even remember you have these benefits – in a sense, they're the best kept secret of the Order, but I'm going to do my part in making sure they're more widely known. I'd like to highlight some of these updates, starting with one that affects all of us. Whether or not you are an insured Knight of Columbus, you are entitled to the Member/Spouse Fraternal Benefit. This is an accidental death benefit for all members in good standing and their spouse. The benefit amount varies from \$1,500-\$5,000, depending on your age, whether you are insured and how long you've been a member.

The second update I'd like to call out is the Family Fraternal Benefit, which applies to insured members. It's guaranteed-issue insurance up to \$10,000 to any child under age 18, regardless of physical or intellectual disabilities. This also includes an automatic \$5,000 death benefit for children who die before age 61 days, including stillbirths from at least 20 weeks after conception.

Next is the Orphan Fraternal Benefit, which provides \$500 monthly to an insured member's child who has lost both parents, up to age 19. This benefit also includes up to \$5,000 per year in college scholarships, with a maximum total of \$20,000, per eligible orphan.

Finally, the Widow Benefit offers surviving spouses of insured members the opportunity to purchase life insurance, long-term care insurance, disability income insurance or annuities, and she and her children are eligible for scholarships.

We strive to bring Father McGivney's mission to life by offering you these valuable benefits. I would like to sit down with each and every one of you to walk you through the benefits available to you and your family. Please schedule an appointment with me as soon as possible. Thank you, and I pray that Blessed Michael McGivney watches over our families this month.

Knights in Nevada History

Holy Spirit Catholic Mission Church Washoe Valley, Nevada

The Holy Spirit Catholic Mission Church, established in the 1960's, holds a rich and meaningful history as part of the broader Catholic tradition in the region. The Catholic Church's presence in Nevada dates to the mid-19th century, coinciding with the westward expansion of the United States. Catholic missionaries, often associated with Spanish and Mexican colonization, sought to establish churches and missions throughout the Southwest and along the Pacific Coast. Nevada, particularly the northern part, was sparsely populated, but missionaries still played a vital role in the ministering to settlers, miners, and Native American communities. Washoe Valley, located between Reno and Carson City, is in an area of settlement due to its proximity to Comstock Lode and the region's economic opportunities. We will rebuild this Holy Spirit Mission Church!

My faith journey started in Duluth, MN where I was born in November 1959. I was baptized at St. Mary's Star of the Sea Parish in Duluth, where my family attended church, a block away from my childhood home. We lived next door to a convent for retired nuns, where, as I got older, I became the only pupil of a retired Catholic school math teacher, who prepped me in basic math and algebra. All boys in the parish were recruited as altar servers, which I did that until I was 19 years old. We didn't have a Knights council at St. Mary's, but all parish men were members of the St. Stanislaus

Kostka Society, which sponsored parish breakfasts, bingos, and paczki pastry parties. All the altar boys served coffee, washed dishes, and bussed tables. We also lived a block away from a synagogue and I spent many years serving as a shabbat goy (a non-Jew who is employed by Jews to perform certain types of work that Jewish religious law prohibits a Jew from doing on the Shabbat) on Fridays and Saturdays.

I attended college in Duluth, and then moved away and worked for a few years in the mining industry, then went back to school for a graduate degree. In 1994, I moved to Sparks, NV to take a mining industry job. Except for a two-year stint in eastern Canada and a summer in Ghana, West Africa, I worked mostly in Nevada and the western U.S. In 1999, I moved to Northwest Reno and started attending St. Albert the Great Parish. Since 2002, I've been employed as an environmental professional with the State of Nevada and became licensed as an engineer in 2009. In 2001 I met my wonderful wife Marilyn Miller, who was also a mining industry professional. We were married at St. Albert's in 2002, with, then pastor, Fr. Bob Simpson officiating. For several years I served as a lector and brought communion to the homebound. Marilyn encouraged me to join the Knights.

I joined Knights of Columbus Council 7322 in 2016, and within a year was elected Council Recorder. I served in that position for many years under five different Grand Knights. I joined the 4th Degree in 2021, and was elected Faithful Scribe for Bishop Manogue Assembly 612. I've been in the 4th Degree Color Corps since 2022. I've enjoyed volunteering at many Knights functions over the years, particularly the major fundraising events, knowing that these efforts help our Council, parish, and community.

I will be glad to keep you informed of your progress towards your goals. I would also request each District Deputy to collect data regarding programs from the Councils under their jurisdiction. This will also give the DD's the opportunity to assist those Councils who are having difficulties to get their programs going.

The District Deputies in Northern Nevada should get together and organize the Councils within their jurisdiction, and give them a set date when they plan to hold a membership campaign. They should point out to them the resources that are available on the website. They should decide a goal for Northern Nevada of at least 100 new members and the same for Southern Nevada. The goal of each District Deputy is to set a commitment date and report this at the coming State council meeting. The State Officers in Northern Nevada should plan on attending this Council recruitment drive and get involved in the recruitment process.

If we do this in full force, we will have a great chance of getting back where we should be. If you have not done any recruitment in the past and are wondering where to start, just follow the lead of those who have. When I was the Membership Director of our Council, I usually asked our Grand Knight to ask permission from our Parish Priest to be allowed to make a pulpit announcement at every mass. We set-up a table in our Parish courtyard with all the brochures and Form 100. We usually have 4-5 Knights ready to answer questions that they may have about the Knights of Columbus. Some come ready to join and fill out the application form. Once the application is completed and signed, do the following simple steps:

- A) Enter the information on your cell phone by logging on to KofC.Org.
- B) Click on "join" and then enter the information from the applicant.
- C) Inform the applicant that he will receive an e-mail message within a few minutes with a confirmation code.
- D) Once the code is received, ask the applicant to give it to the Knight who submitted his application.
- E) Once the Knight enters the code, the applicant will know immediately that he has been accepted.
- F) The \$30 membership fee will be zeroed out once you enter BLESSED MCGIVNEY.

The church was completely full. Assemblies 612 and 3118 provided the Color Guard.

Bishop Mueggenborg gave a very inspiring homily, relating the account in John chapter 9 of Jesus curing the blind man, to our responsibilities and strategies to protect all life in today's world. At the end of Mass, the bishop presented certificates and cash prizes to the high school and eighth grade students who submitted the winning essays and posters.

National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated Nov 3-9, 2024, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated life through prayer and education. It is also a time to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these vocations.

In consideration of Vocation Awareness Week, the Silver Knight News takes a look at what attracted Reno's Bishop Daniel Mueggenborg to the priesthood.

Daniel Mueggenborg had closed off the possibility of becoming a priest, until he was asked to be an altar server at a Mass for his aunt and uncle's wedding anniversary. "The priest who celebrated the Mass was Father Stanley Rother. I knew nothing of him, not even his name, prior to that Mass, and yet was captivated by the deep spiritual presence that surrounded him," Mueggenborg said. Rother had a spiritual presence that was undeniable and almost tangible. He was a quiet person, but he emanated a profound sense of love, peace and joy. These were qualities that Daniel wanted but was not finding. He recognized that Rother had these qualities through being a priest.

Stanley Rother was ordained a priest on May 25, 1963 and served as an associate pastor for five years in Oklahoma. Later he received permission to join the staff at the Oklahoma diocese's mission in Santiago Atitlan, Guatemala where he served the native tribe of the Tz'utujil, descendants of the Mayans. Although he struggled with Latin in the seminary, Father Rother learned Spanish and the Tz'utujil language in Guatemala. He celebrated Mass in their language and even helped translate the New Testament. While he served in Guatemala, a civil war raged between the militarist government and guerrillas. Around 1 a.m. on July 28, 1981, three men entered the rectory and executed Fr. Rother. No one was ever held responsible. On Dec. 1, 2016, Pope Francis recognized Fr. Rother as a martyr for the faith, the first martyr from the United States and the first U.S.-born priest to be beatified.

"The witness of his radical commitment to Jesus Christ and his love for the people left a life-long impression on me. I will be forever grateful to him for that impact. To honor the influence he had on my journey to priesthood, I used his chalice to celebrate my first Mass as a priest on July 16, 1989," Bishop Mueggenborg said.

Reno Air Show 2024



For years, the Reno National Championship Air Races was supported by a hard core following of former military and air race enthusiasts. It was Ponderosa Council 4928's largest fundraiser in terms of volunteer manpower needed and income earned. For several reasons, including urban growth and public safety, the Reno Air Races Association (RARA) announced that their 60th anniversary of air race competition held in 2023 would be its last at Reno Stead Airport. The 2025 National Championship Air Races will be held in Roswell, NM.

In this transition year this October, the Reno Air Races Association held a 2½ day Reno Air Show featuring the U.S. Navy Blue Angels, the Canadian Forces Snowbirds, an array of vintage prop planes and other aircraft, static displays, diverse vendor shops and food stands. Once again, with some help from members of Our Lady of the Desert Council 12877, St. Michael the Archangel Council 10577, and students of Bishop Manogue Catholic HS, Ponderosa Council 4928 provided parking control at six former air base lots, cooler deliveries to corporate sponsor stands, and cooler ice sales. It required more than 878 volunteer hours in member support plus supplemental high school community service hours.

Considering that the event schedule was reduced by nearly 60%, that corporate sponsorship was significantly down, and that the Reno Air Show was held much later in the year, thereby reducing the demand for cooler ice, Council income while modest, was impacted accordingly.

It is known that a 3-year contract is in place making it possible to hold future Reno Air Shows at the Reno Stead Airport. However, given the reduced attendance and lackluster corporate sponsorship, any kind of event in 2025 is considered unlikely.

Couples who wish to be married with the blessing of the Catholic Church must complete ten hours of marriage preparation. The purpose is to prepare couples for the sacrament of marriage by providing a life-giving view of marriage and by challenging couples to communicate openly and honestly with each other. Prep class topics include (among others) "Becoming a Family," "the Sacrament of Marriage," "Intimacy in Marriage," and "Financial Fidelity." In the Diocese of Reno, this requirement is met by "Engaged Encounter Weekend," a ministry tended for the last 15 years by Worthy Knight Jay Seifert and his wife of 22 years, Lady Andrea. The couple is helped by five other couples (whose marriages range in the length from five to fifty-seven years). Jay and Andrea and the other couples (who in many cases, are Knights and Ladies) team-teach the weekend retreat and are aided alternately by either Fr. Bob Chorey, Pastor of Our Lady of Snows or Fr. Chuck Durante, Rector of St. Thomas Aquinas Cathedral.

Engaged Encounter Weekends take place three times a year -- in February, May and October. Sessions usually include 15 to 20 couples.

"I really like this Engaged Encounter weekend," said Jay. "Unlike the Knights or Women of St Rose, this is a ministry we can do together as a couple." Andrea says every Weekend Retreat is a learning experience for her. "I love the stories the other couples tell about their married life --- what difficulties they had and how they grew as a couple."

Many of the "presenter" couples have moved on to help "behind the scenes," with set-up, registration and lunch preparation, so Jay and Andrea are always looking for couples with at least five years of marriage to share their experiences.

"Sometimes one partner is comfortable speaking in front of an audience, but not the other," said Andrea, "but this is a ministry for couples."

Helping People with Intellectual Disabilities



Twenty-one Council members and family volunteered 244 hours planning and participating in Supreme's annual Helping People with Intellectual Disabilities campaign, aka the "Tootsie Roll Drive." It was held on the weekend of Oct 12-13 at the Walmart Supercenter in Sparks, NV.

Our volunteers raised \$1,307 in donations which will be sent to the Nevada State Council. An allocated portion of approximately \$1,046 (80%) will be designated in support of local area programs that help people with intellectual disabilities. The approximate balance of \$261 (20%) will be retained by the Nevada State Council in support of national programs such as the Special Olympics. This is in addition to the \$100 previously donated by the Council to the Nevada State Council Special Olympics Fund in July.

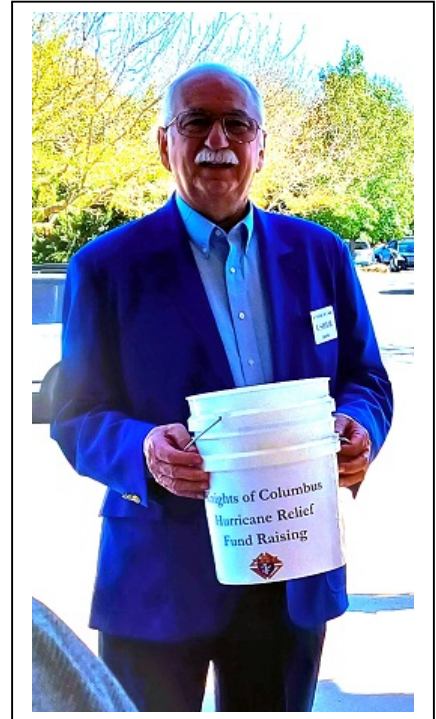

Hurricane Milton made landfall near Siesta Key, FL, Wednesday night Oct 9 as a Category 3 storm. By Thursday, Milton moved across the Florida peninsula into the Atlantic Ocean. In some areas, it dumped three months worth of rain in three hours. At least 23 people died from the storm and at its height, more than three million customers were without power.

The disaster brought Council 13842 into action. At its Oct 10 meeting, GK Jody Gunderman "passed the hat" and collected nearly \$1,000. Then the Council's "bucket brigade" covered the church doors after all weekend Masses and collected another \$9,000.

The Council sent the money to the Knights of Columbus Disaster Relief fund in New Haven, CT. From there, local Knights, in coordination with state and federal relief efforts and Supreme Council leadership, activate a network to provide needed support in affected areas. Knights provide for the immediate needs of families, the parish and the community. This often includes food and water, hot meals, clean up materials and other necessities. The Disaster Relief fund provides support to all areas in North America and internationally where there are active Knight councils.

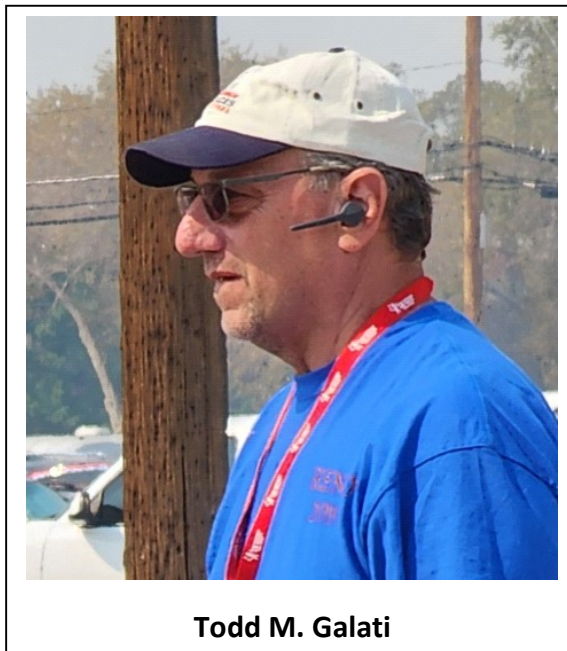

Healing Through Love and Service

“My life is an open book. I am the prodigal son returning to the Lord. If I can help somebody else by sharing my journey, then so be it,” said Leo Carew III. When Leo’s adopted parents both passed away, he felt it was time for a change in his life. He could have chosen anywhere in the world to live. Yet, in 2010, he felt called to relocate his life to Reno, Nevada. Unbeknownst to him, this choice would lead him near where his birth mother was located. “It is true, the Lord works in mysterious ways,” said Leo. Leo’s reunification with his birth mother, his personal journey, and his spiritual life today is a story of faith, healing, and service.

A Mother’s Selfless Choice of Life

When Leo’s unwed young mother told her family she was pregnant, she was given no alternative but to leave the family home. She found refuge at St. Elizabeth Home for Unwed Mothers in San Francisco, California, where she was taken care of through the birth. Having no means or support to care for Leo, his mother made the heart-wrenching, selfless decision to give her child up for adoption. God’s providence would determine that a woman in service volunteering at the home would become Leo’s adoptive mother. Joan and Leo Carew II, both Irish Catholics, were parents of five birth daughters and another adopted son. The Carew family was well known in the Bay Area, and Leo II served as a mortician in San Francisco. At the age of two, Leo was welcomed into their family. Leo, who was baptized at birth, was raised Catholic alongside his siblings.

A Struggle to Fit

While Leo was raised in a vibrant, faith-loving home and has many beautiful memories of his childhood and family, he struggled with his own sense of belonging. Leo’s appearance singled out how different he was from everyone else in the family. “Even though I was surrounded with love and support, at a young age, I began to turn to alcohol to relieve this pain. I didn’t understand my place in the family, and I was very unkind to my parents,” admitted Leo. The unknown disease of alcoholism and other issues led him astray from the Catholic church he was raised in. His parents were his anchor, always supportive of him yet aware of his growing dependence on alcohol and resulting incidents. After his parents both passed away, he made a pivotal decision to move to Reno. “I had worked at Great Lakes Basin Summer Camp, and I loved it there. I was lost, and I thought, why not start over,” Leo mused.

As a single man living alone with no family nearby, Leo found himself drawn to the community of the Catholic church and became a parishioner at Immaculate Conception in Sparks. He immersed himself in serving the church, becoming a Knight of Columbus, joining the choir, and serving as a lector and usher. While the move to Reno expanded his activity in the church, it did not transform his need for alcohol.

A life-changing moment occurred when he didn't show up for a church activity. A Knight brother went to his home and discovered Leo alone and incoherently drunk. The Knight shared his concern for Leo with Father Philip George. Accepting that only God and those that loved him, could help him, Father Philip invited Leo to the church to support him on a project. When Leo arrived two of his sisters from California were there, alongside two of his Knight brothers. Leo had walked into an intervention of love. Realizing he needed guidance outside his familial circle, Leo checked himself into Reno Behavioral Center and also joined a 12-step support group.

Today, Leo has been sober for almost six years. He does not do it alone; he recognizes the need for ongoing support in his battle with the disease. "Good moments. I shouldn't be here, but there is a reason I am still here. It is to serve," Leo explained.

Discovering the Light of Love

As a part of his healing, Leo decided to seek out his birth parents. Inspired by a similar search undertaken by his adoptive brother and a relative who contacted him with information gathered from ancestry.com, Leo began. Working with his sister, he traced his roots to California. Sadly, he learned that his father had passed away. But to his astonishment, Leo discovered his birth mother was actually living in Sparks!

He and his sister worked together to write a letter to his birth mother to arrange a meeting. To his surprise, he actually knew his birth mother as a fellow parishioner. Leo's mother agreed to meet. After meeting, they took a DNA test to confirm what they both felt in their hearts — that they were mother and son. Since then, Leo and his mother have begun to slowly build a relationship with one another. Reuniting with his birth mother was a crucial moment in his life that has provided Leo with a new sense of peace. Father Philip counseled Leo to leave everything in the past and rebuild anew. Take every day for what it is and embrace the time we have.

On the path of light now in his faith journey, Leo met the love of his life, Connie, through mutual friends at Immaculate Conception. They married March 26, 2022. Connie is Filipino, from the town of Capiz in the Philippines. Together, they are content with Leo's life path and thrive on supporting one another. Leo has served as a Grand Knight and recently was elected to state treasurer for the Knights of Columbus State Council of Nevada.

"I see everything I do with the church as I've made up for those times of darkness in my life," said Leo. "My life has meaning and purpose because God shows me the way." †
