

Supreme Chaplain's Monthly Challenge



Each month, Archbishop William Lori – Supreme Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus – selects a brief passage from the Gospel reading of one of the Sunday Masses of the month. This month we look at John 14:15-16 the Gospel for June 8.

“If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always.”

Last month, we reflected on how Jesus probed Peter three times with the question “Do you love me?” Here we have an answer to what it means to truly love Jesus — by keeping his commandments, as expressed in Scripture and in the teachings of the Church. An earlier monthly challenge underscored how our faith bears fruit in what we do. Let us remember that to keep the commandments for love of Christ is to allow the Holy Spirit to bear good fruits in our lives.

This month, I challenge you to use the Catholic Information Service® resource A Guide to Confession, which is organized around the Ten Commandments, to examine your conscience and then go to confession.

Questions for Reflection:

What is your response to Jesus’ question, “Do you love me?” Do you show your love for Christ in how you live? In what ways do you need to become more attentive to the commandments and the teachings of the Church?

Philanthropic Mission of the Knights of Columbus

It is a privilege to reflect on a story that stretches across generations, communities, and continents -- the story of a legacy built on love, service, and unwavering faith.

A legacy of charity -- the philanthropic mission of the Knights of Columbus.

When Father Michael J. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882, his vision was simple but profound: to strengthen the faith of Catholic men, to protect the financial stability of their families, and to serve the vulnerable in their midst. From the very beginning, charity was not just a principle of our Order. It was its heartbeat.

What began in the basement of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Connecticut has become one of the world's largest Catholic fraternal service organizations, with over two million members today --and at our core remains a single, enduring mission: to love our neighbor through acts of charity.

This legacy is visible in countless ways. In recent years alone, the Knights of Columbus have donated over \$185 million to charitable causes annually and contributed tens of millions of volunteer hours. But these numbers are only part of the story.

- A mother choosing life because of a free ultrasound made possible by our Ultrasound Initiative.
- A community rebuilt after a natural disaster, with the help of Knights who stepped up, sleeves rolled, tools in hand.
- A Christian in the Middle East finding hope again, because we helped them return to them homeland.

We serve the hungry, the homeless, the unborn, the disabled, the displaced, the grieving, the forgotten. We do this not for recognition, not for rewards, but because charity is the call of our faith. Through our disaster relief efforts, we are among the first to respond when tragedy strikes. Through our support for persecuted Christians, we affirm religious freedom as a human right. Through our college scholarships and vocations programs, we invest in the future of our Church. And through millions of quiet acts in our parishes and neighborhoods, we reflect Christ's love to the world.

But this mission is not only about what we have done. It is about who we are -- and who we choose to be. We are the men who stay after Mass to serve. We are the fathers who teach our children the meaning of sacrifice. We are the brothers who never let another brother face hardship alone. We are the hands of Christ in a world that desperately needs His mercy. And so I ask you -- whether you are a longtime Knight, a new member, or someone simply seeking purpose -- to recommit yourself to this mission. Let us be known not just by the words we speak, but by the lives we touch. Let us build a world where faith leads to action, and charity is the measure of our courage. Let us honor our founder's dream by living out the very best of who we are. This is our legacy. This is our witness. This is the philanthropic mission of the Knights of Columbus.

I was ordained as a priest in the Diocese of Reno in 2004 and recently celebrated 20 years in the priesthood. I was assigned to St Therese of the Little Flower in Reno for the first month and then I was in Yerington, Gardnerville and Battle Mountain. I have been at St Michael's in Stead since 2018. In my spiritual life I have been involved in the Charismatic Movement beginning in 1992 and I continue to be a spiritual leader for the group. When I see a need, especially with the Hispanic people, I love to talk to them and teach them. Coming from other countries, such as Spain and Colombia, the theology that I have comes from an awareness of Liberation Theology. It is the awakening of clergy and lay people about the sociological circumstances in life.

My effort is to teach people how to become good leaders and I have implemented Leadership Formation classes at St Michaels. At first, not a lot of people were involved, but our parish population has grown so much it has become necessary to add more week-end Masses, and more people are participating in the various groups.

I feel blessed to be at St Michaels. I trust in providence to fulfill not only my dreams, but also the dreams of the community. One of those dreams is -- with God's help -- we can continue to grow the Body of Christ.

Being a member of the Knights of Columbus, I feel their mission is the way I have been walking through my life. Helping me to be a good Catholic, helping the Church and community in many ways and working for social justice.

A Lifetime of Service and Lessons Learned

It truly takes strong leadership and organizational skills to earn a state-level leadership position within the Knights of Columbus. As a **lifetime member** with nearly 50 years of service, spanning 35 years in California and 15 in Nevada, I've gained firsthand experience with the dedication and commitment required. I'm proud to have immersed myself in the virtues of Father Mc Givney's four pillars: Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism, and to have achieved my Fourth Degree.

Before becoming a Grand Knight, I served my Council diligently as Lecturer and then as Deputy Grand Knight for eight years. My four years as Recruitment Director were particularly rewarding, earning our Council a 2-Star award for the first two years, and then a 3-Star award in the subsequent two years under Grand Knight Ken Chipman.

My tenure as Grand Knight from 2021-2022 was a highlight. Our Council achieved 10 Gold Stars, the highest possible, and I was honored as Grand Knight of the Year, alongside numerous other awards. Throughout these roles, I committed to learning every aspect of the job. I attended seminars and training meetings, leveraged online resources, participated in group discussions, and consistently planned and executed initiatives to help our Council achieve its goals. Our primary focus was always on financially supporting our church, parish community, and the marginalized members of our broader community.

Insights into State Council Operations

My involvement extended to serving on the Audit Committee, a crucial role in ensuring the State Council's fiscal security. This involved meticulously reviewing the proposed budget for the upcoming Columbian Year and establishing each Council's per capita requirement. This experience provided me with invaluable insights into the vital roles of the State Treasurer and State Secretary.

The State Treasurer's Role: Financial Stewardship

The State Treasurer is responsible for maintaining the State Council's financial records, typically using QuickBooks. This demands a basic understanding of accounting principles. The QuickBooks program, originally designed by Past State Deputy Tom Thorn, proved highly effective for accurate record-keeping and financial statement preparation. It greatly streamlined tasks like bank reconciliation, per capita billing for councils, cutting checks for convention delegates, and following up on past-due per capita payments. It also facilitated tracking actual versus budgeted expenses, providing early warnings to State Officers if expenses were exceeding allocations. While incredibly beneficial, some subsequent State Treasurers found it cumbersome due to the need for passwords and specific knowledge of posting entries and generating reports.

The State Secretary's Role: Planning and Administration

Similarly, the State Secretary holds significant responsibilities. This role involves preparing the budget for conventions, planning and engaging members for upcoming State Council events, and coordinating various activities such as site selection, catering, entertainment, program development, reservations, and guest speakers—all in accordance with the budget. The State Secretary is also charged with maintaining the minutes of State Council meetings and overseeing the administrative and organizational responsibilities of the State Council.

The Critical Role of the State Advocate

Finally, I strongly advocate for the position of State Advocate to be filled by a lawyer or someone with a strong legal background and active community involvement. Beyond advising the Council on matters like potential patent infringement lawsuits or insurance claims for injuries or property damage, the State Advocate should be involved with other non-profit organizations that align with the Knights of Columbus's values. This includes groups like "Nevada for the Common Good" and other advocacies defending our religious principles, such as the right to life, religious freedom, LGBTQ+ rights protection, and addressing homelessness.

The State Advocate is crucial for keeping the Council informed about pending legislation affecting these rights, rallying support, ensuring the Council's voice is heard, and ultimately making a tangible difference in the community. As the Council parliamentarian, the Advocate must also be knowledgeable in Robert's Rules of Order and Protocol, Meetings, and Ceremonials (#11620).

Advice for Aspiring Leaders

My nearly five decades of service within the Knights of Columbus have taught me invaluable lessons about leadership, dedication, and the profound impact we can have when we commit ourselves to our principles. For any aspiring leader in the Knights of Columbus, regardless of the specific position, I offer the follo

1. Embrace Continuous Learning: The Order evolves, as do the needs of our Church and communities. Never stop learning. Actively seek out seminars, training, and resources. Engage in discussions with experienced members and adapt new ideas to serve your council and the broader community effectively.

2. Live the Pillars: Father McGivney's four pillars—Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism—are not just ideals; they are the bedrock of our actions. Immerse yourself in these virtues daily, letting them guide your decisions and inspire your service.

3. Be a Doer: Leadership isn't just about holding a title; it's about action. Plan diligently, execute purposefully, and always strive to achieve your goals, whether they are fundraising for your church or advocating for the marginalized.

4. Understand the Mechanics: For roles like State Treasurer or Secretary, a foundational understanding of finance and organizational management is critical. Don't be afraid to learn accounting basics, understand budgeting processes, and become proficient with the tools that aid in efficient administration..

5. Cultivate a Collaborative Spirit: No leader succeeds in isolation. Foster strong relationships with your fellow officers, council members, and state-level counterparts. Teamwork and open communication are essential for achieving common objectives.

6. Champion Our Faith and Values: Especially for the State Advocate, but relevant for all leaders, be prepared to stand firm in defending our religious freedoms and advocating for issues that align with Catholic social teaching, such as the right to life and support for the vulnerable. Be informed and be a voice.

7. Dedicate Yourself: Long-term commitment yields the greatest rewards. True leadership often involves serving in various capacities over many years, building a wealth of experience and a deeper understanding of the Order's mission.

Your journey within the Knights of Columbus will be incredibly rewarding. By embodying these principles, you will not only lead effectively but also contribute meaningfully to our Order's noble cause.

MOMs Help at Knight's Pancake Breakfast



Every Christian man has a choice between being humble and being humbled.

The Ministry of Mothers (MOMs) meets twice a month during the school year. The 35 or so mothers who attend regularly arrange themselves around four tables. Every meeting starts off with breakfast for the entire group prepared by the ladies at one or another of the tables. The moms, of course, bring their children --- which could be as few as 35 youngsters or as many as 50. MOMs hires a professional babysitting service which provides licensed "nannies." "The nannies are trained even to handle medical emergencies," explained ministry leader Christine Rossi. "We want our mothers to feel comfortable leaving their children with a nanny, so they can be present together for a couple of hours."

Christine says she is beginning to see fruits of friendship among the ladies. "These are all like-minded Catholic women previously isolated at home, but now come together and share their values and experiences."

After breakfast, the moms listen to a live or recorded speaker. Topics can be light-hearted such as "how to shop in your own closet," or deeper and more serious.

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MOMs Help at Knight's Pancake Breakfast

At one meeting, the mothers heard Jennifer Roback Morse, Ph.D (founder of the Ruth Institute, an interfaith international coalition to defend the family) speak on gender ideology. Dr. Morse seeks to "defend traditional Christian sexual ethics by providing scientifically sound evidence, carefully reasoned arguments, and compelling personal testimonies."

Another meeting brought "The Four Horsemen," a term coined by Dr. John Gottman, which refers to four negative communication patterns that often appear in relationships. The Four Horsemen are: Criticism - Attacking the Person, Not the Problem; Contempt - A Sense of Superiority Over Your Partner; Defensiveness - Playing the Blame Game; and Stonewalling - The Silent Treatment. The moms learned to recognize each of the horsemen and how to manage or even eliminate them from a relationship.

One meeting the moms found especially meaningful covered the book "Forgiveness" from Newman Springs Publishing. The story centers around a middle-aged woman from the Deep South who catches her husband having an affair with another family member. Through the shock, the author must figure out what she plans to do with her life and whether or not to show him forgiveness. "The book was very moving," commented Christine. "I looked around and everyone in the room was dabbing her eyes."

After the speaker concludes, the ladies discuss the topic then close the meeting in prayer.

These powerful growth experiences could not take place without financial support to pay for the babysitting service. "We asked the Knights to help us with some of the costs and they gave us the proceeds from their pancake breakfast. A very heartfelt thank you to the Knights. We include you in our prayers," said Christine.

Thus there will be three effects of nearness to Jesus -- humility, happiness, and holiness.

On May 21, Father Wojciech (pronounced Voy-check), the Parochial Vicar at St Rose of Lima Parish, received a call from the Bishop of Reno, Daniel Muggenborg. "Father Wojciech," said the Bishop, "the Associate State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, Fr. Arlon Vergara, is returning to the Philippines on July 1 and I'd like you to take his place." Father Wojciech gulped and then answered, "Of course, yes sir. I'd be delighted." The Bishop said, "Good, because you leave in two weeks for training in New Haven, CT."

Father Wojciech attended the Knights of Columbus State Deputies and Chaplains training meeting in New Haven, CT from June 4 to 7. "During the session, I had the pleasure of personally meeting Supreme Knight Patrick E. Kelly, Archbishop William E. Lori, our new Nevada State Deputy David M. Clarke, as well as past Nevada State Deputy and current Supreme Director, Antonio Pascua," said Father Wojciech. "I also met the Associate State Chaplain from Poland, Fr. Andrzej Stopyra."

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Meet the new Associate State Chaplain

Father Wojciech described the training meeting: "The gathering had a twofold theme. In the first part, we visited places connected to the life and ministry of Fr. Michael McGivney. We went to his first parish in Terryville and had the chance to see original documents he signed. We also visited his parish in Thomaston. One of the highlights was celebrating Mass at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, where Fr. McGivney founded the first K of C council, and then visiting the graves of his parents.

"The second part focused on a meeting of all State Chaplains with the Supreme Knight and the Supreme Chaplain, where we shared experiences and reflections. We also heard a series of presentations by the Supreme Council about the current state of the Order, development prospects, and present-day challenges. For the Knights, a strong spiritual foundation and Catholicism expressed through action and personal, deepened faith are very important. These characteristics truly distinguish the Knights from other associations.

Father Wojciech had one more surprise. "At the meeting, I found out that the diocese where I'm from in Poland is now referred to as their "New Haven." This is due to the rapid growth of new councils and the very fruitful work being done. Truly, when you look at the activity of the Knights in the Radom Diocese, you can see incredible dynamism."

Father Wojciech arrived at St. Rose of Lima Parish from Poland in July 2024. He joined the St John Vianney Council of the Knights of Columbus in September 2024 and now serves as the council chaplain. Last month Father Wojciech celebrated the twelfth anniversary of his ordination.
