# State Chaplain's Message

Brother Knights,

This has been an incredible week for the Knights of Columbus in the State of Nevada. On Tuesday, August 12, I had the privilege, along with State Deputy David Clark and others to meet Bishop Daniel Mueggenborg in Reno to present a check from the Seminarian Raffle Ticket drive. On Thursday, August 14, SD David Clark, others and I had the opportunity to meet Archbishop George Leo Thomas and Auxiliary Bishop Gregory Gordon in Las Vegas where we also presented a check for the seminarians. I have some exciting news to report. Currently the State of Nevada has 26 men studying to become priests: 9 from the Diocese of Reno and 17 from the Archdiocese of Las Vegas. This is the largest number of seminarians we have ever had. Our prayer and work promoting vocations are working. But we also heard that the Diocese of Reno could have an additional man entering the seminary and Las Vegas could have more than 5. That means that we as Knights must continue supporting our seminarians through the RSVP program and the Seminary Education Fund Raffle ticket drive.

When I was a seminarian the Prince of Peace Council 9899 adopted me. They sent me notes of encouragement throughout the semester, care boxes with goodies: snacks, toiletries, and gift cards. When I was going home on break, the council officers and other members invited me out to lunch or dinner. It really meant a lot to me. What are ways you can support a seminarian? Be creative.

When I spent time with State Deputy David Clark, he mentioned how the Diocese of Reno has a Serra Club. The members adopt a priest. Have you as a council or assembly ever thought about adopting a priest, deacon, bishop or archbishop? Birthday cards, anniversary cards of ordination (you don't need to include money if you can't afford it, but a card and words of encouragement go a long way), lunches, dinners, surprise gifts are just ways you can brighten a man's life who has given to share his life serving the Lord. Be creative. We need to support the men who minister to us and bring Jesus into our lives.


#### State Chaplain's Message

# History of Father Michael J. McGivney Guild

Guild Inception - 1997

Established by the Knights of Columbus alongside the opening of McGivney's cause for canonization. Dominican Father Gabriel B. O'Donnell was appointed director and postulator.

#### Purpose and Role:

The Guild promotes devotion to Fr. McGivney, shares information about his life and spirituality, collects reports of favors and miracles attributed to his intercession, circulates relics, and distributes prayer materials such as its prayer card and novena.

#### Mission and Activities:


- Free Membership: Open to everyone (Knights and non-Knights). Members who now number more than 155,000 receive newsletters, can report favors, and are included in weekly and special Masses for their intentions.
- Newsletter and Prayer offerings: The bimonthly newsletter updates subscribers on the canonization cause. Weekly Masses are celebrated for guild members' intentions, and petitions are offered at specials liturgies like Easter and Christmas.
- Connection to Canonization: Venerable Status (2008)- Pope Benedict XVI recognized McGivney's heroic virtue. In May 2020, Pope Francis approved a miracle attributed to his intercession. He was Beatified on October 31, 2020, in Hartford. The Guild actively supports the ongoing cause toward canonization, which now requires a second verified miracle.

The President of the United States of America takes pleasure in presenting the Navy Cross to Second Lieutenant George M. Malone, Jr. (MCSN: 0-105740), United States Marine Corps Reserve, for extraordinary heroism while serving as a platoon commander with Company A, First Battalion, Ninth Marines, THIRD Marine Division (Reinforced), Fleet Marine Force, in connection with operations against the enemy in the

Republic of Vietnam. Early on the afternoon of 22 February 1969, Second Lieutenant Malone's platoon was moving as the lead element in a companysized patrol north of the A Shau Valley in Quang Tri Province when it came under intense fire from a large North Vietnamese Army force well concealed in a heavily fortified bunker complex and was pinned down. Reacting instantly, Second Lieutenant Malone completely disregarded his own safety as he repeatedly exposed himself to hostile fire while moving among his men to encourage them and maneuver them out of the fire-swept area. Seriously wounded by fragments from an enemy mortar round, he ignored his own painful injuries as he directed the fire of his machine gunners and grenadiers against the North Vietnamese emplacements. Retrieving the radio from his wounded radio operator, he then led a coordinated assault until his platoon was halted by intense enemy crossfire of machine guns and mortar, rocketpropelled grenade, small-arms, and automatic weapons fire from bunkers and sniper positions in trees in the dense jungle canopy. With utter disregard for his own safety, he moved about to the fire-swept area to transfer the casualties to covered positions and to reorganize his squads. Undaunted by the North Vietnamese rounds impacting around him, Second Lieutenant Malone boldly fired his light antitank assault weapon against an enemy bunker and hurled hand grenades as he fearlessly led four Marines on a daring charge against the hostile emplacement. Although he was again wounded and his four companions became casualties, he continued his attack and successfully destroyed the machine gun position, killing six North Vietnamese soldiers. Weakened by his serious injuries and rendered unable to move, he continued to urge his men forward to exploit their advantage and continue the attack. His heroic actions inspired the Marines to such aggressive action in a coordinated company attack that 105 North Vietnamese soldiers were killed and the large bunker complex was destroyed. By his courage, bold initiative, and unwavering devotion to duty, Second Lieutenant Malone upheld the highest traditions of the Marines Corps

I am a lifelong Catholic, a product of fine Catholic education in Portland, OR. I attended Catholic grade school, Central Catholic High School and graduated from the University of Portland with a BA in Finance. I was a member of Sigma Tau Omega service fraternity. I was commissioned as an officer in the US Marine Corps.

When I was a young boy attending Catholic Mass and events in Portland, I had a great respect for the men of the Knights of Columbus. They were always ready with a helping hand and gave great volunteer service to my Church and community.

I joined the Knights in 1988 while I was stationed in the Washington, DC area. My home parish, St John the Evangelist, started a council, (11171) and I was a Charter Member. I led the Cardinal's Appeal in southern Maryland for 10 years. I went through the chairs and became a Grand Knight. During that time, I led numerous Knight's projects including building an outdoor social pavilion on church grounds, building a much-needed elevator to serve elderly and handicap parishioners, renovating the kitchen, bathroom and church hall, and brought electrical utilities to standards.

I recruited, promoted membership including supporting and becoming a 4th Degree member. I served as a Eucharistic minister for the hospital, care facilities and home visits.

I promoted and served as an active member of civic organizations including the Boy Scouts, service as a Chief Election Judge, attended Knights State and District meetings.

I have been a property owner here in Reno since 2006 and moved here in 2017 when I retired. I am a member of Knights Council 978, St Thomas Aquanis Cathedral. I transferred my 4th Degree membership to Reno, and I look forward to continuing my long years of service to the Knights. There is no room for God in him who is full of himself.

#### District Deputy Basic Training Class

Supreme's Western Field Team held an online make-up class for district deputies who were unable to attend the regional training sessions last month. Robert Kish, the Territorial Growth Director - West, hosted the class on Sunday August 24 starting at 6:30 p.m. The focus was "District Deputy Duties and Responsibilities." Fifty-five men in six western states attended. Here is overview of the class material.

#### Part I: What is a District Deputy?

A District Deputy is the vital link between the State Deputy and individual local councils. He is a state officer, but without a vote. He conducts the installation of council officers and has the right to review council financial records, but more than this, he is a role model for Knights in his district. Robert Kish said a District Deputy should "lead, teach, mentor and motivate."

A DD should build trust among the men of his district by creating personal relationships in his councils. This comes from attending their meetings and program events. He should hold council officers accountable and be a resource drawing from his own personal experience and his knowledge of K of C rules and best practices.

#### Part II: Membership

Regional Growth Director Charles Davlin described how a candidate for membership can go online to KofC.org and click on "Join." Once he enters his information, he will receive a confirmation email. After validating his email address, he is technically a member and his first year's dues are free. His information is then forwarded to a local council in his area and appears as lead under the "Prospect" tab on Officers Online. "Don't use Form 100, guys," Chuck Davlin said, "too many errors. Go online. It's cleaner, faster and easier."

The Regional Growth Director recommended using the Fraternal Planner to set membership goals. He suggested two membership drives in each council every year. "Be sure to coach your pastor on what to say from the pulpit about the Knights during a membership drive," he said. Also remind council members "why they do what they do" -- local programs aid the parish and benefit the wider community. Lastly, use the "Proof of Concept" membership materials to recruit.

#### Part III: Programs and Administration

The Order wins more Knights by attraction than by promotion. Men see what they like in a program (pancake breakfast, coats for kids, fish fry, respect life, etc.) --- they see faith in action and they want to be a part of it. A District Deputy should encourage his councils to conduct program events. Programs change people, both the Knight who works in service, but also the program recipient. Chuck Davlin told the story of an Ukrainian widow who received brand new winter coats for her three kids. "She was in tears and so was I," he said.

The administration portion of the training session can by summed up in three words, "Early is easy." A District Deputy should encourage his councils to submit all the appropriate forms on time.

District Deputies are vital to the success of local councils. If a council meets all of its goals for the year, it is eligible for Star Council. Similary, a district can achieve Star District.

# VEA Supports Pahrump Knights

Valley Electric Association (VEA) was formed in 1965, when four local energy cooperatives (Amargosa Valley Electric Cooperative, Beatty Utility Company, Pahrump Utility Company, and White Mountain Electric Cooperative) decided to join forces, knowing they would be stronger together. VEA's Mission Statement reads "Improving the lives of the people and communities we serve."

To that end, VEA has continued its support for the Knights of Columbus Council 10780's "Love Thy Neighbor" project which is led by Brother Knight Edward Bevilaqua. The project received a \$1,000 donation from VEA in June. The funds will be used to provide hygiene kits, coats for kids, and water to the homeless.

Last year, the Knights received \$2,500 from VEA for the same initiative. "As an organization, we are always looking for new ways to help the less fortunate," said Grand Knight Vern Hee.

#### The Silver Rose visits St. Rose of Lima



In 1960, the Columbian
Squires, a youth organization
of the Knights of Columbus
Council 2312, decided to
honor Our Lady of Guadalupe
with an annual relay-run of a
rose -- an important part of
Juan Diego's vision of the
Blessed Mother -- from the
International Bridge in Laredo,
TX to the Basilica of Our Lady
of Guadalupe in Monterrey,
Mexico. The first year a
natural, fresh rose was chosen

but after a year, it had decomposed. So the Squires of Circle 660 in Monterrey decided to make a rose that would not age and, since silver is a precious metal of Mexico, the rose would be made of silver. Each year, from mid-February through December, Silver Roses are stewarded by Knights of Columbus councils along routes from Canada to Mexico. Every stop the Silver Rose makes throughout the pilgrimage is a rosary-centered occasion for Knights, parishioners and community members to pray for respect for life, for the spiritual renewal of each nation, and for the advancement of the message of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

This year "route one" of the Silver Rose relay brought the rose to Nevada during the month of August. On Aug 5, the rose arrived at St. Rose of Lima Parish. Deacon Don Korson and PGK Jody Gunderman led the prayer service and rosary. Many Knights and their families were in attendance. "We are indeed honored and blessed to have the Silver Rose come to our parish," said Grand Knight Mark Froio.

# Dr. Michael Gangloff - A Knight in Service



You will see SK Michael Gangloff, M.D. every Sunday at St. Rose of Lima Church at the 10:30 Mass. He has been a Eucharistic Minister since he arrived in Reno last year. Michael had a long career as an "interventional radiology surgeon" in Port Saint Lucie, FL. (An "interventional radiology surgeon" uses ultrasounds, CT scans, and MRIs to diagnose and give treatments right where it is needed.) What makes Michael an example for us Knights is his devotion to service and the faith.

After retiring from practise 14 years ago, he joined the Treasure Coast Hospice Group, where from 2017 to 2024 he completed 1500 hours of service and made more than 2500 patient visits in each of the three counties (Martin, Saint Lucie and Okeechobee) served by the Hospice Group. Currently, as a retired doctor with privileges, he visits and brings communion every week to nearly 100 patients on three floors of Renown Hospital and to six nursing homes where he chats with some of the 50 patients in memory care units.

Back at Holy Family Catholic Church in Port Saint Lucie, FL, Michael was president of the Legion of Mary for three years, a CCD teacher for five years, and a Eucharistic Minster and Lector (Proclaimer). He still found time to visit homebound parishioners, in addition to visiting local hospitals and nursing homes. He will tell you that one day after finishing his visitation rounds at a hospital in Florida, he went to his car in the hospital parking lot. There a young woman approached him and asked if he was Dr Michael. He said yes. She inquired further, "Are you the one who brings communion to all those patients?" He said yes again. She said "My name is Veronica and the Blessed Mother wanted me to give you this rosary." She handed him a rosary with large grey beads. He looked down for a moment at the cross and large beads, then when he looked up again, Veronica had vanished among the parked cars.

#### New WiFi System for Holy Cross Catholic Church



Ponderosa Council 4928 donated and installed a new state-of-the-art WiFi system at Holy Cross Catholic Church in Sparks on August 22.

The installed system is known as a mesh WiFi system; meaning it has one base station (in the church office) that is wirelessly inter-connected to three satellite WiFi Signal Repeaters, forming a "signal mesh" that covers the entire building of over 8000 square feet. It supports both 2.4 GHz and 5GHz WiFi frequencies for maximum compatibility with both old and new WiFi devices and cell phones, plus the new WiFi 7 standard. It can support up to 200 people/devices being connected at the same time.

Fr. Bobin Babu was very pleased with this donation and installation. He said "we can't live without Internet." The new system will help with church classes since many educational video clips are now available only online. It will also help engage the younger generation.




