Recruiting new members: status report

Joe Alvin Haun, PSD and Nevada State Membership Director, reports that as of Sep 17, 2025 Nevada is falling further behind in reaching its recruiting target for this month. To achieve 20% of the quota by Oct 1, 2025, we need to recruit another 25 members this month. To reach Nevada's target of 53 new members by the end of September, we need to recruit at least 38 men by the end of the month.

What can we do to stay on track to meet our target? Well, the obvious answer is to find recruiting opportunities. Here are the recruiting opportunities that I am aware of for the rest of the month:

- Sep 13, 2025- Car Show at Our Lady of Las Vegas Catholic Church. The recruiting team has a booth at the event.
- Sep 17-21, 2025 The San Gennaro Feast at the M Resort (Las Vegas, NV). The Knights and recruiting team have a booth at the event.
- Sep 20-21, 2025 Church Drive at St John Neuman (Las Vegas, NV). The recruiting team will be at this event.

I need your help to reach our target number for September 2025. Please discuss the Knights of Columbus with other Catholic men and encourage them to join the order. It only takes a few minutes to fill out the application online, but it can change a life.

Nevada's membership started at 7,834 (June 30, 2025) and has grown to 7,899, an increase of 65 members YTD. Target: 8,000 by June 30, 2026.

In the months ahead, Nevada will need to recruit a minimum of 53 members per month to meet our targets on Oct 1 (20% of the quota) and Dec 31 (50% of the quota). Hitting these targets will significantly reduce Nevada's overall quota of 574 (now 573).

Bishop Manogue and His Schools

Toward the end of 1894, the Carson News reported, "A Well-known Man Dying. Bishop Manogue, one of the best men that lived in Nevada, is dying in Sacramento. His memory will ever be cherished by hundreds of people whom he befriended here in the pioneer days. Father Manogue never paraded his good deeds and was always averse to letting the world know the extent of his charities." On May 3, 1895, he was buried in Sacramento. There were many mourners from Virginia City, Carson City, and Reno who attended his funeral.

The First Bishop Manague High School

In 1948, 53 years following his death, a new school appeared on the banks of the Truckee River, about three miles from Sparks and five miles east of Reno. The property was known as the 15-acre Flick Ranch since 1937. The land and ranch house were purchased by the Reno Catholic Diocese to be used for a Catholic high school. At that time, there were only two high schools in the area: Reno High and Sparks High. Bishop Manogue High School became the third, named for the miner and priest, the first pastor of Virginia City; hence the athletic teams became "Miners," and the colors, green and gold, are traditional Catholic colors. Total student registration was 118. By 1953, that number was 158 students. In 1956 the school has outgrown its current facilities. The Diocese began looking for a new Reno high school location. The Diocese made good use of the high school property following its closing in 1958. First it was a monastery for thirty Dominican Brothers and in 1962, it became an independent community known as the Brothers of the Holy Rosary.

The Second

By August, a site was found near the university campus in north Reno, and Bishop Robert J. Dwyer of the Diocese of Reno turned the first spade to start construction. By June of 1957, the chapel and classroom sections of the "The School on the Hill" as it was known locally, were completed.

The Third

As the student count grew, by the 1990's, the school found itself in the same position as the first Manogue High School: not enough room. Even with six portable buildings added to the campus, it could not keep up with the growth and demand of technology. The 23 acres of the Manogue campus was sold to University of Reno. The third Bishop Manogue High School groundbreaking was held on March 21, 2003. This was a 52-acre site near Zolezzi Lane in south Reno. The Grand Opening was August 30, 2004, with a current population of 778 students. Bishop Manogue's legacy has continued for 163 years.

Jody had moved to Seattle shortly after graduating from the Knauss School of Business at the University of San Diego. Jody later graduated from the Stonier Graduate School of Banking at the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania in 2014.

Jody and Debbie were married in 1982. Jody has worked as an Operations and Financial Officer in the Property & Casualty Insurance industry spanning the country from Seattle to Manhattan. When the Gunderman's moved to Reno, he was the National Director for Harley-Davidson's Financial Services. Suffering is an inescapable part of human life, a consequence of the fall. When we deal with our suffering in a virtuous way, we unite ourselves to the cross of Christ. In fact, Jesus tells us that taking up our cross is an essential condition for being his disciple. The wonderful thing is that God will supply whatever grace and strength we need to carry our cross, if only we ask for it in faith. May we always carry our cross daily with courage as faithful followers of Christ.

Challenge by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori:

This month, as we celebrate the feast of the Exaltation of the Cross on Sept. 14, I challenge you to undertake some sacrifice or mortification — such as abstaining from meat one or two days a week — to strengthen your willingness to carry your cross daily.

Questions for Reflection:

What are the crosses you must carry in your life? Which do you struggle with the most? Do you faithfully and regularly seek strength from Christ in carrying your cross in prayer and the sacraments?

This question challenges everything I was taught about success. I grew up believing that achieving great things required careful planning, structured goal-setting, substantial resources, and the right people. Whether you're launching a business, starting a ministry, or organizing a project—typically, you'd need facilities, equipment, funding, and expertise.

2. Leverage the Power of Community

You are not alone. Surround yourself with believers, supporters, and doers. When one person's faith wavers, the community lifts them up. Together, we are stronger.

- 3. Embrace a Growth Mindset Don't fear obstacles—embrace them.

 Every challenge is chance to grow. With faith, setbacks become setups for something greater.
- 4. Be a Wise Steward of What You Have

Maximize your time, talents, and resources. Strategic prioritization beats having a big budget. Faith helps us see opportunity where others see limits.

So, how do we focus our councils to do more with less?

- Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament
- Simbang Gabi
- Our Lady of Guadalupe celebrations
- COR weekends and retreats

Faith is the strength that sustains our mission.

FAMILY & COMMUNITY: Engage in programs that bring people together and make a visible difference:

- Coats for Kids
- Food drives
- Wheelchair distribution
- Ultrasound & ASAP support

Charity is the fruit of our love for God and neighbor.

RECRUITMENT: Set clear goals and work closely with your Parish Priest. Show your parish what your council is doing. People will be drawn to purpose and impact.

Recruitment is the fuel that keeps the mission alive.

FOCUS: Warren Buffet, Bill Gates, and countless leaders echo one truth: Focus is the key.

Don't try to do everything. Do a few things that matter—and do them well.

Focus is the engine that drives performance.

Blessed Michael McGivney Leader Fellowship



The purpose of the Leader Fellowship program is to help State Deputies identify, train, and develop future leaders of the order. Knights with a potential to serve as state officers may apply and those who are accepted will follow a practice-based curriculum and will then receive a Knights of Columbus leadership certification. The curriculum consists of virtual monthly workshops that focus on the habits and skills necessary for effective leadership. It will also feature guidance on how to practice leadership virtues and skills between sessions. All participants should also anticipate a two-day in-person education session.

I was selected by our WPSD David Ryan to be Nevada's representative to the annual Blessed Michael McGivney Leader Fellowship. Here is an executive summary of the event.

The two-day leadership training session met the week of August 15 in Washington, DC. The men in attendance were chosen by their respective jurisdictions, one from each state in the US and province in Canada. Many were District Deputies, Junior State Team Members, and even a handful of State Officers.

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Among all the devotions approved by the Church none has been so favored by so many miracles as the devotion of the Most Holy Rosary.

McGivney Leader Fellowship

Each day began by praying the rosary, then followed by the various sessions and concluded with Mass. The days were intense, filled with deep prayer and thought, and focused on teaching the participants the skills and virtues associated with leadership. We studied scripture, the writings of Saints Augustine and Thomas Aquinas, and others relating our faith to leadership within the Knights.

The first day was a deep dive into prayer and humility. We focused on the need for Knights of Columbus leaders (and leaders in general) to be men of intense prayer. We learned that as we pray, God gives us grace for responding to his invitation, and then that grace grows our relationship with him and prepares us for the day's tasks. Next, we spoke about humility and how it was a necessary virtue for leadership. Humility -- meaning one has a true understanding of the self -- allows one to properly understand their role and avoid the pitfalls of pride. It also allows one to be properly magnanimous, another virtue that we spoke of.

The second day focused on the virtue of magnanimity, which St. Thomas Aquinas describes as the "stretching of the soul to great things." Magnanimity is the virtue that allows a person to perform great deeds and difficult acts. When combined with humility and an understanding of one's proper identity rooted in God, this leads to greatness. Think of our founder, Blessed Michael McGivney, who knew his identity as both a son of God and a priest of God and who had a great vision to bring about our order and actually did it. Think about Jesus Christ, who sought the redemption of the world through His sacrifice, and knew He could do it because of His identity as God's Son and the Second Person of the Holy Trinity.

The sacraments were made readily available, with confession and Mass on Friday and Saturday. We spent time venerating the relics of St. John Paul II and a relic of the True Cross. It was a powerful weekend of conversion and prayer. I am deeply grateful to WPSD Dave Ryan for sending me to this training.

SEAS's VBS Kids Raise Money for Coats





Investor's Business Daily (IBD) is a newspaper and website that covers the stock market, international business, finance, and economics. It was founded in 1984 by William O'Neil as a print newspaper and is now owned by News Corp, the parent company of the Wall Street Journal.

In Feb 2006, Investor's Business Daily published an article about how Fr. Michael McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus.

"Many hard-working immigrants - most of them Catholic -- died young of diseases they had no money to prevent or treat," the article reads. "McGivney couldn't turn his back on suffering, so he founded a fraternal welfare society to provide sick benefits and low-cost life insurance for the Catholic poor."

Founding a fraternal group and obtaining affordable life insurance the poor in his parish was a major challenge for a priest who was not trained in finance, especially because the church hierarchy wasn't in favor of the idea. However, through diligent efforts, Fr. McGivney received approval of the church and then called on prominent local leaders to oversee his mission. After receiving a charter from the state of Connecticut in 1882, he sent out letters to local parishes describing the benefits of membership in the Knights of Columbus in the event of accident or illness -- \$5 a week for up to 13 weeks.

Once the Knights became a viable organization, Fr. McGivney took a step back. In 1884 he declined to be re-elected as the secretary of the Supreme Council and as the IBD writer observed, "The only thing McGivney liked better than working with the men of the Knights ... was standing back and watching them work together."

These are teachings that it would be wrong to apply only to one's personal life in order to win eternal salvation; these are eminently social teachings, and they show in Our Lord Jesus Christ something quite different from an inconsistent and impotent humanitarianism.'

Pope Leo XIV's genealogy



On June 11, 2025 the New York Times published an article tracing Pope Leo XIV's geneology back 15 generations. The article was written by university professor Henry Louis Gates Jr. in collaboration with American Ancestors and the Cuban Genealogy Club of Miami.

The farthest back the team could go was to Spain in the 1500s on the pope's mother's side. "Four of his 11th-great-grandfathers are listed as "hidalgos" ("gentlemen," or minor untitled nobility) in the 1573 census for Isla, a small town in northern Spain. On his father's side, at least five generations were born in Sicily," reads the Times.

How did the pope end up with a French surname, even though his paternal grandfather's ancestors were almost all Italian? Well, there was a bit of a scandal in 1917. The Times reports "An extramarital affair produced two sons out of wedlock, Jean, the pope's uncle, and Louis, the pope's father. They were given their grandmother's maiden name, Prévost."

Of the pope's eighth-great-grandparents known to have been born in France, all had relocated to Quebec in the 1650s.

"Through one Canadian ancestor, Louis Boucher de Grandpre, who was born in Trois-Rivières, Quebec, the pope is related to numerous Canadian-derived distant cousins, including Pierre and Justin Trudeau, Angelina Jolie, Hillary Clinton, Justin Bieber, Jack Kerouac and Madonna," according to the Times.

As I read the Pope Leo's geneology, I am reminded of the geneology of Jesus in chapter 1 of Matthew's Gospel. In both cases we find diverse ethnicities -- Rahab was Canaanite and so likely was Tamar; Ruth was a Moabite and Bathsheba, probably a Hittite. While Pope Leo's ancestors were Spanish, French and Italian. We also find scandals -- David and Bathsheba and the Pope's grandmother. But what counts most importantly, it is the result of the ancestry – in one case Christ himself, in the other case, His Vicar.

The devotion to the Eucharist is the most noble, because it has God as its object; it is the most profitable for salvation, because it gives us the Author of Grace; it is the sweetest, because the Lord is Sweetness Itself.

Real Choices Gala











Volunteer "Thank You" Dinner






