

Knights in Nevada History

More on the 4th Degree Formation History

On the 1950 jubilee of the Fourth Degree, William Mulligan reflected on its historical programs: the WWI program in support of the KofC Huts; the Historical Commission "to put a stop to the perversion and falsification of American history"; the essay contest, Catholic Action, and the retreat movement. On December 4, 1949, on the eve of the jubilee, the Fourth Degree was established in the Philippine Islands, Father George Willman, S.J., who is considered the second founder of the Order there, was appointed Special Master, and he led the exemplification or initiation of 160 candidates.

Mulligan stressed the present and future work of the Fourth Degree, simultaneously patriotic and religious. However, because "a war is being waged to secularize all American life, the permanent estrangement of those words "patriotic' and 'religious' is being attempted." Mulligan criticized those "zealots" dedicated to popularizing a "doctrine" that the human person "is no more than the creature of society, subjected to the society for existence, identity, and rights," rather than "a creature of God." Mulligan reminded the members that God is the source of all rights and identity, "freedom under God and unto God is the (Citizen's) birthright... Genuine Americanism and the Christian religion are historically and in character closely akin.

Knights Help MOMs with Pancakes



"The Ministry of Mothers (MOMs) actually started 30 years ago at Little Flower parish," explained ministry leader Christine Rossi. "The pastor at that time, Father King asked my mother, Paula Rathier, to organize a group for Catholic mothers. I remember helping her set up chairs and putting out plates of cookies."

MOMs started at St Rose of Lima last January. Thirty-seven moms come together twice a month. Alternately, one group of moms make breakfast for the others. Then they have a live speaker (or a video) followed by discussion, craft time and prayer. Topics range from marriage, to motherhood to Catholic spirituality. Meetings last about two hours. "The only requirement for membership is that you must be a mother with a child under the age of ten," said Christine.

The moms bring their "little ones" with them -- all 120 of them. "We hire a licensed nanny service," Christine said. "These ladies are trained even to handle medical emergencies." This is where the Knights come in. "We asked the Knights to help us with some of the costs," added Christine. "They gave us a \$500 donation and the proceeds of a pancake breakfast. A dozen of us moms came to help serve." (Proceeds of the breakfast came to \$1,100).

"A very heartfelt thank you to the Knights. We include you in our prayers," said Christine.

David Willems is the Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministry for the Diocese of Reno. Last month Bishop Daniel Mueggenborg gave David an assignment: enable students from rural parishes to attend the Steubenville Youth Conference. The conferences are an outreach of Franciscan University of Steubenville held every year in 25 locations across North America. "Our young people are especially struggling with their identity and worth. This is why helping them encounter the Lord is vital," said David. The mission of

these conferences is to build the Church by evangelizing, equipping, and empowering God's children to become radical and joyful disciples. And they succeed.

Over the last two decades, 20% of those ordained to the priesthood or professing vows to a religious order have attributed the Steubenville Conference as the place they heard God's call. "We had three parishes in the summer of 2023 attend and five individuals came forward when asked if they felt a call to the priesthood or religious life," David added. "These are inspiring numbers about the power of these conferences."

"I am pleased to share that on July 12 to 14, I will lead 31 teens and chaperones from a few of our rural parishes in our diocese to a Steubenville Conference in Tucson, AZ. Please keep these individuals in your prayers that they may come to know, love, and serve the Lord throughout their life," David concluded.

David asked if Councils in the Reno Diocese would be willing to sponsor a conference attendee.

Shed for the Marvin Picollo Riding School

"Special needs kids -- that's what the Marvin Picollo School is all about," said Sue Lennon, Program Facilitator at the School. "We are one of two schools in Reno that are set up for special needs kids. We have about 80 kids right now --- many of them in wheelchairs. What makes Marvin Picollo unique is our equestian program. There's nothing like it in the state."

"As part of their physical education, the kids come here to ride horses," Sue explained. "I've seen kids come here all tense, with their arms crossed tightly and looking fearful. We get them on a horse and after a lap or two around the arena, they relax, their arms come down to their sides and they begin to smile. That's my reward. That's what keeps me at the job -- the smile." Sue has worked at the school since 2001.

The equestian school gets no money from Washoe County. It relies entirely on donations and fund-raising events. "That's where the Knights come in," said Sue. "The Knights have paid for a swamp cooler, a lift to get the kids off and on the horses, a wheelchair ramp, some fencing and now a tact shed."

Council 13842 intended to pay the entire cost for the building the shed. ACE Charter High School's construction department agreed to put the tack shed together, showcasing the practical skills of its students. The High School donated not just the labor, but also the cost of materials needed for the shed. Reno Rock Transport laid the concrete pad without charge. The Council paid to transport the shed to Marvin Picollo, then three Knights painted the shed.

Following discussions at an earlier Assembly meeting, Sir Knight Rich Solferino put together a flag exchange program. He first tested out the idea of an exchange at a Pancake Breakfast at St Rose. Rich then bought 80 American flags from Amazon. ("They had the best price," he said.) Then Rich and a team of veterans from Council 13842 took the time to fold each flag properly. At all the Masses on the Memorial Day weekend, Rich and several other Knights set up a table in the Narthex at St Rose of Lima for the flag exchange. "I was amazed at the response. We collected 31 old flags and gave out 69 brand new flags," Rich said. At one Mass, SK Chris Bessey appeared in his "dress blues." He is a retired Navy pilot with the rank of Lt. Commander. The response was astonishing. Vets congratuated the Knights for their efforts. One woman took a new flag and kissed it. "I love this flag," she said, "I love this country."

Rich collected more than \$700 in donations. He plans another flag exchange on the Labor Day weekend. "But first we'll have to buy more flags. We only have 11 left."

Our year end State convention held on May 4-6 was the most attended in the history of our State. His Excellencies, Archbishop Leo Thomas and Bishop Gregory Gordon celebrated the mass at the Sand Coast Casino & Resort.

Brothers, as this 2023/2024 Columbian year draws to a close, I encourage you to look back and view the accomplishments you have done. The picture indeed was rosy and spectacular and full of promises: four of our Councils have achieved STAR Council status by reaching or exceeding their membership quotas and meeting the requirements for insurance promotion and 12-13 more just need to complete the other requirements.. We have a month more to go and there are still some Councils on the brink of earning it. We were first in group 4 and 8 nationwide in achieving our membership quota. Now, as we enter into a new Columbian year, we can celebrate and take pride in what we have accomplished and start making plans to do what we have not.

The place to start is do what we term in management as a post mortem analysis of your SP7 report. As the term implies, a postmortem report is a collaborative reflection that allows a team to assess the successes, challenges, and failures of a particular project after it is completed. In other words, it is an opportunity to conduct a retrospective analysis of work processes, team-collaboration, and technology use in the workplace.

You can start by filling out Form 1728 which is an analysis of your Council activities for the year. For those Councils who have achieved a STAR status, picking up another program will simply add another feather to your cap. To those who have not, select from the list of programs under the categories of Faith, Family, Community and Life. Keep in mind that you need four points in each of this categories to earn your Columbian award. You earn two points if you selected a featured program and meet the minimum requirements. One point for a non featured program. (Please refer to the attached worksheet.)

Once you have selected your programs, engage and organize your members. Have a signup sheet for volunteers who are willing to volunteer their time, effort and energy to make the program successful. Successful programs attract and vice versa. You can appoint a Chairman for each committee who will report to the over-all Program Director. The over-all Program Director is responsible for keeping track of the activities of the chairman of the different program committees. He will create a chart of the Council's programs as they ended up the year and add new programs that they have decided to add. He is responsible to report the progress of each Committee to the Grand Knight at the monthly Council meeting.

Service. Heeding the call to service, Shane went on to attend Texas A&M University as a member of the Corps of Cadets. As a cadet, he was Head Drum Major of the Fightin' Texas Aggie Band and was also a member of SEAL Platoon, while still finding time to remain active as a Knight. Upon graduation in 1998, he was commissioned in the United States Navy, immediately left for flight school, and earned his Wings of gold in 2000.

His operational tours span the East Coast, West Coast, Japan, and Europe. He has flown with VAW-121 "Bluetails", VAW-115 "Liberty Bells", VAW-117 "Wallbangers", VAW-120 "Greyhawks", and commanded the VAW-125 "Tigertails" the Fleet's first E-2D Hawkeye squadron. He has flown with Carrier Air Wing ONE, FIVE, SEVEN, and ELEVEN, while embarked onboard the USS KITTY HAWK (CV 63), USS JOHN F KENNEDY (CV 67), USS NIMITZ (CVN 68), USS GEORGE WASHINGTON (CVN 73), and USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76) in support of Operations NOBLE EAGLE, ENDURING FREEDOM, IRAQI FREEDOM, numerous patrols in the Western Pacific. During his 26 years as a Carrier Aviator, Shane accumulated over 3,300 hours in the E-2D Advanced Hawkeye, E-2C, F/A-18D, F-16B, S-3B, E-3B, and others. He logged over 600 carrier arrested landings, and 174 combat missions in Afghanistan and Iraq.

Here he became involved in the local Council, and pursued full Knighthood from 2012-2014, when he was exemplified in the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Degrees. He then became active in the local Assembly, bringing to full realization his Catholic Patriotism, deeply rooted in his family heritage. Here he held minor Officer positions in both the Council and Assembly, while he learned about the administration and upkeep of the Knights organization from the older Knights, who were quickly becoming less old than him!

Later, during his tour in Naples, Italy from 2019-2022, he served in various Officer positions in the San Gennaro Council and culminated as Deputy Grand Knight and Grand Knight. He also participated in the European Assembly for Military members. During this experience, Shane grew to appreciate the solemn sacrifice that truly accompanies service as a Faithful Knight, and the impact that the organization has on the community and the world around them.

It gave them mobility and a chance to be independent. Whereas before they have to rely upon a member of their family to carry them on their backs to even just go to the bathroom.
